2. Industry Growth:

- Employment in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry is expected to grow on average 7.4% annually from 2010 to 2013.
- Over 800 jobs will be created from 2010 to 2013.
- Employment is expected to increase to about 3,600 by 2013.

Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry accounted for approximately 0.2% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2009, the same as in 1999. The industry's share of total employment decreased from 0.3% in 1999 to 0.1% in 2009.

Employment in 2009 was down 22.2% compared to its level in 2008. Over the last ten years, employment declined form 4,300 people in 1999 to 2,800 people in 2009. Despite this trend, the industry is expected to show modest employment growth between now and 2013 as the economy rebounds from the recession. Increased activity in domestic housing construction, printing and related support activities, and the manufacturing of wood products, furniture and other related products, pulp, paper, paperboard and converted paper products will be key determinants of employment growth in the industry.

The *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2009-2013* projects a slight increase in the demand for logging and forestry workers and logging machinery operators over the next three years.

Note: Statistics Canada's survey methodology for determining establishment size differs from the one it uses in the Labour Force Survey to determine total employment. As a result, the total number of employees by establishment size will not be the same as total employment in the industry, except by coincidence.

In Alberta, women accounted for 45.4% and men made up 54.6% of total employment.


