

Deaths of Children, Youth and Young Adults Receiving Intervention Services

April 1, 2014 to March 31, 2024

The Ministry of Children and Family Services is committed to publicly reporting the deaths of children, youth and young adults that occurred while receiving child intervention services.

Type of Intervention

Table 1 provides data over a 10-year period for the following intervention types:

- **Initial Assessment:** The period of time when families are assessed to determine the right level of support to meet identified needs and if intervention is required.
- **Not In Care:** Children who remain at home while the family receives services to resolve matters of concern.
- **In Care:** Children who have been placed away from home on a temporary or permanent basis. These placements may include kinship homes, foster homes, group homes or treatment facilities.
- **Post 18 Intervention Supports:** Young adults aged 18 and over who were previously involved in Child Intervention can access Post 18 Intervention Supports to enable their transition to full independence. New supports for young adults were launched in 2022-23 under the Transition to Adulthood (TAP) program.

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Manner of Death

The Manner of Death (MOD) is determined by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner (OCME) under most circumstances. Results may change from month to month as a result of OCME determinations.

In some cases, such as when a child dies in hospital while under the care of medical professionals, an attending physician may determine the MOD as “Natural” and no further review is required by the OCME. For these cases, the death is classified as “Death not investigated by the OCME”. Additionally, the OCME is unable to investigate deaths that occur outside of Alberta and a confirmed MOD may not be provided by the other jurisdiction.
