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## Overview

The 2018 Alberta Labour Force Profile for Aged 45 and Older provides statistics and trends in the labour market for Albertans aged 45 and older. Topics include employment, unemployment, labour force participation, industry, occupation, education, and demographics. Statistics are provided for Alberta, the other nine provinces and at the national level excluding the territories. All statistics provided are 12-month averages for the year. All Statistics are from Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey.

All data and definitions are from the <u>Labour Force Survey</u>, Statistics Canada.

#### **Employment Rate:**

The number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over.

#### **Industry**:

The general nature of the business carried out by the establishment for whom the respondent works (main job only). Based on the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). For more information: https://www23.statcan.gc.ca/imdb/p3VD.pl?Function=getVD&TVD=1181553

#### **Labour Force:**

The labour force is the portion of the civilian, non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the survey reference week, were employed or unemployed. The reference week is defined as the week, usually containing the 15th day of the month, in which information is collected for the Labour Force Survey.

#### Occupation:

The kind of work persons 15+ years were doing during the reference week, as determined by the kind of work reported and the description of the most important duties of the job. If the individual did not have a job during the reference week, the data relates to the most recent job held within the previous year. Based on the National Occupational Classification (NOC) 2016. #### **Participation Rate:**

The total labour force expressed as a percentage of the population aged 15 years and over. This measure represents the proportion of the said population that is either employed or actively seeking employment.

#### **Working Age Population:**

Persons 15 years and older. Excluded from the survey's coverage are: persons living on reserves and other Aboriginal settlements in the provinces, full-time members of the Canadian Armed Forces, the institutionalized population, and households in extremely remote areas with very low population density. These groups together represent an exclusion of approximately 2% of the population aged 15 and over.

#### **Average Hourly Wage:**

Based on hourly wage before taxes and other deductions, and include tips and commissions. Only persons who are an employee are included in the average.






### Education

The number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force with post-secondary education increased by 165,500 or 35.1% from 2008 to 2018.

In Alberta 27.2% of workers aged 45 and older have a university degree, less than the provincial average at 29.1%.




# **Population Statistics**

In 2018, 46.5% of Albertans in the working aged population (aged 15 and older) were aged 45 and older. This was an increase from 44.0% in 2008, but was the lowest proportion in Canada (Table 1). Newfoundland and Labrador had the highest proportion at 59.9%

Albertans aged 45 to 54 accounted for 15.9% of the working age population in 2018, down from 19.3% in 2008 (Table 2). Those aged 55 to 64 years were 15.4% of Alberta's working age population in 2018 compared to 12.5% in 2008. Albertans aged 65 years and over accounted for 15.3% of working age population in 2018 compared to 12.2% in 2008.

In 2008, the working age population in Alberta was approximately 2.9 million (Table 3). By 2018, it had increased by 21.8% to approximately 3.5 million. In the last 10 years, Canadians aged 45 and older increased by 20.2%, or approximately 2.7 million people. Albertans aged 45 years and over accounted for 10.4% of the total Canadian increase within this age group.

The growth rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 8.5 percentage points higher than the growth rate of Canadians aged 45 and older. During the past 10 years, Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 28.7%, compared to Canada's 20.2%. However, Alberta's working age population increased by 21.8% over this period compared to the increase of 12.9% for Canada's working age population over the same period.

The population of Albertans aged 55-64 increased by 50.3% over the 10 year period compared to 0.1% for the 45-54 year olds and 51.9% for those aged 65 and over (Table 4).

## **Labour Force Statistics**

In 2018, Albertans aged 45 years and older accounted for 39.2% of the provincial labour force and 38.6% of those who were unemployed (Table 5).



In 2018, Albertans aged 65 years and over had the lowest unemployment rate at 4.7% (Table 6). However, they had the lowest participation and employment rates when compared to those aged 45-54 years and 55-64 years.

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
Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest participation rate in Canada at 60.6% (Figure 1). This was 8.2 percentage points higher than the rate for Canadians aged 45 and older.

Participation rate of people aged 45 and older by province, 2018




The participation rate of Albertans aged 45-54 was 88.8%. This was the highest among the three age groups over 45 years old, and 16.9 percentage points higher than the provincial rate of 71.9% (Figure 2).

Participation rate by Age group, Alberta, 2018




For both males and females, Albertans aged 45 and older had a lower participation rate than the provincial average (Figure 3). Females aged 45 and older had a participation rate of 54.3%, which was 12.7 percentage points below the rate for males aged 45 and older.




In 2018, Albertans aged 45 years and older had the highest employment rate among all provinces at 56.7% (Figure 4). This was 6.8 percentage points higher than the Canadian average for people aged 45 and older.

Employment rate of people aged 45 and older by province, 2018




In 2018, the employment rate of Albertans aged 45-54 years at 83.2% was the highest among the three age groups 45 years and older and was 16.0 percentage points higher than the provincial rate at 67.2% (Figure 5).

The employment rate of females aged 45 and older was 11.7 percentage points lower than their male counterparts and 16.4 percentage points lower than the provincial rate of 67.2% (Figure 6).

In 2018, the proportion of full-time employment was highest among those aged 45-54. The proportion of part-time employment among those aged 65 years and older was 38.2%, more than double the provincial level of 17.8% (Table 7).


Albertans aged 45 and older had a higher proportion of full-time employment than Albertans aged 15 years and over (Table 8). The share of Alberta males aged 45 and older in full-time employment was 89.4% compared to 75.3% for females aged 45 and older.


The unemployment rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 6.5% in 2018. This was the fourth highest in Canada (Figure 7).

Unemployment rate of people aged 45 and older by province, 2018




In 2018, the unemployment rates for Albertans aged 45-54, and 65 years and older were lower than the provincial rate of 6.6% (Figure 8). The unemployment rate for Albertans aged 55-64 was 0.4 percentage points higher than the provincial rate.

In 2018, Alberta's unemployment rate was 6.6%, a decrease of 1.2 percentage points from the previous year (Figure 9). The unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older decreased to 6.5% in 2018, 1.4 percentage points lower than in 2017. Over nine of the last 10 years, the unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older was consistently lower than the provincial rate - the exception was in 2017.

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## Industry

Males accounted for 77.5% of Albertans aged 45 and older who were employed in the Goods-Producing sector while females accounted for 22.5%. In the Services-Producing sector, the male share of employed people aged 45 and older was 46.9% while 53.1% were female (table 9).

Of the 412,300 employed female Albertans aged 45 and older, 58.5% were employed in the following five main industries: Health Care and Social Assistance; Retail Trade; Educational Services; Professional, Scientific and Technical Services; and Business, Building and Other Support Services.


The following five industries employed 50.3% of male Albertans aged 45 and older: Construction; Transportation and Warehousing; Professional, Scientific and Technical Services; Manufacturing; and Forestry, Fishing, Mining, Oil and Gas.

In 2018, the Agricultural industry had the highest proportion of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 62.6%, followed by Business, Building and Other Support Services, at 49.6% (Figure 10). Accommodation and Food Services had the lowest percentage of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 20.9%, followed by Information, Culture and Recreation, at 32.2%.



# Occupation

In 2018, Management had the highest percentage of employed people aged 45 and older, at 55.3%. Natural resources, agriculture and related production occupations had the lowest at 32.9% (Figure 11).

The following occupations had a higher proportion of employed Albertans aged 45 and older than Albertans 15-44 years old: Management; Business, finance and administrative; and Manufacturing and utilities (Table 10).



## Education

In 2018, Albertans aged 45 and older accounted for 39.6% of Albertans who had less than high school as their highest educational attainment (Figure 12). They also accounted for 42.8% and 36.7% of Albertans with a post-secondary certificate or diploma and university degree, respectively. Overall, 27.2% of Albertans aged 45 and older had a university degree, less than the provincial share at 29.1%.

Between 2008 and 2018, the number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force that had completed high school as their highest level of education attained increased by 21.9% compared to 10.7% for Albertans 15 and older (Table 11). Similarly, the number of people aged 45 and older in the labour force that have a university degree increased by 54.0% compared to an increase of 59.1% for Albertans 15 and older.

Among Albertans 45 years and older, those with a university degree had the lowest unemployment rate in 2018 at 5.8%, followed by those with high school diploma at 5.9% in 2018 (Table 12).
