Farm Cash Receipts (\$ Millions)

Alberta's total farm cash receipts (FCR) was \$13.6 billion, 4% below the 2017 high and third highest on record. The decline was fuelled by lower crop market receipts and program payments to producers more than offsetting higher livestock market receipts. FCR is the sum of crop and livestock market receipts plus direct program payments to producers. Alberta accounted for 21.8% of total Canadian FCR in 2018, and led the nation with \$4.9 billion in cattle and calf market receipts.

Alberta continues to be the largest beef producing province in Canada. As of July 1, 2018, the province led the nation in cattle and calf inventories and accounted for 40.7% of the national herd. In 2018, over three-quarters of Canadian beef processing occurred in Western Canada (76.4%), with the vast majority concentrated in Alberta.

International Agri-Food Exports (\$ Millions)

In 2018, Alberta exports of primary and processed agricultural and food products (agri-food) reached another record at \$11.6 billion, up by 3.2% over 2017. Gains were reported mainly in exports of value-added products, such as crude canola oil: oilseed cake and meal; beef; processed potatoes; and prepared cereals, among others. Exports of beef, the largest value-added product, were 17.5% higher in value and 8.1% in quantity. Exports of primary commodities declined by 2.4% due to lower exports of canola seed and live cattle. Among these commodities, wheat continued to be the largest exports followed by canola seed. Exports of wheat rose in both, value and quantity, while canola seed declined. Crops showing increases included oats: dry peas: hay and fodder; barley; and mustard seed. The United States continues to be Alberta's largest market, accounting for 37.5% of total agri-food exports. The next largest markets were China (22.6%), Japan (11%) and Mexico (4.8%). Exports to China rose sharply by 32.4% mainly due to larger exports of canola cake and meal; crude canola oil; dry peas; wheat; barley; and beef.
