
Prevalence of Current Daily Smokers by Sex, Alberta

- The prevalence of current daily smokers¹ is an estimate of the percentage of the population (12 years and over) who currently smoke on a daily basis.
- The percentage of current daily smokers in Alberta has been relatively stable from 2008 to 2013.
- Males are more likely to be current daily smokers than females. In 2013, 18.6% of males were current daily smokers compared to 11.7% for females.

Note: Survey respondents may indicate if they do not want their data shared with provincial health ministries. In that case, these individuals would not be included in the files shared with the provinces. Therefore, readers are cautioned that the proportions obtained for this Alberta Official Statistic (from the provincial share files) may vary slightly from those reported by Statistics Canada (CCHS Master File).
