WTI increased \$2.31 over the week and closed at US\$70.87 on Thursday. The WTI-WCS differential closed at US\$13.10 per barrel, narrower than a week ago.

Monthly change in employment (thousands) 30





Economic Activity

The Alberta Activity Index increased in February (+0.1% month-over-month), and was up 3.6% from a year ago. Alberta's real GDP by industry increased by 5.1% in 2022, following 4.9% growth in 2021.

Year-over-year % change




Business Output

Manufacturing shipments decreased 9.6% m/m to \$8.8 billion in February. However, they were up 2.5% from a year ago.

Alberta goods exports increased 11% m/m in March to \$16.2 billion. However, they were down 5.9% from a year ago.

Year-over-year % change





Average Weekly Earnings

Average weekly earnings in Alberta decreased 0.5% m/m in February to \$1,259. They were up 1.3% from a year ago.

Population Growth

Alberta's population was 4,647,178 as of January 1, 2023, an increase of 3.7% from the year prior. During the last 12 months, Alberta welcomed 99,974 net international migrants and saw a net inflow of 45,526 interprovincial migrants.

Inflation


The consumer price index in Alberta increased 3.3% y/y in March, down from 3.6% y/y in February.

Retail Sales

Alberta retail sales decreased 0.9% m/m to \$8.6 billion in February. Compared to a year ago, sales were up 10%.

Housing Market

Alberta housing starts decreased 13% m/m in March to 26,686 units (SAAR). They were down 17% from a year ago. The number of home sales in the resale market was down 1.1% m/m to 5,272 units in March, and was down 42% y/y.

Year-over-year % change






REAL GDP BY INDUSTRY

(2022, year-over-year growth)




CPI INFLATION

(March 2023, year-over-year growth)




UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

(April 2023)




EMPLOYMENT

(April 2023, year-over-year growth)




AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS
