### 2. Industry's Growth:

- This industry accounted for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2011.
- Employment in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 1.1% from 2011 to 2015.
- This industry is expected to account for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

### 3. Facts, Trends and Outlook:

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry accounted for approximately 0.3%<sup>6</sup> of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2011, the same as in 2001. The industry's share of Alberta's total employment was 0.2% in 2011, the same as in 2001.

Employment in 2011 was the same as in 2010. Over the last ten years, employment declined from 3,800 people in 2001 to 3,400 people in 2011. Data on employees and self-employed people were not available due to the industry's small sample size.

### 2. Demographics: Gender and Age:

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Forestry, Logging with Support Activities industry in 2011 is as follows:

- women employed: 11.8%
- men employed: 3,000 people, or 88.2%

In Alberta, women accounted for 44.9% and men made up 55.1% of total employment.


