

### **Alberta Highlights**

 Alberta's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.1 per cent in July 2023, up 0.4 percentage points from the previous month and up 1.1 percentage points from the same month last year (Chart 1).


Chart 1 Alberta Unemployment Rate

 Alberta's unemployment rate was the fifth highest in Canada. The national unemployment rate at 5.5 per cent was 0.1 percentage points higher than the previous month (Chart 2).


Chart 2 Unemploment Rates by Province

- In July 2023, the labour force increased by 23,500 to 2,630,100. The number of labour force participants increased among 15 to 24 year olds (+4,100), 25 to 54 year olds (+16,600), and people aged 55 years and over (+2,800).
- Month-over-month, employment increased by 11,800.
  Employment grew for 15 to 24 year olds, 25 to 54 year olds, and people aged 55 years and over.


- Month-over-month, employment increased in the public sector (+7,600), in the private sector (+3,500), and among the self-employed (+800). On a year-over-year basis, private sector employment grew by 64,400 and public sector employment increased by 22,800.
- Compared to the previous month, the seasonally adjusted three-month moving average for employment grew by 1,500 in Edmonton and rose by 1,400 in Calgary. It grew by 5,900 in the rest of Alberta.

 In July 2023, employment rose in eight out of 16 industries compared to the previous month. The industries with the most employment gains were: accommodation and food services; finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing; and health care and social assistance (Chart 4).

 On a year-over-year basis, employment increased the most in: business, finance and administration occupations; management occupations; and natural and applied sciences and related occupations (Chart 5).


Chart 5 Year-over-Year Employment Growth By Occupation - Seasonally Unadjusted

 By economic regions, the seasonally unadjusted threemonth moving average unemployment rate was lowest in Camrose-Drumheller (3.8 per cent) and highest in Calgary (6.1 per cent) (Figure 1).
