Pinhorn Provincial Grazing Reserve opened for limited grazing in 1961, and formally established in 1962. The reserve has an area of 76,681 acres (31,013 hectares) and is located along the border, directly south of Medicine Hat. The reserve is crossed by the Milk River. Its name originated from an old post office located on the south side of the river which honored a veterinary inspector who served in the North West Mounted Police. Pinhorn inspected all the livestock at this Canadian port of entry.
