Total irrigated area in 2012 = 1.68 million acres or 5.25% of the total cultivated land area in Alberta.

In 2012, the irrigation districts in Alberta accounted for 1.37 million acres. The breakdown of irrigated crop acres was: forages (32%), cereals (31%), canola (14%), canola seed (3%), dry beans (3%), potatoes (3%), sugar beets (2%), alfalfa seed (2%), and all other crops (10%). Types of irrigation systems practiced were: centre pivot sprinkler (76.0%), side-roll-wheel-move sprinkler (13.6%), gravity or "flood" (9.6%), and other irrigation systems (0.8%).

Farm Cash Receipts (\$ Millions)

Alberta's farm cash receipts (FCR) reached a new record high of \$12.0 billion in 2012, up 14.1% from 2011, and led all provinces in total FCR. The marked increase was due to substantially higher crop market receipts coupled with increases in livestock market receipts and program payments to producers. FCR is the sum of crop and livestock market receipts plus direct program payments to producers. Alberta accounted for 22.4% of total Canadian FCR in 2012, and led the nation with \$3.4 billion in cattle and calf receipts.

Livestock Industry

Alberta continues to be the largest beef producing province in Canada. As of July 1, 2012, the province led the nation in cattle and calf inventories and accounted for 40.0% of the national herd. In 2012, nearly three-quarters of Canadian beef processing occurred in Western Canada (72.4%), with the vast majority concentrated in Alberta.

Food and Beverage Manufacturing Sales (\$ Millions)

In 2012, Alberta food manufacturing sales reached a record \$11.8 billion or 16.1% of the province's total manufactured goods (\$73.5 billion). The leading food sub-sector was meat product manufacturing (\$5.9 billion) which accounted for one-half of provincial food sales.

International Agri-Food Exports (\$ Millions)

In 2012, Alberta exports of primary and processed agricultural and food products (agri-food) reached a record \$9.2 billion, up 14.3% from \$8.1 billion in 2011. High commodity prices and larger export quantities contributed to the increase. Wheat remained the number one export product, followed by canola seed and beef. Wheat exports at \$2.3 billion grew 18.8% in value and 21.1% in quantity. Exports of canola seed reached a record of \$1.9 billion. The value of these exports grew 13.4% and quantity was up 5.7%. China was the largest customer of canola seed, followed by Japan, traditionally the number one export market. Exports of live cattle increased in 2012, while beef exports declined. The United States continues to be Alberta's largest export market, accounting for 32.2% of total agri-food exports, followed by China (17.9%), Japan (14.6%) and Mexico (6.9%).
