#### Outdoor Recreation Checklist for Provincial Crown Land

Plan to have a safe and enjoyable trip



#### Know Before You Go

- Know the regulations of the area you are planning to visit. Download Alberta's Guide to Outdoor Recreation on Crown land.
- Have a map of the area and plan your route on trails designated for your activity.
- ☐ Check for area and trail closures by visiting alberta.ca/ PublicLandClosures or albertaparks.ca/advisories.
- ☐ Know the terrain and be prepared for all possible weather conditions.
- Be sure to pack:
  - Food and water
  - First Aid kit
  - GPS or compass
  - Communication device (Spot, InReach)
  - Flashlight, and a lighter or matches.
- Purchase your <u>Kananaskis</u>
   Conservation Pass if entering Kananaskis Country and the Bow Valley.
- ☐ Tell someone where you are going and when you will return.
- □ Be BearSmart. Carry bearspray year-round, and know how to use it.



#### Be Lawful

- Don't disturb artifacts, fossils, livestock, property or wildlife.
- ☐ It is illegal to discharge a firearm within 400m of a provincial trail.
- Get permission before accessing leased Crown land, and follow conditions.
- ☐ Follow all posted signs and markers.
- ☐ It is illegal to chase wildlife.
- □ Keep pets under control.
- Do not use exploding targets or fireworks.

- ☐ Follow the rules for random camping:
  - Within a Public Land Use Zone (PLUZ), camp at least 1km away from Provincial Recreation Areas and Public Land Recreation Areas, and 30m (100 ft) from a waterbody
  - Within Wildland Provincial Park, camp at least 1km from a park campground
  - Avoid camping near well sites and other industrial infrastructure

Non-compliance may result in a fine.



#### Be Respectful

- Share the trail and respect other users.
- Always leave gates and fences as you found them – open or closed.
- Stay alert and look for signs of wildlife.
- Never feed or approach wildlife.



## **Camping Information**

- Ensure your camping facilities are temporary and portable.
- ☐ Keep your campsite clean.
- Purchase a Public Lands Camping Pass if you are random camping along the Eastern Slopes.
- ☐ Limit your stay:
  - To 16 days in provincial parks.
  - To 14 days on public land. After 14 days, random campers must move by 1km for 72 hours.
- ☐ Camp in open areas with hard surfaces.
- Store food, pet food and garbage in a bear proof container or in a bear hang away from camping units.



# **Campfire Information**

- Check for fire bans and conditions at Albertafirebans.ca.
- Bring firewood with you from a local source if it's not provided. Do not cut down live trees without a permit.
- ☐ Do not use lighter fluid or gasoline as a fire starter.
- □ Supervise your fire at all times.

- Have equipment to extinguish your fire. Stir it, soak it and stir it again until ashes are cool to the touch.
- ☐ Use existing fire pits when possible, or select a safe site for your fire:
  - On sand, gravel or clay
  - Away from debris that can burn
  - Away from structures and equipment.



## **Leave Nothing Behind**

- Bring containers for garbage and recycling, and take it home with you to properly dispose of.
- □ Be prepared for no washroom facilities when you're out in the backcountry. Dig a hole at least 15 cm deep away from any trails and bury your waste with dirt or other organic matter or properly pack out and dispose of sewage.



### Off-Highway Vehicles

- Equip vehicles with insurance, registration, licence plate, headlamp, rear lamp and spark arrestor.
- ☐ Prevent start of a wildfire keep your machine free of debris.
- □ Wear protective clothing and a CSA approved helmet.
- Keep your wheels out of the water.
   Only use approved watercourse crossings shown on provincial maps.
- Use trails designated for your vehicle and stay on trail tread. Obey signs for weight, width, or other size restrictions.
- Do not drink and drive.
- ☐ Check for motorized recreation on public land rules and updates.
