Bargaining Update

Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 2,021,200 Albertans employed, of which about 345,600 are self-employed. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased from 8.0% in September 2010, to 7.9% in October 2010, with the number of unemployed persons decreasing by 7,300 to a total of 1,485,700. Losses in part-time employment for those aged 25-54 were offset by gains in employment primarily among women aged 55 and over. Unemployment in Alberta decreased from 131,600 in September 2010, to 129,500 in October 2010, with the rate decreasing from 6.2% to 6.0%. There are approximately 408,300 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 24.4% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.9% *

Highlights

AUPE is currently meeting with members throughout the province to discuss the current status of negotiations with the Government of Alberta for approximately 22,000 workers.

A ratified agreement has been reached between Grande Prairie Regional College and support staff at the Fairview Campus, represented by AUPE. The Fairview Campus had been part of NAIT until it was transferred to Grande Prairie Regional College in 2009. The remainder of support staff at the College are represented by the Grand Prairie Regional College Employees' Association.

A ratified agreement has been reached between North American Mining Inc and IUOE, Local 955. The collective agreement covers 1,400 employees who perform overburden work in the oilsands.

Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

Saskatchewan

The Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology (SIAST) and the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees Union (SGEU) remain in bargaining for an agreement that expired 16 months ago. The SGEU represents 1,300 academic and 700 support staff at SIAST campuses across the province. The SGEU has issued strike notice and SIAST lockout notice. A request has been made by the SGEU for an out-of-province mediator to be appointed to assist in negotiations.

Some workers at the Weyburn Wal-Mart want to vote on whether they should be represented by a union. For the past two years, the 120 workers at the store have been represented by UFCW. However, no first collective agreement has been reached between the parties. The Saskatchewan Labour Relations Board has agreed to hear arguments on the decertification bid. At the time the UFCW was certified to represent the workers at the Weyburn Wal-Mart, the certification process involved sufficient numbers of employees signing membership cards. Now, the process requires a secret ballot vote.

Manitoba

The union representing Manitoba's Crown attorneys began an arbitration process with the provincial government in October 2010. The Manitoba Association of Crown Attorneys says workload issues need to be addressed, as they are causing staff illnesses and burnout. A report from 2009 recommended the province hire 70 additional Crown lawyers and 70 additional support staff over the next seven years. That would roughly double the number of Crown lawyers in the province. The report also recommended the average caseload for Crown attorneys be much less then the current average of 319.

Ontario

The International Labour Organization has requested that the Ontario government meet with the OPSEU to address the issue of union representation for part-time community college workers. Several thousand of these workers cast ballots about 22 month's ago on whether they wish to be represented by OPSEU. However, the Ontario Labour Relations Board has yet to count the ballots. The colleges have disputed the composition of the proposed bargaining units.

Ouebec

About 400 outside workers with the City of Sherbrooke, represented by CUPE, Local 2729, have been without a new collective agreement since the end of 2007. The parties have been meeting with a conciliator (mediator) in an attempt to reach a new agreement. The City had proposed a seven-year agreement in October 2010. The union countered with their own proposal in November, calling for a five-year agreement, followed by an agreement to extend the deal for two more years. CUPE has also indicated that, regardless of the status of their contract at the time, the workers would not strike or use pressure tactics for the duration of the Canada Summer Games, which are being hosted by Sherbrooke in 2013.

New Brunswick


The City of St. John proposed a two year salary freeze for most city workers, together with a reduction in employer contributions to the pension fund. The deficit in the pension plan is increasing at about \$750,000 a month and now sits at \$129 million. The City says it is in danger of having assets seized if it does not make an overdue \$5 million payment on the pension fund. Outside workers have agreed to the pension proposal, but unions representing about half of St. John workers, including police and firefighters, have not signed off. It is not clear if their approval is required for pension changes to be made. Any agreement by the City would still depend on the provincial government giving them more time to bring the pension fund up to levels required by regulation.


