Bargaining Update

Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 1,979,400 ¹ Albertans employed, of which about 344,300 are self-employed. Nationally, the unemployment rate decreased from 8.2% (March 2010) to 8.1% (April 2010), with the number of unemployed persons decreasing by 16,800 to a total of 1,498,300. Decreases in unemployment were entirely in the private sector. Two-thirds of the employment growth was among men aged 25 and over.² Unemployment in Alberta decreased from 159,200 (March 2010) to 158,500 (April 2010), with the rate decreasing from 7.5% in March 2010 to 7.4%. There are approximately 411,400 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 25.2% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.3%².

Highlights

In negotiations between Extendicare Canada Inc. (six locations) and AUPE, the mediator issued recommendations for settlement which were accepted by the parties.

Alberta Health Services and UNA continue to negotiate for the renewal of their provincial collective agreement and further mediation meetings are scheduled for June 10 to 13, 2010. The parties have completed negotiations regarding transitional issues and the mediator will be issuing recommendations regarding the outstanding transitional issues.

Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

Saskatchewan

Protestors, including unionized construction workers and the Saskatchewan Provincial Building and Construction Trades Council, converged outside the Legislature to oppose various measures taken by the government. Among those protesting were members of First Nations concerned about the proposed sale of wildlife habitat lands and health care union members concerned about slow progress in collective bargaining negotiations. Construction building trades members protested Bill 80 (*The Construction Industry Labour Relations Amendment Act*), which will end the requirement that workers join the union specific to their trade and open the door to unions currently not allowed to organize in Saskatchewan's construction sector. Bill 80 passed Third Reading on May 19, 2010 and received Royal Assent May 20, 2010. It requires Proclamation to become law.

Manitoba

Hundreds of construction workers who are members of the Plumbers, Local 254 went on strike on May 17, 2010 after rejecting a tentative agreement the union had reached with the CLR of Manitoba. The workers had been working on high profile job sites such as the Canadian Museum for Human Rights and a new Winnipeg Airport terminal. The union's last contract, a three-year agreement, expired May 1, 2010 and members approved a strike mandate May 6, 2010. Workers from other trades who were not on strike did not cross the Airport project picket line on Monday, May 17, 2010. However, they indicated that, after a symbolic day or two of support for striking Plumbers, other trades not working under the same contract will return to work at the site.

Ontario

The Ontario Labour Relations Board (LRB) issued a decision on May 17, 2010 directing the USW and Vale Inco to restart negotiations "immediately," preferably with the assistance of a mediator. However, they are to set aside the issue of how workers will be recalled after the strike ends (which includes dealing with the issue of the nine strikers who were let go by Vale Inco because of alleged incidents on the picket line). Once the parties have worked out their differences on most of the major issues, if they aren't able to resolve the recall of workers, they have been directed to return to the LRB. No new talks had been scheduled between the parties as of May 18.


Canada

An internal survey of RCMP officers across the country found widespread support for a staff association with real bargaining power or a traditional trade union, rather than the existing staff association. Members are split on whether it should be an upgraded version of the Staff Relations Representative Program (SRRP) that now exists, or a traditional union with full bargaining rights. Support for a traditional union is stronger in central and western regions of the country. The RCMP are currently the only police officers in Canada who do not have the right to bargain collectively. Any change to their status would require an amendment to the *RCMP Act*. Previous efforts to push the change through Parliament have failed, but all three opposition parties now appear to be supporting a private member's bill that, if passed, would extend collective bargaining rights to the Mounties.

Consumer Price Index (2002=100): Canada, Alberta, Edmonton & Calgary, 2007 to 2010


