The Public Administration industry¹ in Alberta includes federal, provincial and local government services such as:

- defence services;
- police, judicial, correctional and other protective services;
- labour, employment and immigration services;
- foreign affairs and international assistance;
- fire-fighting services; and
- regulatory services.

2. Industry's Growth:

- This industry accounted for 4.1% of total employment in Alberta in 2012.
- Employment in the Public Administration industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 1.3% from 2011 to 2015.
- This industry is expected to account for 4.1% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

3. Facts, Trends and Outlook:

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Public Administration industry accounted for 3.9% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2011, up from 3.8% in 2001. The industry's share of Alberta's total employment increased from 3.9% in 2002 to 4.1% in 2012.

Employment in 2012 was 4.5% higher than its level in 2011. Over the last ten years, employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people) increased from 65,800 people in 2002 to 88,600 people in 2012. There were 88,600 employees in the industry in 2012 of whom 88.5% were permanent and 11.5% were temporary. There were no self-employed people in this industry.

The percentage of multiple jobholders in the industry is obtained by dividing the number of multiple jobholders in the industry by total employment in the industry. This calculation method also applies to the percentage of employees under union coverage and the percentage of employees working overtime per week.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2012-2016*⁶, employment growth in the following occupations is expected to equal or exceed 2.4%, the average for all occupations: Managers in public administration; Police officers and firefighters; Other protective services; and Policy and program officers, researchers and consultants.

2. Demographics: Gender and Age:

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Public Administration industry in 2012 was as follows:

women employed: 46,800 people, or 52.8%men employed: 41,800 people, or 47.2%

In Alberta, women accounted for 44.8% and men made up 55.2% of total employment.
