Developed in 1979 the reserve consists of poor quality farmland and public land which had to be cleared. The reserve has 13,750 acres (5,564.4 hectares) which have been developed as tame pastures.

Wolf Lake was one of the first reserves to have a development plan prepared before any actual development took place. The plan required the setting aside of large areas of the reserve for watershed protection and wildlife habitat. Much of the reserve is not fenced, unlike reserves developed earlier: only the actual developed pastures are fenced. The requirement to provide this multiple-use aspect resulted in the construction of miles of fence and numerous dugouts. These would not have normally been required under the previous development system.

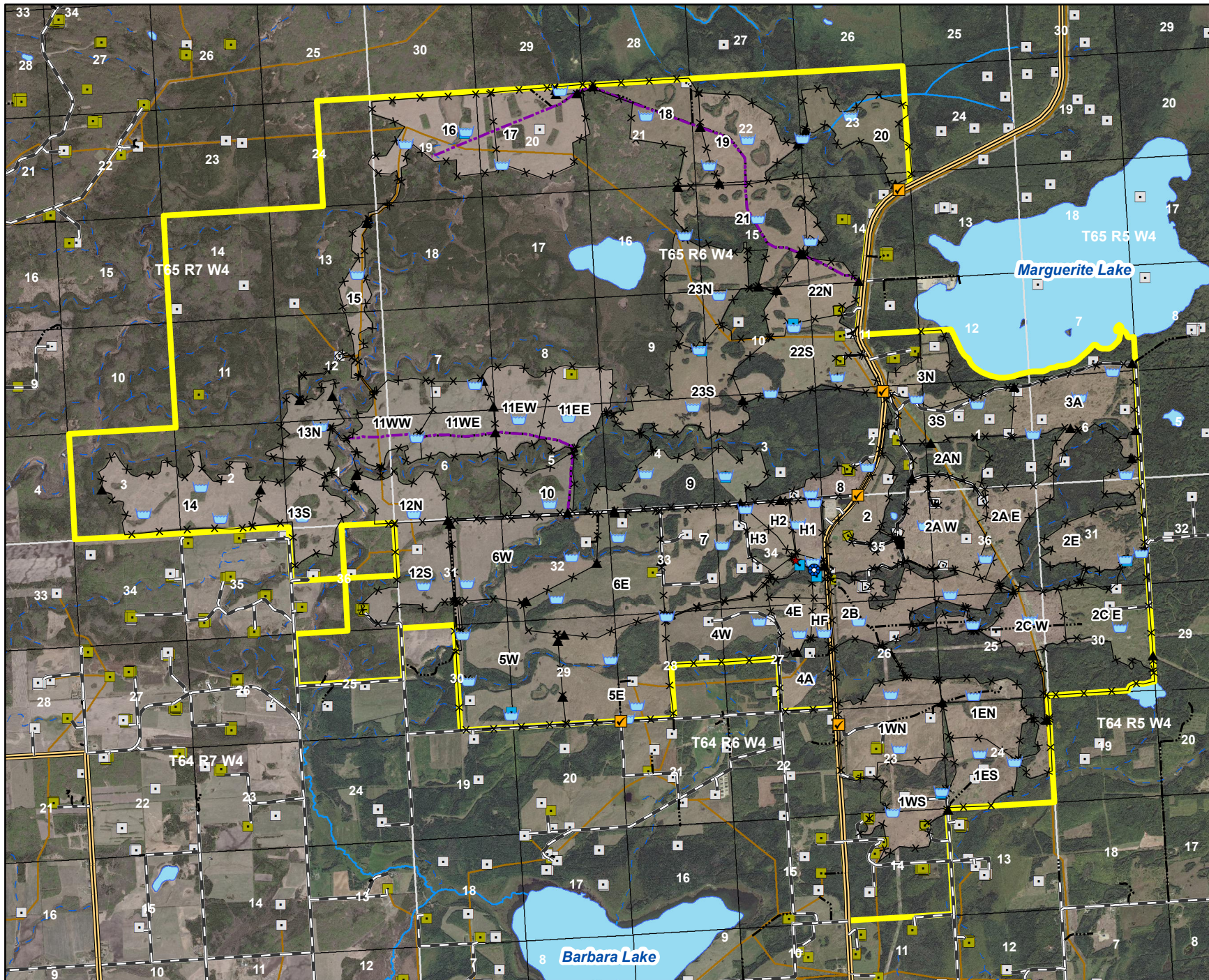
