

Education

The number of Albertans aged 45 and older with post-secondary education increased by 256,700 or 81.9% from 2006 to 2016.

In Alberta 23.4% of workers aged 45 and older have a university degree, less than the provincial share at 25.0%.

Albertans aged 45 and older made up 46.2% of all employees with less than a high school education.



Population Statistics

For the purpose of this labour force profile, working age population (or WAP) refers to people who are 15 years and older (please refer to the Appendix for definitions).


Alberta had the lowest proportion of people aged 45 and older in its working age population in 2016 at 45.6%, up from 43.3% in 2006 (Table 1). Newfoundland and Labrador had the highest proportion at 58.9%.

Albertans aged 45 to 54 accounted for 16.5% of the working age population in 2016, down from 19.1% in 2006 (Table 2). Those aged 55 to 64 years were 15.0% of Alberta's working age population in 2016 compared to 12.0% in 2006. Albertans aged 65 years and over accounted for 14.2% of working age population in 2016 compared to 12.2% in 2006.

In 2006, the working age population in Alberta was over 2.6 million (Table 3). By 2016, it had increased by 26.0% to over 3.3 million. In the last 10 years, Canadians aged 45 and older increased by 23.6%, or approximately 3.0 million people. Albertans aged 45 years and over accounted for 11.1% of the total Canadian increase within this age group.

The growth rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 9.3 percentage points higher than the growth rate of Canadians aged 45 and older. During the past 10 years, Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 32.9%, compared to Canada's 23.6%. However, Alberta's working age population increased by 26.0% over this period compared to the increase of 13.3% for Canada's working age population over the same period.

The population of Albertans aged 55-64 increased by 58.1% over the 10 year period compared to 8.7% for the 45-54 year olds and 45.9% for those aged 65 and over (Table 4).

Labour Force Statistics

In 2016, Albertans aged 45 years and older accounted for 38.5% of the provincial labour force and 36.4% of those who were unemployed (Table 5).

In 2016, Albertans aged 65 years and over had the lowest unemployment rate at 5.0% (Table 6). However, they had the lowest participation and employment rates when compared to those aged 45-54 years and 55-64 years.




Albertans aged 45 and older had the highest participation rate in Canada at 61.2% (Figure 1). This was 8.0 percentage points higher than the rate for Canadians aged 45 and older.

The participation rate of Albertans aged 45-54, at 87.4%, was the highest among the three age groups and was 14.9 percentage points higher than the provincial rate, 72.5% (Figure 2).

Participation Rate of People Aged 45 and Older by Province, 2016 Figure 1




Participation Rate by Age Group, Alberta, 2016 Figure 2




For both males and females, Albertans aged 45 and older had a lower participation rate than the provincial counterparts' average (Figure 3). Females aged 45 and older had a participation rate of 54.6%, which was 13.3 percentage points below the rate for males aged 45 and older.

In 2016, Albertans aged 45 years and older had the highest employment rate among all provinces at 56.5% (Figure 4). This was 6.4 percentage points higher than the Canadian average for people aged 45 and older.

Participation Rate by Sex Figure 3




Employment Rate of People Aged 45 and Older by Province, 2016 Figure 4




In 2016, the employment rate of Albertans aged 45-54 years at 80.8% was the highest among the three age groups and was 14.2 percentage points higher than the provincial rate at 66.6% (Figure 5).

The employment rate of females aged 45 and older was 11.6 percentage points lower than their male counterparts and 15.9 percentage points lower than the provincial rate 66.6% (Figure 6).

In 2016, the proportion of employment that is full-time was highest among those aged 45-54. The proportion of employment that is part-time among those aged 65 years and older was more than double the provincial level of 18.6% (Table 7).

The proportion of part-time employment among those aged 65 years and older was **more than**double the provincial level.

Albertans aged 45 and older had a higher proportion of full-time employment than Albertans aged 15 years and over (Table 8). The share of Alberta males aged 45 and older in full-time employment was 88.7% compared to 72.5% for females aged 45 and older.



The unemployment rate of Albertans aged 45 and older was 7.7% in 2016, the fourth highest in Canada, following Newfoundland and Labrador's 13.4%, Prince Edward Island's 10.6%, and New Brunswick's 9.4% (Figure 7).


Alberta had the **fourth highest** unemployment rate in the country

The unemployment rates for Albertans aged 45-54, and 65 years and older were lower than the provincial rate at 8.1%, in 2016 (Figure 8). The unemployment rate for Albertans aged 55-64 was 0.5 percentage points higher than the provincial rate, at 8.6%.

Unemployment Rate by Age Group, 2016 Figure 8




Alberta's unemployment rate at 8.1% in 2016 increased by 2.1 percentage points from the previous year (Figure 9). The rate for Albertans aged 45 and older increased by 2.8 percentage points to 7.7% in 2016 from 2015. Over the last 10 years, unemployment rate for Albertans aged 45 and older was consistently lower than the provincial rate.

Employment of Albertans Aged 45 and older by Industry

In 2016, 73.9% of Albertans aged 45 and older were employed in the Services-Producing sector while the rest were employed in the Goods-Producing sector (Table 9). Males accounted for 77.2% of Albertans aged 45 and older who were employed in the Goods-Producing sector and females accounted for 22.8%. In the Services-Producing sector, the male share of employed aged 45 and older was 47.3% and 52.7% were female.

Of the 394,000 employed female Albertans aged 45 and older, 58.3% were employed in the following five main industries: Health Care and Social Assistance; Retail Trade; Educational Services; Professional, Scientific and Technical Services; and Finance, Insurance, Real Estate and Leasing.

The following five industries employed 50.3% of male Albertans aged 45 and older: Construction; Transportation and Warehousing; Professional, Scientific and Technical Services; Forestry, Fishing, Mining, Oil and Gas; Manufacturing; and Professional, Scientific and Technical Services.



In 2016, the Agricultural industry had the highest proportion of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 61.8%, followed by Transportation and Warehousing, at 49.2% (Figure 10). Accommodation and Food Services had the lowest percentage of Albertans aged 45 and older, at 20.3%, followed by Retail Trade, at 33.1%.

The Agriculture industry had the **highest**proportion of Albertans aged 45 and older in Alberta.

Education Levels of Alberta's Labour Force Aged 45 and Older


In 2016, Albertans aged 45 and older accounted for 46.2% of Albertans in the labour force who had less than high school as their highest educational attainment (Figure 11). They also accounted for 50.1% and 42.7% of Albertans in the labour force with a post-secondary certificate or diploma and university degree, respectively.

Overall, 23.4% of Albertans aged 45 and older had a university degree, less than the provincial share at 25.0%.

Between 2006 and 2016, the number of Albertans aged 45 and older in the labour force that had completed high school as their highest level of education attained increased by 28.1% compared to 17.9% for Albertans 15 and older (Table 10). Similarly, the number of people aged 45 and older in the labour force that have a university degree increased by 58.5% compared to an increase of 67.0% for Albertans 15 and older. Albertans aged 45 and over who had attained a post-secondary certificate or diploma as their highest level of education increased by 41.4% compared to the overall provincial increase of 33.8% over the same period.

Among Albertans 45 years and over, those with a post-secondary certificate or diploma had the lowest unemployment rate at 7.0%, followed by those some post-secondary education at 7.7% in 2016 (Table 11).

Appendix

All of the following definitions are from the **Guide to the Labour Force Survey**, Statistics Canada.

Employment Rate:

The number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over.

Full-time Employment:

Those persons who usually work 30 hours or more per week at their main or only job.

Industry:

The general nature of the business carried out by the employer for whom the respondent works (main job only).

Labour Force:

The labour force is the portion of the civilian, non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the survey reference week, were employed or unemployed. The reference week is defined as the week, usually containing the 15th day of the month, in which information is collected for the Labour Force Survey.

Part-time Employment:

Consists of all other persons who usually work less than 30 hours per week.

Participation Rate:

The total labour force expressed as a percentage of the population aged 15 years and over. This measure represents the proportion of the said population that is either employed or actively seeking employment.

Working Age Population:

Those persons 15+ years except persons living on Indian reserves, inmates of institutions, and regular members of the Canadian Armed Forces.

Average Hourly Wage:

Based on hourly wage before taxes and other deductions, and include tips and commissions. Only persons who are an employee are included in the average.

Occupation:

The kind of work persons 15+ years were doing during the reference week, as determined by the kind of work reported and the description of the most important duties of the job. If the individual did not have a job during the reference week, the data relates to the previous job, if that job was held in the past year.
