2. Industry's Growth:

- This industry accounted for 5.1% of total employment in Alberta in 2011.
- Employment in the Transportation and Warehousing industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 2.1% from 2011 to 2015.
- This industry is expected to account for 5.1% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

3. Facts, Trends and Outlook:

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Transportation and Warehousing industry accounted for 5.5% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2011, up from 5.4% in 2001. The industry's share of Alberta's total employment decreased from 6.1% in 2001 to 5.1% in 2011.

Employment in 2011 was 2.3% higher than its level in 2010. Over the last ten years, employment increased from 99,700 people in 2001 to 107,300 people in 2011. There were 85,700 employees in the industry in 2011 out of whom 92.2% were permanent and 7.8% were temporary. Self-employed people accounted for 20.1% of total employment in the industry in 2011.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2011-2015*, employment growth in the following occupations is expected to be less than 2.7%, the average for all occupations: Motor vehicle and transit drivers; Transportation officers and controllers; Supervisors, railway and motor transportation; and Train crew operators. Employment growth in Other transport equipment operators and related workers; and Managers in construction and transportation occupations is expected to exceed this average.

Note: Statistics Canada's survey methodology for determining establishment size differs from the one it uses in the Labour Force Survey to determine total employment. As a result, the total number of employees by establishment size will not be the same as total employment in the combined industry, except by coincidence.

2. Demographics: Gender and Age:

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Transportation and Warehousing industry in 2011 was as follows:

women employed: 25,200 people, or 23.5%men employed: 82,100 people, or 76.5%

In Alberta, women accounted for 44.9% and men made up 55.1% of total employment.


