

HOW TO MAKE RECYCLED PAPER

- 1. Tear up scrap paper into small pieces. Using different colours and types of papers will add colour and texture to your recycled paper.
- 2. Put pieces in a bowl and add warm water.
- 3. With the help of an adult, pour into a blender or mash to make a pulp (looks like porridge).
- 4. Put a screen (window screens work well) into a large pan (a cake pan is perfect) or box with a garbage bag.
- 5. Add a few centimetres of water in the pan to cover the screen.
- 6. Pour pulp onto the screen and spread evenly.
- 7. Lift screen out of water slowly, let water drip from paper.
- 8. Lav a tea towel over the screen and press evenly.
- 9. Keeping the towel pressed down over the pulp, carefully lift and turn the screen and lay down on a flat
- 10. Carefully, lift the screen from tea towel.
- 11. Place a second tea towel over the layer of pulp.
- 12. Use a rolling pin to gently squish out excess water from the paper.
- 13. Remove from tea towels and let dry for 24 hours.

DECORATING YOUR RECYCLED PAPER

- 1. Evenly spread shaving cream on cookie sheet (must be foam shaving cream not gel).
- 2. Add 8-10 drops of food colouring (maximum of 3 colours).
- 3. Make swirly designs in cream with a toothpick.
- 4. Lay your dried, recycled paper on top.
- 5. Lift off and use rubber scraper to remove the shaving cream.
- 7. Let dry.



Cookie Catcher

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Cut on the dotted line.
- 2. Place the cookie catcher face down.
- 3. Fold the square diagonally both ways to create creases in the shape of an "X". These will be your guides for folding.
- 4 Using the guides fold all four corners into the centre. This will make a smaller square.
- 5. Flip over and fold all four corners to the centre again.
- 6. Fold your square in half to make a rectangle.
- 7. Stick pointer fingers and thumbs into the pockets.
- 8. Push together to join the four corners in the middle.
