#### Overview:

The Construction industry<sup>1</sup> in Alberta includes establishments that:

- construct, repair or renovate residential buildings (i.e. houses, apartment buildings, condominiums);
- construct, repair or renovate business and commercial buildings (i.e. office towers, shops, malls);
- construct, repair or renovate industrial buildings (i.e. oil refineries, petrochemical plants, power plants);
- perform engineering works (i.e. highways, bridges, pipelines); and
- subdivide and develop land.

#### 2. Industry's Growth

- The Construction industry accounted for 11.3% of total employment in Alberta in 2014.
- Employment in is this industry expected to grow at an average rate of -1.0% from 2015 to 2019<sup>4</sup>.
- The industry is expected to account for 10.8% of total employment in Alberta in 2015.

#### 3. Facts, Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Construction industry accounted for approximately 10.8% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2014, up from 7.7% in 2004. Its contribution to Alberta's total employment increased from 9.1% in 2004 to 11.3% in 2014.

Total employment (the total number of employees and self-employed people, 15 years and over) in 2014 was 5.1% higher than its level in 2013. Over the last 10 years, employment increased by 95,300 from 2004, a 59.2% increase. There were 256,400 employed in the industry in 2014, of whom 94.1% were full time and 5.9% were part time.

This calculation method also applies to the percentage of employees under union coverage and the percentage of employees working overtime per week.

According to *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2013-2023*<sup>6</sup>, employment growth in the following occupations: Plumbers, pipefitters and gas fitters; Carpenters and cabinetmakers; Masonry and plastering trades; Electrical trades; Heavy equipment operators; Crane operators, drillers and blasters; and Other construction trades, is expected to be above Alberta's average rate for all occupations of 1.6%.

#### 2. Demographics: Gender and Age

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Construction industry in 2014 was as follows:

women employed: 37,800 people, or 14.7%men employed: 218,500 people, or 85.2%

Overall in Alberta, women accounted for 44.8 % and men made up 55.2% of total employment (for all industries).


