For four years now the Working Well program has been delivering community-based workshops and providing well owners with the information and tools they need to properly care for their wells. The Working Well program is helping to ensure safe and secure groundwater supplies for all Albertans.

2011-2012 Program Report

The Working Well program includes four elements or tools for extending key messages to water well owners: hands-on workshops for well owners, interactive activities and exhibits, information resources, and community outreach. Workshops are the cornerstone of the program, and the primary tool for engaging well owners. The following is an overview of the information collected and results achieved from the workshops conducted between April 1, 2011 and March 31, 2012.

Workshop Facts, Figures and Feedback

Evaluation is a key strategic priority of the Working Well program. Workshop statistics, as well as participant and host feedback is collected to:

- Track performance of and improve workshops to help achieve Working Well program outcomes.
- Maintain accountability and credibility through transparent reporting on program performance.
- Provide the rationale for continued program support by partners.

Participant Reaction

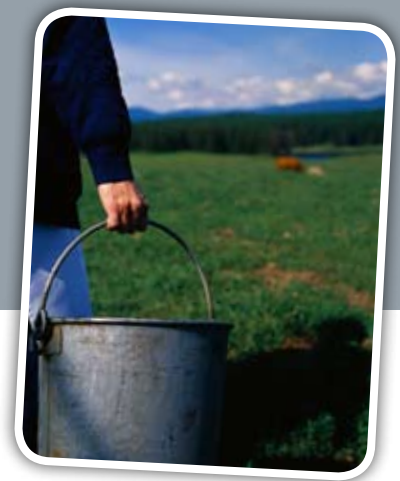
Overall, participants continue to be supportive of the workshops and appreciative of the information provided. Many participants valued the hands-on element of the draw your well exercise, the displays and well model, and the general knowledge they gained about how water wells work.

Overall, participants felt the workshops were thorough and informative, very well prepared, well presented and worth their time to attend.

Most participants felt that the workshop was worthwhile and provided valuable and useful take-home resources (i.e. the workshop binder and fact sheets). They also expressed appreciation for the presence of knowledgeable, experienced staff (including drillers and AHS staff), and recognized the effort that goes into preparing and delivering the workshops.

Participant Learning

- 65% of participants indicated the workshop increased their understanding of how groundwater works either somewhat or a great deal.
- Slightly more than 63% of respondents felt their understanding of how their well works increased somewhat to a great deal.
- Almost 93% of respondents felt they had 'somewhat' or a 'great deal' better understanding of their drilling report after the workshop.
- Nearly 70% of participants indicated their understanding of common well problems increased a great deal.
- Almost three quarters (72%) of respondents said their understanding of well maintenance, monitoring and management increased a great deal.
- 99% of participants indicated the workshop provided information that will be helpful in maintaining and managing their water wells.



Participant Action

- A significant majority (91%) indicated the Draw your Well Exercise helped them better understand their drilling report.
- Slightly more than one quarter of respondents (26%) indicated they had old, unused wells on their property. Of those who have old unused wells, 8% indicated that since taking the workshop, they have taken steps to have those old, unused wells plugged.
- Two thirds of participants (67%) said they have not tested their well water since attending the workshop.
- 74% indicated that they had looked at/inspected their well since the workshop.
- 83% of respondents keep records for their well. This is a significant increase over the number of respondents (55%) who, in the pre-workshop checkup survey indicated they did not keep records for their wells.
- Since the workshop, 84% of respondents have checked to ensure their wells are at least the minimum setback distances.
- Slightly more than half (51%) of respondents have shock chlorinated their wells since the workshops. Of those who have not shock chlorinated their wells, 51% indicated they planned on doing so since attending the workshop.
- 100% of participants surveyed indicated they would recommend the workshop to others.
- 82% of participants have shared what they learned at the workshop with others.

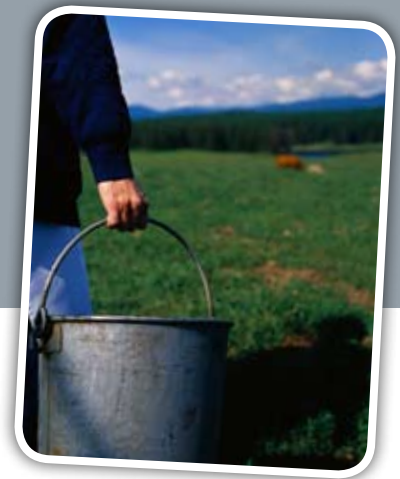
Delivery Staff

Did you Know?

Since the program started in 2008:

- more than 3,400 Albertans have attended a Working Well workshop.
- 1,062 follow-up surveys have been conducted with those workshop participants who requested a follow-up call.
- 120 workshops have been delivered in 132 communities across the province.
