Farm Cash Receipts (\$ Millions)

Alberta's farm cash receipts (FCR) totalled \$9.0 billion in 2010, down 3.9% from 2009. The drop in receipts was fuelled by lower crop market receipts and program payments, more than offsetting gains in livestock market receipts. However, despite the decline, these FCR are the third highest on record, following 2008 and 2009. FCR is the sum of crop and livestock market receipts plus direct program payments to producers. Alberta accounted for 20.2% of total Canadian FCR in 2010, and led the nation with \$3.1 billion in cattle and calf receipts.

International Agri-Food Exports (\$ Millions)

In 2010, Alberta exports of primary and processed agricultural and food products (agri-food) fell 9.6% to \$6.7 billion from \$7.4 billion in 2009. Lower exports of major grains and oilseeds, combined with weak prices, contributed to the decline. Wheat exports fell 32.7% in value and 19.5% in quantity. Despite the decline, wheat remained Alberta's number one export product in 2010, followed by beef and canola seed. On the positive side, increases in exports were recorded for beer, prepared animal feed, tallow, crude canola oil, raw hides and skins, live cattle, beef and pork. The United States continues to be Alberta's largest export market, accounting for 36.2% of total agri-food exports, followed by China (15.3%), Japan (12.3%), and Mexico (6.8%).
