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Preface

The Public Accounts of Alberta are prepared in accordance with the *Financial Administration Act* and the *Government Accountability Act*. The Public Accounts consist of the annual report of the Government of Alberta and the annual reports of each of the 20 Ministries.

The annual report of the Government of Alberta released June 21, 2007 contains the Minister of Finance's accountability statement and the consolidated financial statements of the Province. The *Measuring Up* report released June 28, 2007 provides a comparison of the actual performance results to the desired results set out in the government's business plan.

This annual report of the Ministry of Executive Council contains the Minister's accountability statement, the audited financial statements of the Ministry and a comparison of actual performance results to desired results set out in the Ministry's business plan. This Ministry annual report also includes other financial information as required by the *Financial Administration Act* and *Government Accountability Act*, either as separate reports or as a part of the financial statements, to the extent that the Ministry has anything to report.

Management's Responsibility for Reporting

The Ministry of Executive Council includes

- Executive Council/Office of the Premier and
- the Public Affairs Bureau.

The executives of the individual entities within the Ministry have the primary responsibility and accountability for the respective entities. Collectively, the executives ensure the Ministry complies with all relevant legislation, regulations and policies.

Ministry business plans, annual reports, performance results and the supporting management information are integral to the government's fiscal and business plans, annual report, quarterly reports and other financial and performance reporting.

Responsibility for the integrity and objectivity of the financial statements and performance results for the Ministry rests with the Premier, Minister Responsible for Executive Council. Under the direction of the Minister Responsible, I oversee the preparation of the Ministry's annual report, including financial statements and performance results. The financial statements and the performance results, of necessity, include amounts that are based on estimates and judgments. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the government's stated accounting policies.

As Deputy Minister, in addition to program responsibilities, I establish and maintain the Ministry's financial administration and reporting functions. The Ministry maintains systems of financial management and internal control which give consideration to costs, benefits and risks that are designed to:

- provide reasonable assurance that transactions are properly authorized, executed in accordance with prescribed legislation and regulations, and properly recorded so as to maintain accountability of public money;
- provide information to manage and report on performance;
- safeguard the assets and properties of the Province under Ministry administration;
- provide Executive Council, Treasury Board, the Minister of Finance any information needed to fulfill their responsibilities; and
- facilitate preparation of Ministry business plans and annual reports required under the *Government Accountability Act*.

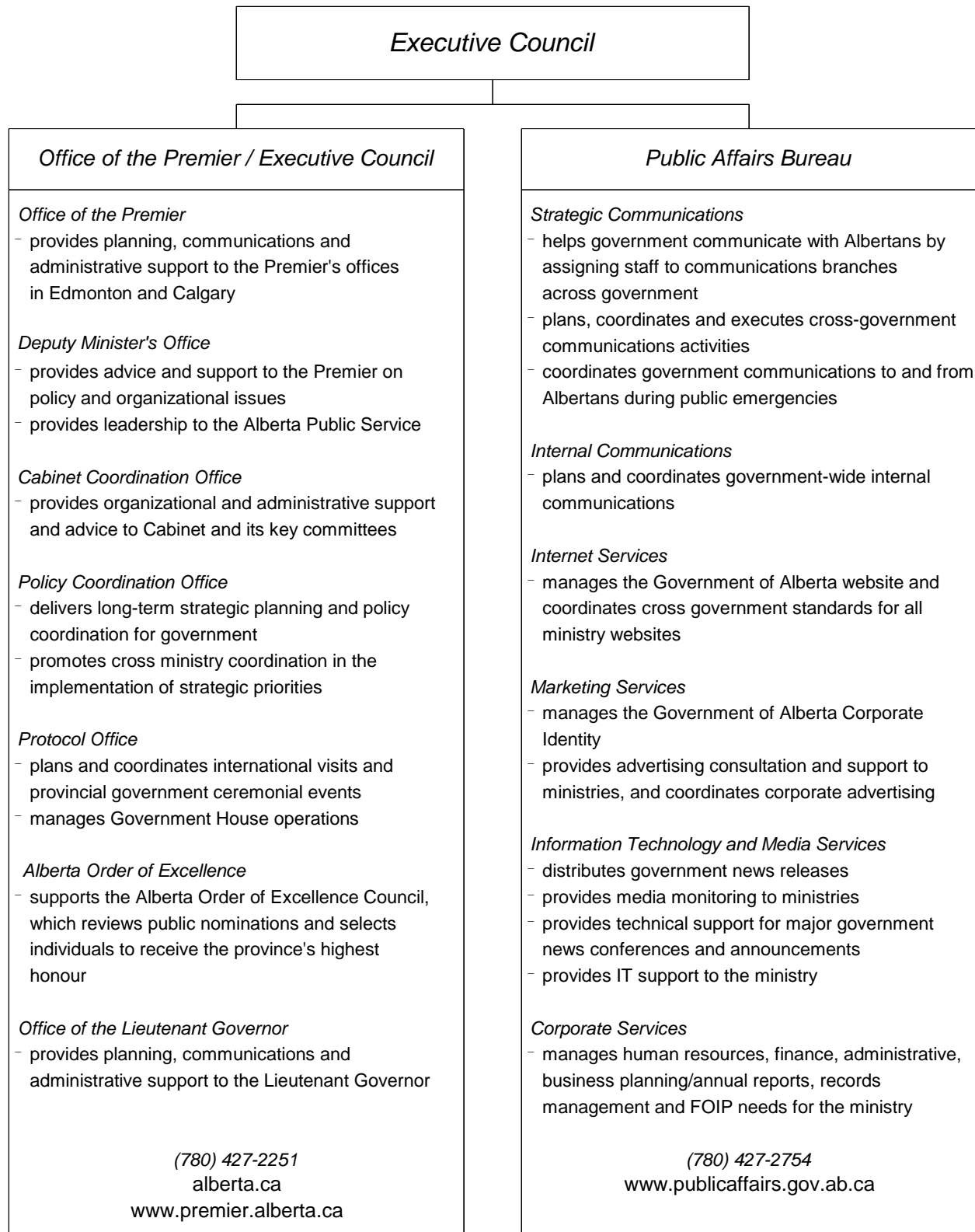
In fulfilling my responsibilities for the Ministry, I have relied, as necessary, on the executive of the individual entities within the Ministry.

Operational Overview

The Ministry of Executive Council includes the Office of the Premier/Executive Council, which provides organizational and administrative support and advice to Cabinet; delivers long-term strategic planning and policy coordination for government; plans and coordinates international visits and provincial government ceremonial events; and provides planning, communications and administrative support to Office of the Premier, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor and the Alberta Order of Excellence Council.

It also includes the Public Affairs Bureau, which helps government communicate with Albertans; develops communications for government's long-term strategic plans and priority initiatives; supports internal government communications; coordinates advertising and the corporate identity program; provides Albertans with two-way access to government through central communications and information resources; and ensures effective communications with Albertans during public emergencies.

2006-07 Key Activities

Office of the Premier/Executive Council

Democratic Reforms

As part of the government's priority to govern with integrity and transparency and commitment to democratic reform, staff in the Office of the Premier worked with parties of the Legislative Assembly to establish an all-party agreement on democratic reform initiatives for the spring and fall sittings of the Legislature. The agreement is focused on revitalizing the Legislative Assembly and highlighting its important role in democratic governance. As part of the agreement, four new party policy field committees were established; a fixed budget date was introduced; and other changes were made to the sitting schedule to help address work/life balance issues, allow MLAs more time in their constituencies and make participation in politics more attractive.

Board Governance Review

There are more than 130 agencies, boards and commissions in the province that manage over 50% of the government's expenditures. The Alberta government has established a task force to provide recommendations on how to improve the transparency, accountability and governance of its agencies, boards and commissions. A Board Governance Secretariat supports the activities of the task force.

The task force will develop an inventory of existing agencies, boards and commissions; consult with stakeholders; and develop a report and recommendations for consideration by government in the fall of 2007.

Policy Coordination Office

For 2006-07, the Policy Coordination Office:

- supported the annual strategic planning process through leadership on the Government of Alberta Environmental Scan and the identification of long-term strategic issues, and co-led the development of the three-year Government of Alberta business plan;
- provided support for the transition to the new government leadership;
- supported the identification and implementation of government priorities;
- supported decision-makers by working with departments to prepare policy proposals and by preparing briefing notes for Cabinet, Agenda and Priorities Committee and Cabinet Policy Committees;
- promoted a corporate, cross-ministry approach to policy development that is aligned with government priorities; and
- completed research to assess policy capacity within the Alberta Public Service and to provide recommendations to maintain and strengthen the public service's support of elected officials.

Protocol Office

In 2006-07, the Protocol Office coordinated 50 visits of international dignitaries to Alberta, including the Governor General of Canada, the United States Secretary of Energy and the President of Tanzania as well as other heads of states, foreign ministers, ambassadors and consuls general. The office also provided planning and advice for provincial government ceremonial events including the installation of the new Premier and Cabinet.

The Alberta Order of Excellence

In April 2006, the Alberta Order of Excellence Council unveiled remodelled members' galleries at the Northern and Southern Jubilee Auditoria in Edmonton and Calgary. The galleries, which feature wall-mounted photos and an interactive electronic kiosk, will better promote the order and the accomplishments of its members.

In the 2006-07 year, the Alberta Order of Excellence also invested a record nine individuals in a ceremony in Edmonton on October 19.

Public Affairs Bureau

The Public Affairs Bureau places great importance on ensuring Albertans have access to government information and opportunities to provide feedback. Staff developed a strategic communications plan to enhance the quality of government communications and provide Albertans with improved avenues to access information and give their input. A redesigned government website has made it easier for Albertans to find information online, including enhanced accessibility features for people with visual and motor impairments. A new regular Report to Albertans offers updates on government progress on projects and priorities and gives additional opportunities for feedback. A communications policy was also developed to clearly define for Albertans what they can expect in terms of communicating with their government.

Bureau staff provided communications support for a variety of public consultations on government initiatives, including: secondary housing suites, land use, affordable housing, workforce development and education, climate change and oil sands development.

Communications branches also supported programs and initiatives that support all five of the government's priorities. This includes increasing awareness through media relations and advertising for programs like the province's plan to respond to West Nile Virus, traffic safety campaigns and environmental education.

Bureau staff assisted with ongoing government communications in a number of ways, including the Alberta Connects e-mail service, which responded to more than 20,000 e-mails in 2006-07. Staff also developed and implemented a new process for news release distribution to streamline and coordinate government communications.

Two websites were launched to educate children and their parents about keeping safe online. The peer-to-peer website *weron2u.ca* has received more than 350,000 visits since it was launched in May 2006, and *badguypatrol.ca* has received more than 207,000 visits since its launch.

To help Albertans get the information they need to assist people affected by family violence, a toll-free information line, redesigned website and advertising campaign were launched. The website *familyviolence.gov.ab.ca* has received close to 200,000 visits and more than 600 people have called the information line. In addition, communications staff helped launch a new 24-hour toll-free helpline to help young people who are struggling with bullying.

Communications staff helped coordinate promotion of Alberta's participation at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival in Washington, D.C. and Alberta Week in Washington. Staff also provided communications support for 54 international visits, including U.S. Energy Secretary Bodman and for the Premier's mission to France and Ukraine in 2006. Staff also played a key role in the planning and development of communications on the new Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement between the Government of Alberta and the Government of British Columbia.

To achieve higher productivity and improved service to Albertans, communications staff have developed an internal communications plan to keep employees informed on government policies and directions.

Staff also provided communications support for government emergency planning, including the creation of the new Alberta Emergency Management Agency and the Alberta Support and Emergency Response Team (ASERT), which serves as a centre of excellence in environmental emergency response and planning in Alberta.

Message from the Deputy Minister

There were significant changes to the Government of Alberta in 2006-07, including a new Premier; government committee system and membership; departmental organizational structure as well as many new priorities and initiatives. Throughout these changes, the department of Executive Council played several key roles in assisting with the government transition. Executive Council staff provided the new Premier with advice on a number of the changes and assisted in their implementation. Staff also worked with all ministries to prepare and coordinate policy proposals that ensured decision makers had the best possible information upon which to make decisions and to facilitate cross-ministry collaboration.

Executive Council supported the Board Governance Task Force, which was established to provide recommendations to improve the transparency, accountability and governance of the government's agencies, boards and commissions. The task force is part of the Premier's priority to govern with integrity and transparency.

Executive Council played a leading role in ensuring that Albertans received clear, consistent and timely communications about government programs and services. Albertans were also made aware of how they could provide input on issues of importance to them. This year's initiatives included the development of a strategic communications plan and policy, and a redesign of the government website. Executive Council also led the development of an internal communications plan to ensure employees are informed about government policies and directions.

This ministry has continued to champion initiatives that position the Alberta Public Service as an employer of choice. Through a variety of initiatives, including increased learning and development opportunities for all staff and the implementation of our shared values of respect, accountability, integrity and excellence, the Alberta Public Service is proudly working together to build a stronger province for current and future generations.

I would like to thank Executive Council staff for another year of hard work and many accomplishments. I am extremely proud of the dedication and commitment to excellence that is clearly demonstrated in the department of Executive Council and throughout the public service.

Report of the Auditor General on the Results of Applying Specified Auditing Procedures to Performance Measures

To the Members of the Legislative Assembly

Management is responsible for the integrity and objectivity of the performance results included in the *Ministry of Executive Council's 2006–2007 Annual Report*. My responsibility is to carry out the following specified auditing procedures on performance measures in the annual report. I verified:

Completeness

1. Performance measures and targets matched those included in Budget 2006. Actual results are presented for all performance measures.

Reliability

2. Information in reports from external organizations, such as Statistics Canada, matched information that the Ministry used to calculate the actual results.
3. Information in reports that originated in the Ministry matched information that the Ministry used to calculate the actual results. In addition, I tested the processes the Ministry used to compile the results.

Comparability and Understandability

4. Actual results are presented clearly and consistently with the stated methodology and are presented on the same basis as targets and prior years' information.

I found no exceptions when I performed these procedures.

As my examination was limited to these procedures, I do not express an opinion on whether the set of measures is relevant and sufficient to assess the performance of the Ministry in achieving its goals.

Results Discussion and Analysis

2006-07 spending for Executive Council was within budgeted levels. The figures reported above have been restated to reflect the transfer of Corporate Internal Audit Services (CIAS) from Executive Council to the newly formed Treasury Board ministry that took place in December 2006 as part of the reorganization of government.

The reorganization also made it necessary for Executive Council to redefine its core businesses.

- Core Business One, which previously described the role of CIAS was changed to –“Support strategic planning, policy development and decision-making for the Government of Alberta” to reflect the role the Ministry plays in ensuring consistency with the overall government strategic direction.
- Core Businesses Two and Three related to the Public Affairs Bureau’s role were consolidated into a single descriptor – “Help government ministries communicate with Albertans.”

A new goal linked to the redefined core business one was added– “Government policy and planning are coordinated and effective.” As well, the Public Affairs Bureau’s two goals - “Public satisfaction with government communications in priority areas” and “Public satisfaction with access to government information” - were combined and restated as “Public satisfaction with government communications.”

In prior years, the results for the measures related to public satisfaction with government information were reported separately. For 2006-07, the questions asked remained the same; however, the results have been combined and reported as “Public satisfaction with government communications.” This adjustment better reflects the amalgamated goals resulting from the changes after the government reorganization.

The result for the measure rating public satisfaction with government communications increased by 2% but remains below the target. Although the target is very aggressive for this type of measure, work will continue to ensure that Albertans are able to access the information they need from government.

User satisfaction with the government homepage remains at last year's level and within 2% of the target. The number of respondents in the public survey who indicated that they had visited the Government of Alberta site increased slightly over the previous year from 61% to 62%. A recently completed website redesign and work that's underway to implement a more consistent look and feel to government websites will make it easier for users to get the information they need.

Changes were made to the government client survey.

- Questions related to the Service Alberta Call Centre and telephone directories were removed as that area transferred to Service Alberta on April 1, 2006.
- The question related to news release distribution was removed as communications branch staff are the major contact point for that service.
- New questions were added to address the increased focus on strategic communications and the added responsibility for government-wide internal communications.

The satisfaction level of government clients dropped slightly from the rating of 91% last year to 88% in 2006-07. The response rate from clients was also 5% lower than the prior year. A number of staff in communications branches were reassigned in December and January as part of the government-wide reorganization and were working with new clients.

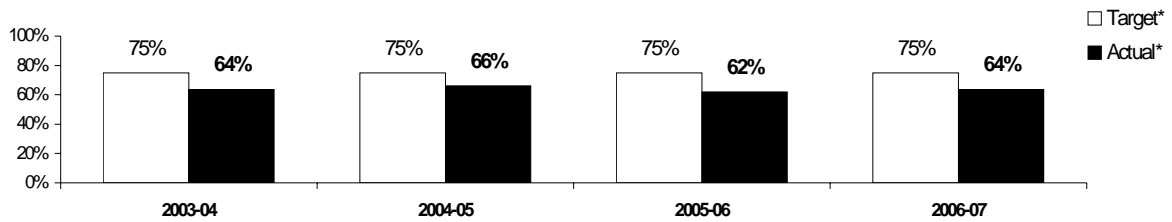

This measure rates Albertans' satisfaction with information they receive directly from government about programs and services.



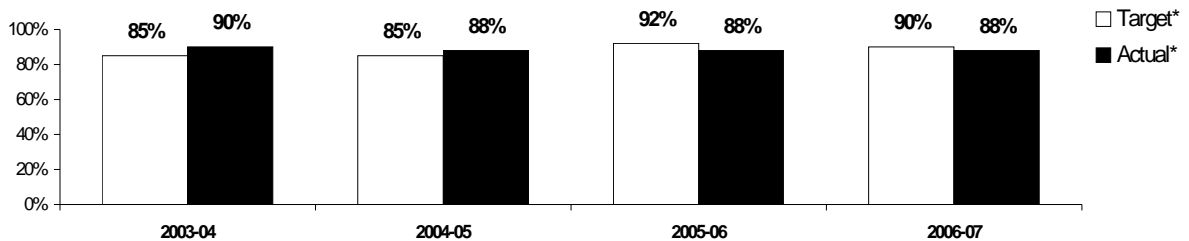

As the main portal to the Alberta government website, the home page offers access to government news as well as to information from ministries across government.



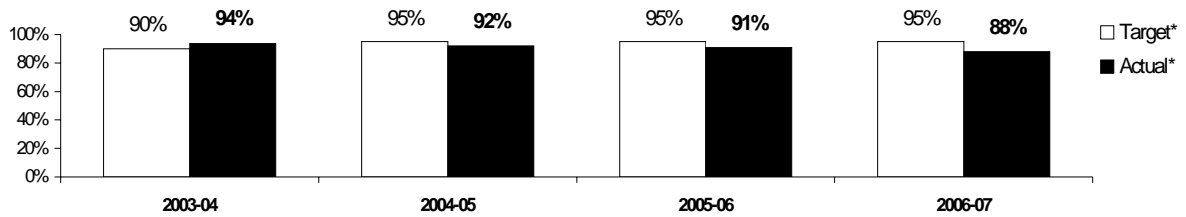

A sample of this size within the given population produces results that are reliable to within plus or minus 3.46% 19 times out of 20. Respondents were first asked whether they had visited the Alberta government website at gov.ab.ca. Those who answered "Yes" were then asked how useful they found the first page in helping them to locate the information they needed by choosing from very useful, somewhat useful, not very useful or not at all useful. No response replies are not included in the calculation of results.

Government Client Satisfaction

This measure rates government client satisfaction levels with communications services provided by the Public Affairs Bureau.

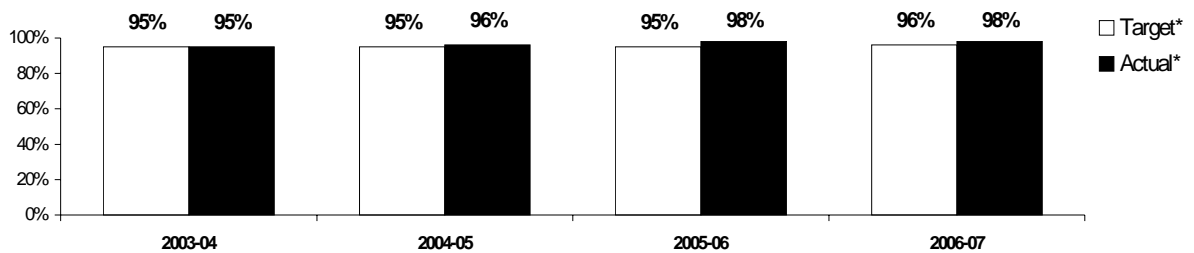

Communications directors compiled lists of 820 departmental clients who were contacted via e-mail and provided with a link to a web address that allowed them to complete their surveys online. The survey was conducted from May 14 to June 14, 2007. Responses were received from 372 clients. The survey results were compiled internally by the Public Affairs Bureau. Respondents were asked to choose from very satisfied, generally satisfied, generally dissatisfied or very dissatisfied. Figures shown reflect the averaged results of multiple questions.

Alberta Connects Efficiency

This measure tracks the percentage of Alberta Connects e-mail questions answered within the target response time of 72 hours. Alberta Connects is an e-mail service that allows Albertans to ask questions about any Alberta government program or service.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2007

NOTE 1 AUTHORITY

The Ministry of Executive Council operates under the authority of the *Government Organization Act*, Chapter G-10, Revised Statutes of Alberta 2000.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND REPORTING PRACTICES

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for the public sector as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants.

(a) Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is the Ministry of Executive Council. This entity consists of the activities of the Office of the Premier/Executive Council and Public Affairs.

All departments of the Government of Alberta operate within the General Revenue Fund (the Fund). The Fund is administered by the Minister of Finance. All cash receipts of departments are deposited into the Fund and all cash disbursements made by departments are paid from the Fund. Net transfer (to) from General Revenues is the difference between all cash receipts and all cash disbursements made.

(b) Basis of Financial Reporting

Revenues

All revenues are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Cash received for which goods or services have not been provided by year end is recorded as deferred revenue.

Expenses

Directly Incurred

Directly incurred expenses are those costs the Ministry has primary responsibility and accountability for, as reflected in the Government's budget documents.

In addition to program operating expenses like salaries, supplies, etc., directly incurred expenses also include:

- pension costs which comprise the cost of employer contributions for current service of employees during the year; and

- valuation adjustments, which include changes in the valuation allowances used to reflect financial assets at their net recoverable or other appropriate value. Valuation adjustments also represent the change in management's estimate of future payments arising from obligations relating to vacation pay, guarantees and indemnities.

Incurring by Others

Services contributed by other entities in support of the Ministry's operations are disclosed in Schedule 6.

Assets

Financial assets of the Ministry are limited to financial claims, such as advances to and receivables from other organizations, employees and other individuals.

Assets acquired by right are not included. The threshold for capitalizing new systems development is \$100,000 and the threshold for all other tangible capital assets is \$5,000. All land is capitalized. The Ministry has no tangible capital assets that meet these thresholds.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recorded to the extent that they represent present obligations as a result of events and transactions occurring prior to the end of fiscal year. The settlement of liabilities will result in sacrifice of economic benefits in the future.

Net Liabilities

Net liabilities represent the difference between the carrying value of assets held by the Ministry and its liabilities.

Valuation of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the amount of consideration agreed upon in an arm's length transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties who are under no compulsion to act.

The fair values of cash, accounts receivable, advances, accounts payable and accrued liabilities are estimated to approximate their carrying values because of the short term nature of these instruments.

NOTE 3 PROGRAM TRANSFER (in thousands)

The responsibility for the administration of Corporate Internal Audit Services is transferred to the President of the Treasury Board effective April 1, 2006, as per Order-in-Council 647/2006.

The responsibility for the administration of Queen's Printer is transferred to the Minister of Service Alberta effective April 1, 2006 as per Order-in-Council 122/2006. Also, the responsibility for the administration of the Service Alberta Call Centre is transferred to Service Alberta.

The comparatives have been restated to reflect as if the Ministry of Executive Council has always existed without the Corporate Internal Audit Services, Queen's Printer and Service Alberta Call Centre on April 1, 2006 and throughout the period covered by these financial statements. This resulted in a decrease in expenses of \$6,636 for the period ended March 31, 2006.

NOTE 5 DEFINED BENEFIT PLANS
(in thousands)

The Ministry participates in the multi-employer Management Employees Pension Plan and Public Service Pension Plan. The Ministry also participates in the multi-employer Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers. The expense for these pension plans is equivalent to the annual contribution of \$1,837 for the year ended March 31, 2007 (2006 - \$1,730).

At December 31, 2006, the Management Employees Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$6,765 (2005 - \$165,895) and the Public Service Pension Plan reported a surplus of \$153,024 (2005 – deficiency of \$187,704). At December 31, 2006, the Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers had a surplus of \$3,698 (2005 - \$10,018).

The Ministry also participates in two multi-employer Long Term Disability Income Continuance Plans. At March 31, 2007, the Bargaining Unit Plan reported an actuarial surplus of \$153 (2006 – actuarial deficiency of \$8,699) and the Management, Opted Out and Excluded Plan an actuarial surplus of \$10,148 (2006 - \$8,309). The expense for these two plans is limited to the employer's annual contributions for the year.
