Labour Market Notes

Labour market continues to march ahead

Alberta


- **Strong momentum in employment.** Employment in Alberta increased (+17,700 month-over-month or m/m) in August, the strongest monthly gain since February, and the largest of all provinces.
- Outsized increase in full-time positions. Full-time positions expanded for the ninth month in a row (+24,800 m/m) and accounted for all of the monthly gain. Meanwhile, part-time positions retreated (-7,100 m/m).
- Strong employment growth. Alberta has added 78,100 jobs since December and employment was up 3.5% year-to-date (YTD) in August. The job gains so far this year have been spread between the services (+40,600) and goods (+37,500) sectors, led by gains in the private sector (+78,400) and full-time positions (+99,500).
- Goods sector remains a source of strength. Goods sector employment (+11,800 m/m) continued the momentum from July and has advanced for six of the last eight months. Strong monthly growth in construction, manufacturing, and natural resources overwhelmed a pullback in agriculture.
- Widespread gains in the services sector. Employment in the services sector (+5,800 m/m) advanced for the third consecutive month. The gains were led by wholesale & retail trade, other services, and professional & scientific services. The latter ended three months of decline and remains the strongest source of year-over-year (y/y) growth.
- **Unemployment rate pulls back.** The unemployment rate declined from 6.1% in July to 5.7% in August, reflecting the strong employment gain and a pullback in the labour market participation rate.
- **Hours ease.** Despite the increase in employment, total hours worked retreated (-1.2% m/m) in the month. However, they were up 1.2% compared to August 2022.
- **Wages move higher.** Average hourly wages increased 0.4% m/m to \$34.86 and were up 4.6% y/y.

Canada

- **National employment eases.** Nationally, employment increased by 39,900 in August, with gains in eight provinces.
- **Unemployment holds steady.** The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.5% in August.
- **Wages inch up.** Nationally, average hourly wages moved higher to \$33.47 (+0.7% m/m) and were up 4.9% y/y.



Monthly change in employment, August 2023




CHART 3: UNEMPLOYMENT AND PARTICIPATION RATES PULL BACK

Monthly change in labour market indicators, August 2023




CHART 2: UNEMPLOYMENT REMAINS BELOW PRE-COVID LEVELS

Number of employed and unemployed (thousands)




CHART 4: LABOUR FORCE GROWTH STILL STRONG DESPITE LAGGING PARTICIPATION RATE

Participation rate and year-over-year growth in labour force




CHART 5: HOURLY WAGE TICKS UP IN AUGUST

Average hourly wage and y/y growth, non-seasonally adj




CHART 6: JOB VACANCY AND UNEMPLOYMENT RATES CONTINUE TO DIVERGE

Change in employment since August 2022




CHART 8: PROFESSIONAL, SCIENTIFIC & TECHNICAL SERVICES DRIVE Y/Y GROWTH

Change in employment since August 2022




CHART 9: GOODS AND SERVICES SECTORS UP Y/Y

Alberta employment indexed to August 2022, by sector




CHART 10: FULL-TIME EMPLOYMENT SURGES

3-month average employment indexed to August 2022, by region




CHART 12: YOUTH EMPLOYMENT CATCHING UP

Alberta employment indexed to August 2022, by age group






CHART 13: STRONG ANNUAL GROWTH IN ALBERTA

Percentage change in employment since August 2022




CHART 14: GROWTH IN ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT OUTPACES NATIONAL AVERAGE

Year-over-year growth in employment by province




CHART 15: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE LOWER THAN 2019 AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province




CHART 17: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS FROM 2019; STILL THE HIGHEST

Employment rates by province





CHART 18: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE EXCEEDS NATIONAL AVERAGE
