Bargaining Update

Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 2,008,6001 Albertans employed, of which about 338,400 are self-employed. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased from 7.9% (June 2010) to 8.0% (July 2010), with the number of unemployed persons increasing by 17,900 to a total of 1,493,100. Large full-time employment losses (-139,000) were mostly offset by part-time employment gains (+130,000). Unemployment in Alberta decreased from 143,300 (June 2010) to 134,000 (July 2010), with the rate decreasing from 6.7% to 6.3%. There are approximately 410,900 Albertans covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 24.6% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.1%¹.

Highlights

The UFCW, Local 401, and McKesson Canada Corporation (Calgary) strike/lockout continues. The strike began on 28, 2010 and the employer locked out the employees on July 2, 2010.

Memorandums of agreement have been reached between:

- Lethbridge College and the Faculty Association,
- Alberta College of Art and Design and the Faculty Association.

The Government of Alberta and AUPE, representing about 21,200 provincial public servants, are scheduled to commence bargaining on September 8, 2010.

Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

Canada

A lockout affecting 500 Greyhound drivers, maintenance and terminal workers was averted as Greyhound Canada and ATU reached a tentative agreement on August 11, 2010. The lockout would have halted all bus service in Ontario and Quebec, affecting 27 different routes. Bus service is expected to operate as normal now that the tentative agreement has been reached.

UFCW, Local 1118, commenced strike action August 24, 2010, against Canada Malting Company Ltd (Red Deer). Canada Malting Company produces malt for the brewing industry; the employees are grain handlers and thereby covered by federal legislation. The pension plan is at issue, in particular whether the pension plan should be defined contribution or defined benefit. The two sides are working with a federally appointed mediator.

Saskatchewan

After two years without a collective agreement, a tentative four year agreement, retroactive to 2008, was reached between three unions representing 25,000 health care providers, and the Saskatchewan Association of Health Organizations (SAHO). The three unions are CUPE, the Service Employees International Union – West, and the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees Union. The workers include special care aides, home health aides, licensed practical nurses, food services workers, therapeutic/recreational workers, sterile processing workers, maintenance, administrative, clerical, medical technologists/technicians, and laundry, housekeeping and activity personnel.

The government passed legislation just before negotiations began, to deem more than 80 per cent of CUPE's health care providers essential and unable to strike. While this hampered the unions' negotiating power, the union indicated it had defeated most of SAHO's demands for concessions and secured modest monetary gains. The agreement preserves seniority rights in the area of lay-offs, provides improved shift differentials and full retroactivity on the wage rates for members (including retirees and those on lay-off).

Manitoba

The Manitoba Nurses Union accused a Winnipeg care home of union busting and is taking its case to the provincial Labour Board. Last fall, a group of nurses at the Kildonan Personal Care Centre joined a union, however, their positions were subsequently eliminated. The company recently reposted the jobs but classified them as management positions, which makes them ineligible for union representation. If all the positions are filled as management, there will be 13 managers overseeing 14 nurses at the facility. The Labour Board will hear the case in November.

Ontario


The Ontario Labour Relations Board (OLRB) ordered Vale Inco and USW to present more evidence at further hearings regarding the matter of eight workers fired by the company during a strike which began in July 2009, and ended in July 2010. USW filed a bargaining in bad faith complaint with the OLRB, alleging that Vale's refusal to allow the workers to go to arbitration to see if they'll get their jobs back is a breach of its duty to bargain under the *Ontario Labour Relations Act*. The OLRB decided that the union successfully pled a "prima facie" case; however, it still wants to hear Vale's explanation of why it does not want the workers' fate to be decided by an arbitrator. More than 150 clerical, administrative and technical staff at Laurentian (Sudbury) and Lakehead (Thunder Bay) Universities went on strike August 16. 2010, after contract talks with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) broke down. In late July, members of Ontario Public Service Employees Union, Local 677, representing employees in both universities voted 97% in favour of strike action if necessary to reach a settlement. Five days of mediation failed to bring about a resolution. Outstanding issues include hours of work, overtime, sick leave, family leave and wages. NOSM's clerical, technical and administrative staff unionized about a year and a half ago and have been attempting to negotiate their first collective agreement since October 2009.


