Government of Alberta Annual Report 2013-14 Quick facts

Immediate and ongoing flood relief

- Almost \$3B was spent in flood support for Albertans, small business owners and communities.
- Emergency funds were provided to more than 56,000 Albertans evacuated from their homes to cover immediate needs.
- Small Business Rebuilding Program was put in place to help more businesses and not-forprofits recover from the floods.
- **Modular classrooms** a to accommodate students in High River and Calgary.
- Support to rebuild and repair First Nations homes damaged by the June flood.
- The Flood Recovery and Reconstruction Act
 was passed to support better management
 of flood-way development, and flood
 mitigation programs were created to protect
 homeowners from future floods.

Investing in families and communities

- Six major health projects were completed in 2013-14 including:
 - Central Alberta Cancer Centre in Red Deer
 - Strathcona Community Hospital
 - Alberta Children's Hospital's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit
 - Bow Island Health Centre
 - University of Alberta Hospital's Endoscopy Suite Expansion
 - Alberta Hospital Food Services
- Immunized more than 1 million Albertans against influenza.
- More than 1,000 Albertans have benefited from the Insulin Pump Therapy program.
- Added 335 continuing care spaces, for a total of 3,369 new spaces since 2010.
- More than \$74 million was spent developing approximately 982 new affordable supportive living spaces in seven communities.
- Twinned 48 km of Highway 63 and rehabilitated 438 km of roads.

Securing Alberta's Economic Future

- The number of registered Aboriginal apprentices has increased 50% since 2009 to 3,292.
- Government committed \$200 million towards the Centre for Applied Technologies at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology.
 The centre will accommodate the equivalent of 5,000 full-time students, including 1,700 new seats.
- The Schulich School of Engineering at the University of Calgary is being renovated to include two new floors of research labs and a major modernization of the existing building, increasing its capacity by at least 400 undergraduate and graduate students.
- The Final Mile Rural Connectivity Initiative has enabled access to high-speed Internet for over 98% of Alberta households.
- The Results-based Budgeting (RBB) program has completed its review of close to 220 Government of Alberta programs and services in 2013-14, bringing the total number of programs and services reviewed to approximately 370.

Advancing world-leading resource stewardship

- More than 900 micro-generation sites have been approved with a combined total capacity of approximately 4.8 Megawatts. This represents an increase of almost 250 sites and 1.5 megawatts from March 2013.
- The Alberta Abroad Program successfully negotiated and filled 16 externship positions with host organizations in Shanghai, Beijing, Hong Kong, Tokyo, Hokkaido, Singapore, Munich, Geneva, New York City, and Washington, D.C.
- The Government of Alberta signed Long-Term Arrangements with the eight Metis Settlements and the Metis Settlements General Council, laying out a 10-year funding commitment aimed at promoting the long-term economic sustainability of the Settlements.
- The government continued to open new markets by advocating for expanded rail access, a Canadian energy strategy and promoting our international strategy.
