

## ALBERTA LABOUR FORCE PROFILES

Aged 45 and Older 2015

## Highlights

## **1. Population of Albertans Aged 45 and Older**

- At 45.4%, Alberta had the lowest proportion of people aged 45 and older in its working age population in Canada in 2015.
- The number of Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 36% between 2005 and 2015.

## 2. Labour Force Statistics of Albertans Aged 45 and Older

- In 2015, 38.8% of Alberta's labour force was aged 45 and older and 39.2% of the total employed.
- At 62.4%, Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest labour force participation rate among all provinces.
- The employment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older at 59.3% was the highest in the country.
- The unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older at 4.9% was lower than the provincial rate, 6% and the Canadian average of 5.6% for this age group.

## **3. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Industry**

- In 2015, 72.5% of Albertans aged 45 and older were employed in the Services-Producing sector.
- Of all Albertans employed in the Agricultural industry, 57.6% were aged 45 and older.

## 4. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Occupation

- Sales and services, Business, finance and administration; Trades, transport and equipment operators; and Management occupations employed two-thirds of Albertans aged 45 and older.
- Higher proportions of Albertans aged 45 and older than Alberta's working age population were employed in the following occupations: Management; Business, finance and administration; Primary industry; Processing, manufacturing and utilities and Social Science, Education, Government and Religion.

## 5. Educational Levels of Alberta's Labour Force Aged 45 and Older

- The percentage of Alberta's labour force aged 45 and older with a university degree was 36.1% in 2015.
- The number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force with a postsecondary education increased by 202,000 or 51.4% during the past decade.

## 1. Population of Albertans Aged 45 and Older

For the purpose of this profile, working age population (WAP) refers to people who are 15 years and older (please refer to the <u>Appendix</u> for definitions of labour force terms).

Alberta had the lowest proportion of people aged 45 and older in its working age population in 2015 at 45.4%, up by 2.5 percentage points from 2005 (Figure 1). Newfoundland and Labrador had the highest proportion of older workers in Canada at 58.3%, followed closely by New Brunswick at 58.2%. Alberta's proportion of people aged 45 and above is 7 percentage points below the Canadian average of 52.4%.

The proportion of Albertans in the 45 to 54 age group was 16.8% of the working age population in 2015, down by 2.2 percentage points since 2005 (Figure 2). Those in the 55 to 64 age group accounted for 14.7% of the working age population in 2015 compared to 11.7% in 2005. Albertans aged 65 years and over accounted for 13.8% of the working age population in 2015 compared to 12.2% in 2005.

The working age population in Alberta increased by 28.6% between 2005 and 2015 from 2.6 million to 3.4 million (Figure 3). The growth in Alberta's working age population was 14.9 percentage points higher than the Canadian working age population growth of 13.7%.

Albertans aged 45 years and over increased by 36%, 10.7 percentage points more than Canadians of the same age group (25.3%) over the period.

The population of Albertans aged 55-64 increased by 62% over the ten-year period compared to 14.1% for the 45-54 year olds and 45.1% for those aged 65 and over (Figure 4).

## 2. Labour Force Statistics for Albertans Aged 45 and Older

In 2015, Albertans aged 45 years and older accounted for 38.8% of the provincial labour force. They also accounted for 39.2% of the total employed and 31.7% of the unemployed in Alberta (Figure 5). The 45 years and older age group had lower participation and employment rates at 62.4% and 59.3%, compared to the total labour force at 73% and 68.6% respectively. However, they had a lower unemployment rate at 4.9% compared to 6% in 2015.

Albertans aged 65 years and over had the lowest unemployment rate at 3.3% (Figure 6), but they had the lowest participation and employment rates at 20.1% and 19.4% when compared to those aged 45-54 years and 55-64 years. The 45 to 54 age group had the highest participation and employment rates at 88.6 and 84% respectively, compared to the working age population participation and employment rates of 73% and 68.6%, respectively (Figures 5, 6).





Figure 7 Participation Rate of People Aged 45 and Older by Province, 2015

Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest participation rate in Canada at 62.4% in 2015 (Figure 7). This was 9 percentage points higher than the national average.



The participation rate of Albertans aged 45-54 at 88.7%, was the highest among the three age groups and was 15.7 percentage points higher than the provincial rate of 73% in 2015(Figure 8).



#### Figure 8 Participation Rate by Age Group in Alberta, 2015


For both genders, Albertans aged 45 and older had lower participation rates than their provincial counterparts (Figure 9). Alberta women aged 45 and older had a participation rate of 55.6%, which was 11 percentage points below the rate for provincial females while men aged 45 and older had a participation rate of 69.2% compared to the provincial male rate of 79.3%.



### Figure 9 Participation Rate by Gender, 2015


In 2015, Albertans aged 45 years and older had the highest employment rate compared to the same age group across all 10 provinces at 59.3% (Figure 10). This was 8.8 percentage points higher than the Canadian average for people aged 45 and older. Newfoundland and Labrador had the lowest employment rate for this age group at 42%.




#### Figure 11 Employment Rate by Age Group, 2015

The employment rate of Albertans aged 45-54 years of 84% was the highest among the 4 age groups in Figure 11.

The employment rate for women aged 45 and older was 12.4 percentage points lower than their male counterparts and 9.7 percentage points lower than the provincial rate of 62.9% for females (Figure 12).

In 2015, there were more people in full-time employment in the 45 years and older age group at 84.2% compared to the total working age population by 1.2 percentage points. The proportion of full-time was highest among the 45-54 age group at 88.6.

For part-time employment, those aged 65 years and older had the highest percentage of 38.7%, more than twice the percentage for the working age population in Alberta at 17%. Part-time employment of people 45 years and older was 15.8% in 2015 (Figure 13).

Albertans aged 45 and older had a higher proportion of full-time employment than Albertans aged 15 years and over (Figure 14). The share of Alberta males aged 45 and older in full-time employment was 91.2% compared to 75.7% for females for the same age group. There were more females part-time in part-time employment for both 45 years and older and 15 years and older age groups in 2015.





Figure 15 Unemployment Rate of People Aged 45 and Older by Province, 2015

The unemployment rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 4.9% in 2015. This was lower than the Canadian rate by 0.7 percentage points (Figure 15).


Figure 16 Unemployment Rate by Age Group, 2015

The lowest unemployment rate for mature workers was for the age group 65 and older at 3.3%, followed by the 55-64 age group at 4.9% and the 45-54 age group at 5.3%. Overall, Albertans aged 45 and older had a lower unemployment rate than the provincial working age population in 2015 (Figure 16).

Alberta's unemployment rate at 6% in 2015 was higher by 1.3 percentage points from the previous year (Figure 17). The rate for Albertans aged 45 and older also increased 1.3 percentage points from 2014 to 4.9% in 2015. Over the last ten years, the unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older has been consistently lower than the provincial rate.

## 3. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Industry

In 2013, 72.5% of Albertans aged 45 and older were employed in the Services-Producing sector and 27.5% were employed in the Goods-Producing sector (Figure 18). For those in the Goods-Producing sector, 78% were males. For the Service-producing sector, there were more females than males, at 53.5% compared to 46.5% for men. Combined, both sectors employed more males in the 45 and older age group than females.


There were a total of 902,800 employed Albertans in the 45 and older age group out of which 404,454 were women in 2015. Within the Services-producing sector, the leading industry by employment for women in this age group was Health care and social assistance at 82.8% followed by Educational services (67.1%) and Accommodation and food services (60.9%) in the third place. For men in this age group employed in the Service-producing sector, the leading industry by employment was Transportation and warehousing (75.3%), followed by Wholesale trade (71.5%) and Professional, scientific and technical services (58.4%) in the third place. The Goods-producing sector was dominated by men with construction as the leading industry at

85% followed closely by Utilities at 82.4%.

In 2015, the Agricultural industry had the highest proportion of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 57.6%, followed by Transportation and warehousing at 48.9% and Public administration at 46.4% (Figure 19). Accommodation and Food Services had the lowest percentage of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 21.4%.

## 4. Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and Older by Occupation

The top three occupational groups for Albertans aged 45 and older were Sales and services, 19.1%; Business, finance and administration, 19% and Trades, transportation and equipment operators, 18.3% (Figure 20). The occupational group which employs the least of Albertans aged 45 and older was Processing, manufacturing and utilities (3.2%). Coincidentally, Albertans aged 15 to 44 also had the highest employed Sales and services occupations (25%) and the least in occupations unique to processing, manufacturing and utilities (2.7%).


The proportion of employed Albertans aged 45 and older where higher in Management (10.8%), Business, finance and administration (19%) and Social science, education, government and religion (7.7%) compared to employed Albertans aged 15 to 44.

In 2015, Management had the highest percentage of employed people aged 45 and older at 52.5%, marginally higher than 2014 by 0.2 percentage points. Art, culture, recreation and sport had the least proportion of employed Albertans aged 45 and older at 30.5% (Figure 21).

#### Figure 21 Share of Total Employment by Occupation, 2015




## 5. Educational Levels of Alberta's Labour Force Aged 45 and Older

In 2015, Albertans aged 45 and older accounted for 38.4% of Albertans in the labour force who had less than high school as their highest educational attainment (Figure 22). The proportion for 2014 was 43.7%, 5.3 percentage points lower than in 2015. Albertans aged 45 and older also accounted for 43.2% of the working age population with a post-secondary certificate or diploma and 36.1% with university degree.

Overall, 24.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older had a university degree, which is lower than the previous year by 0.9 percentage points and also below the provincial percentage by 1.8 points.

Between 2005 and 2015, the number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force that had completed high school as their highest level of education attained increased by from 153,100 to 214,000, representing an increase of 39.8% compared 28.5% for Albertans 15 and older (Figure 23).

The number of people aged 45 and older in the labour force that have a university degree increased by 67.6% over the 10-year period, compared to the increase of 69.4% for Albertans 15 and older.

Albertans aged 45 and over who had attained a post-secondary certificate or diploma as their highest level of education increased by 42.3% compared to the overall provincial increase of 33% over the same period.

Among Albertans 45 years and over, those with high school diploma as their highest level of education had the lowest unemployment rate at 4.2%, followed by those with university degree and post-secondary certificate or diploma at 4.9% each in 2015 (Figure 24).

## **Appendix**

All definitions are from the Guide to the Labour Force Survey 2013.pdf, Statistics Canada – Catalogue no. 71-543-GIE.

**Employment Rate**: The number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of working age population (WAP).

**Full-time Employment**: Those persons who usually work 30 hours or more per week at their main or only job.

**Industry**: The general nature of the business carried out by the employer for whom the respondent works (main job only).

**Labour Force**: The labour force is composed of the portion of the WAP who, during the reference week, were employed or unemployed. The reference week is defined as the week containing the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the month in which information is collected for the Labour Force Survey.

**Occupation**: The kind of work persons 15+ years were doing during the reference week, as determined by the kind of work reported and the description of the most important duties of the job. If the individual did not have a job during the reference week, the data relates to the previous job, if that job was held in the past year.

**Part-time Employment**: Consists of all other persons who usually work less than 30 hours per week.

**Participation Rate**: The total labour force expressed as a percentage of the WAP. This measure represents the proportion of the WAP that is either employed or actively seeking employment.

**Unemployment Rate**: The number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the labour force.

**Working Age Population**: Those persons 15+ years, except persons living on Indian reserves, inmates of institutions, and full-time members of the Canadian Armed Forces.

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
