Highlights

1. Population of Albertans Aged 45 and Older

- At 45.4%, Alberta had the lowest proportion of people aged 45 and older in its working age population in Canada in 2013.
- The number of Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 39.3% between 2003 and 2013.

2. Labour Force Statistics of Albertans Aged 45 and Older

- In 2013, 39.0% of Alberta's labour force was aged 45 and older.
- At 62.9%, Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest labour force participation rate among the provinces.
- The employment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older at 60.2% was the highest in the country.
- The unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older at 4.2% was lower than the provincial rate, 4.6%.

3. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Industry

- In 2013, 71.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older were employed in the Services-Producing sector.
- Of all Albertans employed in the Agricultural industry, 58.6% were aged 45 and older.

4. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Occupation

- Business, finance and administration; Sales and service; Trades, transport and equipment operators; and Management occupations employed 65.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older.
- Higher proportions of Albertans aged 45 and older than Alberta's working age population were employed in the following occupations: Management; Business, finance and administration; Unique to primary industry; and Social Science, Education, Government and Religion.

5. Educational Levels of Alberta's Labour Force Aged 45 and Older

- The percentage of Alberta's labour force aged 45 and older with a university degree was 23.9% in 2013.
- The number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force with a Postsecondary education increased by 206,200, or 58.9% during the past decade.

1. Population of Albertans Aged 45 and Older

For the purpose of this profile, working age population (WAP) refers to people who are 15 years and older (please refer to the <u>Appendix</u> for definitions of labour force terms).

Alberta had the lowest proportion of people aged 45 and older in its working age population in 2013 at 45.4%, up from 41.6% in 2003 (Figure 1). Newfoundland and Labrador had the highest proportion at 57.8%.

Albertans aged 45 to 54 accounted for 17.6% of the working age population in 2013, down from 18.4% in 2003 (Figure 2). Those aged 55 to 64 years were 14.3% of Alberta's working age population in 2013 compared to 11.0% in 2003. Albertans aged 65 years and over accounted for 13.5% of working age population in 2013 compared to 12.2% in 2003.

In 2003, the working age population in Alberta was over 2.4 million (Figure 3). By 2013, it had increased by 27.8% to over 3.1 million. In the last 10 years, Canadians aged 45 and older increased by 28.0%, or approximately 3.2 million people. Albertans aged 45 years and over accounted for 12.5% of the total Canadian increase within this age group.

The growth rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 11.3 percentage points higher than the growth rate of Canadians aged 45 and older. During the past 10 years, Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 39.3%, compared to Canada's 28.0%. However, Alberta's working age population increased by 27.8% over this period compared to the increase of 14.2% for Canada's working age population over the same period.

The population of Alberta aged 55-64 increased by 65.5% over the ten-year period compared to 22.2% for the 45-54 year olds and 41.4% for those aged 65 and over (Figure 4).

2. Labour Force Statistics for Albertans Aged 45 and Older

In 2013, Albertans aged 45 years and older accounted for 39.0% of the provincial labour force and 35.4% of those who were unemployed (Figure 5).



In 2013, Albertans aged 65 years and over had the lowest unemployment rate at 3.4% (Figure 6). However, they had the lowest participation and employment rates when compared to those aged 45-54 years and 55-64 years.

Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest participation rate in Canada at 62.9% (Figure 7). This was 8.5 percentage points higher than the national average.




Figure 8 Participation Rate by Age Group in Alberta, 2013

The participation rate of Albertans aged 45-54, at 87.7%, was the highest among the three age groups and was 14.6 percentage points higher than the provincial rate, 73.1% (Figure 8).

For both genders, Albertans aged 45 and older had a lower participation rate than the provincial counterparts' average (Figure 9). Females aged 45 and older had a participation rate of 56.5%, which was 12.8 percentage points below the rate for males aged 45 and older.







Figure 10 Employment Rate of People Aged 45 and Older by Province, 2013

In 2013, Albertans aged 45 years and older had the highest employment rate among all provinces at 60.2% (Figure 10). This was 9.0 percentage points higher than the Canadian average for people aged 45 and older.

In 2013, the employment rate of Albertans aged 45-54 years was the highest among the three age groups and was 14.4 percentage points higher than the provincial rate 69.7% (Figure 11).




Figure 12 Employment Rate by Gender, 2013

The employment rate of females aged 45 and older was 11.8 percentage points lower than their male counterparts and 15.3 percentage points lower than the provincial rate 69.7% (Figure 12).

In 2013, the proportion of employment that is full-time was highest among those aged 45-54. The proportion of employment that is part-time among those aged 65 years and older was more than double the provincial level of 15.9% (Figure 13).

Approximately one in ten employed workers aged 45-54 worked part-time compared to four in ten for employed workers aged 65 years and over.

Albertans aged 45 and older had a higher proportion of full-time employment than Albertans aged 15 years and over (Figure 14). The share of Alberta males aged 45 and older in full-time employment was 91.4% compared to 76.2% for females aged 45 and older.

The unemployment rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 4.2% in 2013, the third lowest in the country behind Saskatchewan's 2.8% and Manitoba's 3.7% (Figure 15).




Figure 16 Unemployment Rate by Age Group, 2013

The unemployment rates for Albertans aged 45-54 and 65 years were lower than the provincial rate at 4.6%, in 2013 (Figure 16).

Alberta's unemployment rate at 4.6% in 2013 was unchanged from the previous year (Figure 17). The rate for Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 0.3 percentage points to 4.2% in 2013 from 2012. Over the last ten years, unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older was consistently lower than the provincial rate.



3. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Industry

In 2013, 71.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older were employed in the Services-Producing sector while the rest were employed in the Goods-Producing sector (Figure 18). Males accounted for 76.7% of Albertans aged 45 and older who were employed in the Goods-Producing sector and females accounted for 23.3%. In the Services-Producing sector, the male share of employed aged 45 and older was 45.8% and 54.2% were female.

Of the 394,400 employed female Albertans aged 45 and older, 58.5% were employed in the following five main industries: Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Educational Services, Professional, scientific and technical services and Finance, Insurance, Real Estate and Leasing.

The following five industries employed 51.0% of male Albertans aged 45 and older: Construction; Forestry, Fishing, Mining, Oil and Gas; Manufacturing; Transportation and Warehousing; and Professional, Scientific and Technical Services.

In 2013, the Agricultural industry had the highest proportion of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 58.6%, followed by Public Administration, at 50.7% (Figure 19). Accommodation and Food Services had the lowest percentage of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 19.4%, followed by Construction, at 33.2%.




Share of Total Employment by Industry, 2013

4. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Occupation

The proportions of employed Albertans aged 45 and older were higher than the overall provincial shares in the following occupations: Management; Business, finance and administrative; Unique to primary industry; and Social Science, Education, Government and Religion (Figure 20).

In 2013, Management had the highest percentage of employed people aged 45 and older, at 54.3%. Sales and service had the lowest share, at 33.1% (Figure 21).



5. Educational Levels of Alberta's Labour Force Aged 45 and Older

In 2013, Albertans aged 45 and older accounted for 37.2% of Albertans in the labour force who had less than high school as their highest educational attainment (Figure 22). They also accounted for 43.1% and 39.1% of Albertans in the labour force with a post-secondary certificate or diploma and university degree, respectively.

Overall, 23.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older had a university degree, the same as the provincial share.

Between 2003 and 2013, the number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force that had completed high school as their highest level of education attained increased by 57.1% compared to 36.8% for Albertans 15 and older (Figure 23). Similarly, the number of people aged 45 and older in the labour force that have a university degree increased by 75.5% compared to an increase of 69.8% for Albertans 15 and older. Albertans aged 45 and over who had attained a post-secondary certificate or diploma as their highest level of education increased by 49.9% compared to the overall provincial increase of 29.7% over the same period.

Among Albertans 45 years and over, those with a post-secondary certificate or diploma had the lowest unemployment rate at 3.9%, followed by those with a university degree at 4.1% in 2013 (Figure 24).

Appendix

All definitions are from the Guide to the Labour Force Survey 2013.pdf, Statistics Canada – Catalogue no. 71-543-GIE.

Employment Rate: The number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of working age population (WAP).

Full-time Employment: Those persons who usually work 30 hours or more per week at their main or only job.

Industry: The general nature of the business carried out by the employer for whom the respondent works (main job only).

Labour Force: The labour force is composed of the portion of the WAP who, during the reference week, were employed or unemployed. The reference week is defined as the week containing the 15th day of the month in which information is collected for the Labour Force Survey.

Occupation: The kind of work persons 15+ years were doing during the reference week, as determined by the kind of work reported and the description of the most important duties of the job. If the individual did not have a job during the reference week, the data relates to the previous job, if that job was held in the past year.

Part-time Employment: Consists of all other persons who usually work less than 30 hours per week.

Participation Rate: The total labour force expressed as a percentage of the WAP. This measure represents the proportion of the WAP that is either employed or actively seeking employment.

Unemployment Rate: The number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the labour force.

Working Age Population: Those persons 15+ years, except persons living on Indian reserves, inmates of institutions, and full-time members of the Canadian Armed Forces.

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
