Labour Market Notes

Labour market pulls back

Alberta

- Alberta's labour market falls back. Employment in the province decreased 37,800 month-over-month (m/m) in September after months of strong employment gains.
- Annual employment growth remains strong. Despite the monthly pull back, Alberta has added 40,300 jobs since December and employment was up 3.4% year-to-date (YTD). The YTD growth has been spread between the services (+22,300) and goods sector (+17,900), led by gains in the private sector (+31,800) and full-time positions (+36,900).
- Construction weighs down goods sector. Goods sector employment lost momentum and declined (-19,600 m/m) after advancing for three months. Losses were concentrated in construction (-18,700 m/m) and manufacturing (-2,800 m/m), overwhelming the gain in the forestry, fishing, mining, oil, and gas sector (+2,000 m/m).
- Broad based decline in services sector. Employment in the services sector also dropped (-18,300 m/m) after three months of upward momentum. The decline was led by wholesale & retail trade (-14,900), with professional, scientific & technical services other services and public administration also contributing to the decline. Educational services partially offset the decrease after reversing most of its August decline.
- Full-time positions drop sharply. After expanding for the ninth month in a row, full-time positions fell sharply in the month (-62,600 m/m). This was partly offset by hiring of part-time positions (+24,800 m/m).
- **Unemployment rate unchanged.** The unemployment rate remained at 5.7% in September despite the fall in employment as the labour force fell sharply (-39,900 m/m).
- Hours worked jump. Despite the decrease in employment, total hours worked advanced (+9.4% m/m) in the month and were up 4.8% compared to September 2022.
- **Wages advance.** Average hourly wages increased 2.2% m/m to \$35.61 and were up 5.7% y/y.

Canada

- **National employment advances.** Nationally, employment increased by 63,800 in September, with gains in seven provinces.
- **Unemployment rate holds steady.** The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.5% in September.
- **Wages inch up.** Nationally, average hourly wages moved higher to \$34.01 (+1.6% m/m) and were up 5.0% y/y.



Monthly change in employment, September 2023




CHART 2: BOTH EMPLOYMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT PULL BACK

Number of employed and unemployed (thousands)




CHART 3: UNEMPLOYMENT RATE STEADY AS PARTICIPATION RATE DECLINES

Monthly change in labour market indicators, September 2023




CHART 4: PARTICIPATION RATE DROPS AS Y/Y LABOUR FORCE GROWTH SLOWS

Participation rate and year-over-year growth in labour force




CHART 5: HOURLY WAGE SPIKES IN SEPTEMBER

Average hourly wage and y/y growth, non-seasonally adj




CHART 6: JOB VACANCY RATE FALLS AS UNEMPLOYMENT RATE HOLDS STEADY

Unemployment rate and job vacancy rate






CHART 7: ANNUAL GAINS LED BY PRIVATE SECTOR, FULL-TIME, AND SERVICES SECTOR JOBS

Change in employment since September 2022




CHART 8: HEALTH CARE DRIVES Y/Y EMPLOYMENT GROWTH

Change in employment since September 2022




CHART 9: GOODS AND SERVICES SECTORS UP Y/Y

Alberta employment indexed to September 2022, by sector




CHART 10: PART TIME EMPLOYMENT RECOVERS RECENT LOSS

3-month average employment indexed to September 2022, by region




CHART 12: EMPLOYMENT FALLS AMONG YOUTH AND OLDER WORKERS

Alberta employment indexed to September 2022, by age group






CHART 13: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT GROWTH ON PAR WITH NATIONAL AVERAGE

Percentage change in employment since September 2022




CHART 14: GROWTH IN ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT AT OR ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Year-over-year growth in employment by province




CHART 15: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE LOWER THAN 2019 AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province




CHART 16: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE CONVERGING TO NATIONAL AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province




CHART 17: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS FROM 2019; STILL THE HIGHEST

Employment rates by province





CHART 18: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE EXCEEDS NATIONAL AVERAGE
