## **Bargaining Update**

#### Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 1,995,300<sup>1</sup> Albertans employed, of which about 364,000 are self-employed. Nationally, the unemployment rate remained unchanged at 8.4 % in both November and December 2009, although there was a slight increase of 10,400 unemployed persons. Increases in health care and social assistance employment were offset by declines in transportation, support services and public administration. Unemployment in Alberta decreased between 152,300 (November 2009) to 140,600 (December 2009), moving from 7.1% to 6.6%. There are approximately 414,300 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 25.4% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.5%<sup>2</sup>.

#### **Highlights**

A Compulsary Arbitration Board (CAB) has been established involving the City of Calgary and the Fire Fighters Association, Local 255. Ratified agreements have been reached between Norquest College (Edmonton) and the Faculty Association, Grand Prairie Regional College and the Academic Staff Association, and Portage College and AUPE.

#### **Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions**

#### Manitoba

The Manitoba Labour Relations Board has agreed to a request by the Steelworkers Local 3-1375, representing about 265 of the workers at the Tembec's paper mill in Pine Falls, to appoint an arbitrator to settle the dispute between the parties. The Board's decision ended a four-and-a-half month lockout, but Tembec has no intentions of reopening the mill. The decision, though, may prompt Tembec to issue layoff notices, which will allow the workers to apply for employment insurance benefits. Tembec had announced during the lockout that the paper mill was for sale. There are three potential buyers, a former Tembec vice-president, the mill employees, and the nearby Sagkeeng First Nation., but none have made a solid offer. The future of the paper industry is not strong, due mainly to declining demand. During collective bargaining negotiations in the fall of 1999, Tembec had proposed a 35 per cent reduction in wages and benefits.

#### **Ontario**

USW, representing about 2,900 Vale Inco workers in Sudbury and 116 in Port Colborne, has filed a bargaining in bad faith application against the company with the Ontario Labour Relations Board. The submission on January 13, 2009 marked the six month anniversary of the strike by USW employees. The application includes a demand that the company meet with the union with the assistance of a mediator. It also asks that Vale compensate for lost wages, benefits, and seniority if the Board rules that bargaining in bad faith occurred. Premier McGinty has apparently indicated that the provincial government will do what it can to help resolve the dispute.

Local 446 of the Carpenters has been merged into Local 2486, effective January 1, 2010. Local 2486 serves much of Northern Ontario, and is based in Sudbury. Local 446 has served the Sault Ste. Marie and Algoma District for 92 years. The International office, on the recommendation of the Greater Ontario Regional Council of Carpenters and Drywall and Allied Workers, rescinded the Local 446 Charter in March 2009 and the decision was upheld by the Ontario Labour Relations Board. The International implemented a policy more than a decade ago of merging small locals into larger ones, and creating regional councils. Local 446, which had 80 members, unanimously rejected the merger decision at a special membership meeting in early 2009. The Regional Council claimed that a larger local would enhance Local 446 opportunities while achieving cost savings that would allow for greater resources to be devoted to organizing and training. Sault Ste. Marie will retain an office, a business manager and a training centre, but all administrative and financial matters will be handled in Sudbury. Three other Sault Ste. Marie - based unions, the electrical workers, sheet metal workers, and painters have previously merged with their Sudbury local.


About 9,000 instructors at Ontario community colleges, represented by the Ontario Public Service Employees Union, voted 57 percent in favour of the strike action on January 13, 2010. The colleges are represented by the College Compensation and Appointments Council. Bargaining broke off on December 15, 2009, primarily over compensation, work load, and control over decision-making. The Council has offered an 8 per cent increase over four years, while the instructors would like 8 per cent over three years. The parties are expected to resume bargaining. Strike action in Ontario, if it occurs, is not expected for at least a month. Workload was a major issue when college teachers went on strike for three weeks in 2006.


