- Employment in is this industry expected to grow at an average rate of 2.5% from 2015 to 2019⁴.
- The industry is expected to account for 5.7% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

3. Facts, Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Educational Services industry accounted for approximately 3.3% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2014, down from 3.5% in 2004. Its contribution to Alberta's total employment declined from 6.2% in 2004 to 5.5% in 2014.

Total employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people, 15 years and over) in 2014 was 0.2% lower than its level in 2013. Over the last 10 years, employment increased by 15,100 from 2004, a 13.8% increase. There were 124,700 employed in the industry in 2014, of whom 75.1% were full time and 24.9% were part time.

This calculation method also applies to the percentage of employees under union coverage and the percentage of employees working overtime per week.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2013-2023*⁶, employment growth in the following occupations: University professors and assistants; College and other vocational instructors; and Secondary and elementary school teachers and educational counsellors. is expected to be below Alberta's average rate for all occupations of 1.6%.

2. Demographics: Gender and Age

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Educational Services industry in 2014 was as follows:

women employed: 88,400 people, or 70.9%Men employed: 36,300 people, or 29.1%

Overall in Alberta, women accounted for 44.8 % and men made up 55.2% of total employment (for all industries).


