Bargaining Update

Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 1,969,400 ¹ Albertans employed, of which about 344,100 are self-employed. Nationally, the unemployment rate remained unchanged at 8.2% (February and March 2010), with the number of unemployed persons decreasing by 14,300 to a total of 1,515,100. Decreases in unemployment were due to an increase of part-time positions. Despite the March part-time gains, part-time employment has fallen by 0.6% since July 2009². Unemployment in Alberta increased from 145,900 (February 2010) to 159,200, with the rate increasing from 6.9% in February 2010 to 7.5%. There are approximately 409,300 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 25.2% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.3%².

Highlights

On April 17, 2010, Brandt Tractor (Edmonton) locked out the Teamsters, local 987, for 30 minutes, resulting in a termination of the collective agreement. The employer unilaterally provided a 3.0% increase for the employees, and all employees have returned to work.

The Minister has established a Compulsory Arbitration Board (CAB) involving Alberta Health Services (formerly Parkland Ambulance Authority) and CUPE, Local 3671.

Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

British Columbia

Health Services Minister, Kevin Falcon, is proposing amendments to the *Emergency and Health Services Act*. These involve an expanded role for paramedics including providing care to people with chronic illnesses in residential-care facilities, joining with community-care workers to assist patients in their homes, and perhaps providing care in hospital emergency rooms. These services would apply particularly in rural areas. CUPE, Local 873, representing the paramedics, has expressed some support for the proposed changes. They indicate they have been pressing for an increased role for paramedics for some time. However, they also note they were not consulted on the proposed changes. CUPE Local 873 was on strike from April to November 2009, and ambulance service was maintained through essential services provisions.

Manitoba

A tentative agreement has been reached between Canadian Blood Services and the Manitoba Government Employees Union, Local 200. A conciliator (mediator) assisted in the negotiations. Terms were not released, but the union is recommending approval of the agreement to its members.

Ontario

About 2,900 casino workers, at both Fallsview Casino and Casino Niagara, in Niagara Falls are voting on whether to join the CAW. Four previous attempts by the CAW since 1999 to represent the employees have failed. Niagara Casinos, which manages both casinos, says that they will respect whatever decision the employees make, but would prefer to deal with their employees directly, rather than through a labour union. The voting is taking place April 21 to 23, 2010. Casino management offered to pay taxi fares for employees coming to vote if they're not scheduled to work, and reimbursing out-of-town employees up to \$100 if they come to vote.

Labatt Breweries, owned by Belgian Brewer Interbrew, announced on March 31, 2010 that it is closing the Lakeport Brewery in Hamilton, effective April 30, 2010. About 140 unionized employees, represented by the Teamsters, Local 938, are affected. Labatt says it will be transferring its Lakeport operations to the London, Ontario facility. Negotiations are underway between Labatt and the Teamsters concerning a closure agreement for Lakeport, involving such issues as severance and benefits for the affected employees. Teamsters, Local 938 President Craig McInnes has indicated the Lakeport plant may be a good purchasing opportunity for another brewery.

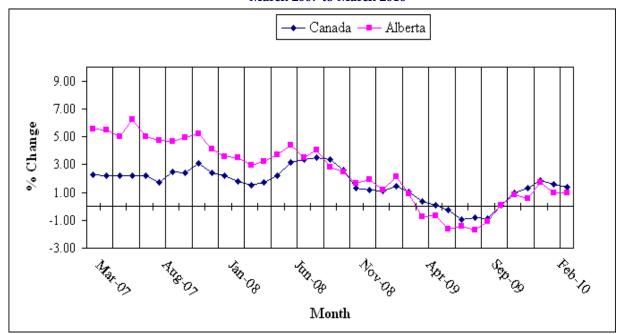
Ouebec

The City of Montreal and CUPE, Local 301, representing about 5,500 outside workers, have been operating under a collective agreement that expired August 31, 2007. A four-day "bargaining blitz" was held in early April 2010 involving a reworked set of contract proposals by the City developed under the supervision of a provincial conciliator (mediator). The City is bound by limits imposed across the municipal workforce by Mayor Gérald Tremblay of a wage freeze for 2007 and two per cent annually in subsequent years. Subcontracting to the private sector is a key issue. Up to March 2010, CUPE, Local 3017 had engaged in a series of one-day strikes, and beginning March 26, 2010, banned overtime, except in emergencies, resulting in a build-up in garbage throughout much of the City. Also, CUPE, Local 301 blocked public access to the popular attractions, the Biodôme and the Insectarium. On April 21, 2010, CUPE, Local 301 stated it would resume working overtime and would allow the reopening of two facilities, in an attempt to end the "climate of confrontation" between the City and the union.

Consumer Price Index (2002=100): Canada, Alberta, Edmonton & Calgary, 2007 to 2010

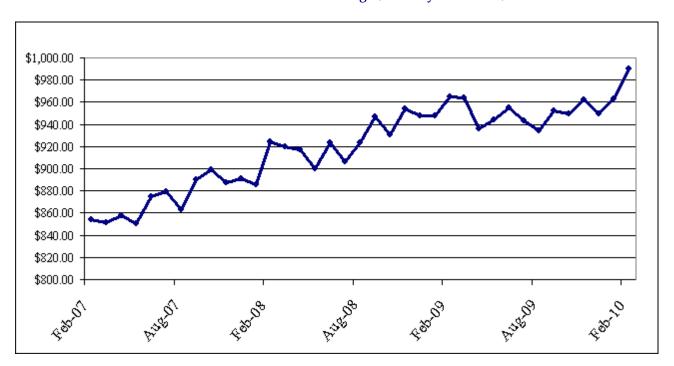
