2. Industry's Growth:

- This industry accounted for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2012.
- Employment in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 1.1% from 2011 to 2015.
- This industry is expected to account for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

3. Facts, Trends and Outlook:

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry accounted for approximately 0.3% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2011, the same as in 2001. The industry's share of Alberta's total employment was 0.2% in 2012, the same is in 2002.

Employment in 2012 was 8.8% higher than its level in 2011. Between 2002 and 2012, employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people) remained the same at 3,700 people. Data on employees and self-employed people were not available due to the industry's small sample size.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2012-2016*⁷, employment growth in the Logging and forestry workers occupations is expected to be below 2.4%, the average for all occupations.

2. Demographics: Gender and Age:

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Forestry, Logging with Support Activities industry in 2012 was as follows:

■ men employed: 3,100 people, or 83.8%

In Alberta, women accounted for 44.8% and men made up 55.2% of total employment.


