# Bargaining Update

## Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 2,003,900 Albertans employed, of which about 337,000 are self-employed. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased from 8.0% (July 2010) to 8.1% (August 2010), with the number of unemployed persons increasing by 17,800 to a total of 1,510,900. More people entering the work force edged up the unemployment rate. The number of unemployed Albertans increased from 134,000 (July 2010) to 140,000 (August 2010), with the rate increasing from 6.3% to 6.5%. There are approximately 410,900 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 24.0% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 30.1%<sup>1</sup>.

## Highlights

The strike/lockout between UFCW, Local 401, and McKesson Canada Corporation (Calgary), which began on June 28, 2010 ended September 1, 2010 when the parties reached a thirty-nine-month agreement.

An arbitration award has been issued involving the City of Calgary and the Fire Fighters, Local 255.

Suncor Energy (Fort McMurray) and the CEP, Local 707 have reached a three-year agreement covering about 2,000 workers.

## Construction Bargaining News



Twenty-five province-wide agreements in the General Construction Sector are due to expire on April 30, 2011. Under the Registration provisions of Part 3 – Construction Industry Labour Relations of the Labour Relations Code, the Labour Relations Board issues a Consolidation Order grouping trades together. This establishes the framework for the current round of bargaining and affects when unions can strike and employers can lockout.

In September, 2010 some trade divisions served notice to commence bargaining. Those trade divisions that have chosen to participate in joint bargaining have begun bargaining on a limited agenda of issues.

## Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

### **British Columbia**

About 400 unionized forestry workers in the BC coastal region have reached a tentative four-year agreement with firms bargaining through the Forest Industrial Relations Association. The agreement, subject to ratification, is retroactive to June 15, 2010 and includes no wage increases in the first two years, followed by 2% increases in each of the last two years.

### **Manitoba**

Volunteer firefighters in the Rural Municipality of Springfield have become the first in the province to be granted the right to form a union. The Manitoba Labour Board agreed to include the firefighters as part of the Manitoba Government and General Employees' Union after more than 75% signed union cards, and after determining they were employees of the municipality. The union indicated that the future direction of the fire department, rather than money or benefits, was the issue. While the union expected to meet with the municipality shortly to negotiate a first contract, the municipality is considering appealing the decision, as it is worried unionization would give the volunteer firefighters the right to strike, which is a right that full-time paid firefighters do not have.

### **Ontario**

The Ontario government's attempts to rein in public sector spending through a two-year wage freeze were set back after an arbitrator ruled it has no authority to impose a non-legislated wage freeze. The arbitrator awarded 17,000 workers in long-term care homes a 2% increase for this year. Labour leaders say the award could affect the outcome of talks for hundreds of thousands of workers in other sectors, including hospitals, public schools and universities. The Ontario Finance Minister reiterated that the government has no plans to legislate freezes for public-sector workers who bargain collectively.

Workers in a legal strike position at ten Toronto hotels operated by the Westmont Group (Hyatt, Fairmont) took part in roving one-day picket lines in September. The workers, represented by Unite Here, Local 75, are seeking a 10% increase over three years, while the employer is offering 5% over five years. Pensions, shift hours and health benefits are also outstanding issues. Further one-day pickets are expected in the coming weeks.

### **Nova Scotia**

Contract negotiations are set to begin for 10,000 Nova Scotia public school teachers, whose agreement expired July 31, 2010. Civil servants and others negotiating with the government have been told not to expect more than 1% increases, as in the case of 7,800 employees represented by the Nova Scotia Government and General Employees Union. However, other unions negotiating with the government have managed to get higher wage increases. These include 3,700 support staff in schools (2.9% in first three years, and 1% in each of last two years), 900 faculty and professional staff at community colleges (2.9% in the first year and 1% in each of the last two years) and 4,100 hospital employees (2.9% retroactively, followed by 1% in following two years).

### **Newfoundland and Labrador**

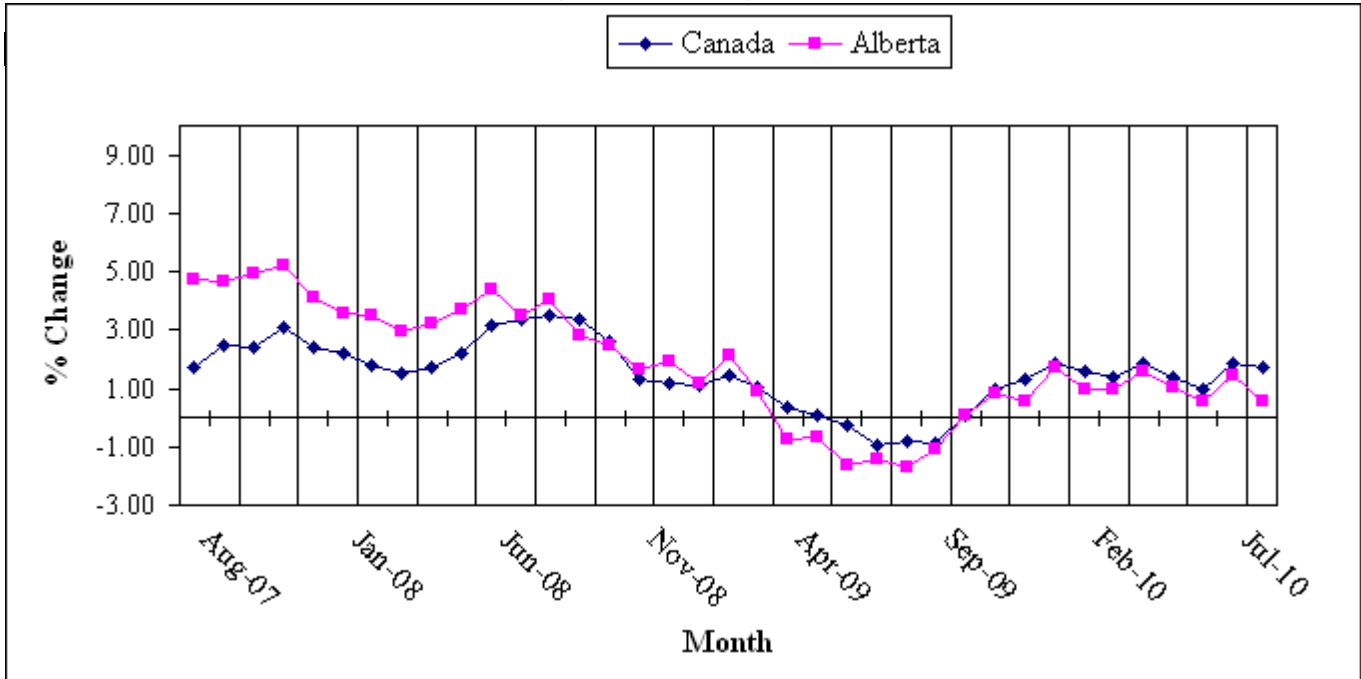
The provincial government appointed a mediator to help end the protracted strike involving over 100 workers at Voisey's Bay nickel mine. Contract negotiations between Vale and the United Steelworkers to reach a second collective agreement have broken off several times since the strike began in August 2009. Over 3,000 Vale workers in Ontario approved a new contract in early July, ending a year-long strike there.

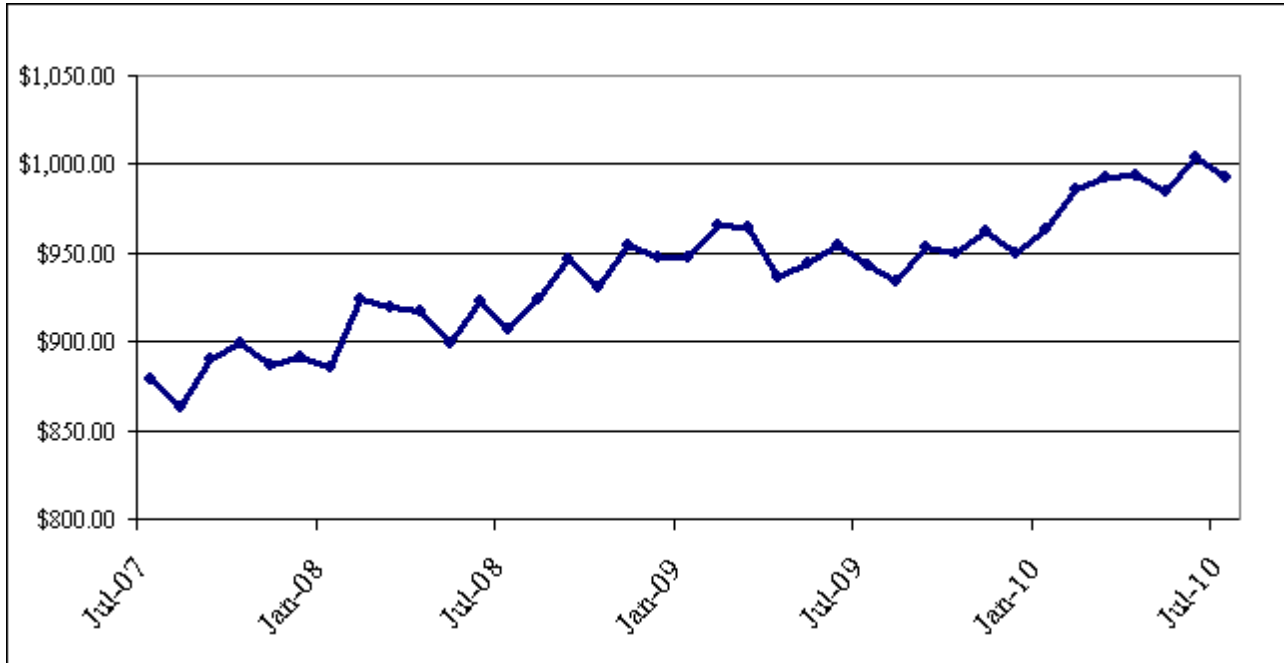
