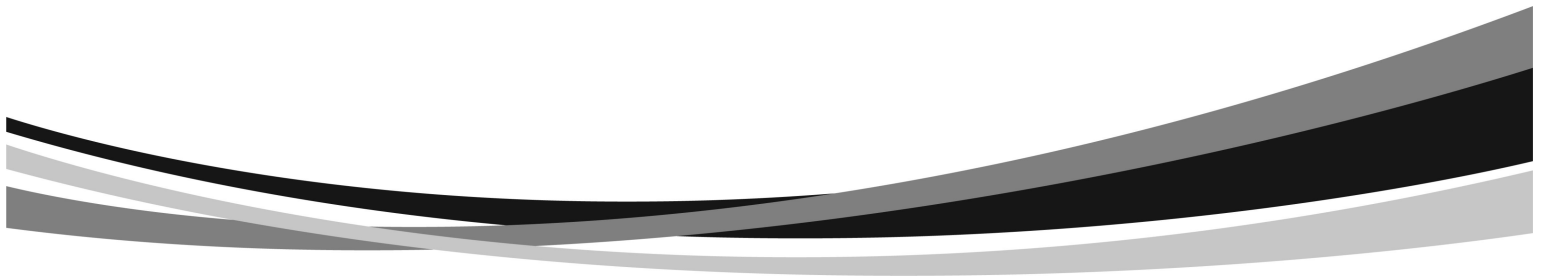

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Preface

The Public Accounts of Alberta are prepared in accordance with the *Financial Administration Act* and the *Government Accountability Act*. The Public Accounts consist of the annual report of the Government of Alberta and the annual reports of each of the 20 ministries.

The annual report of the Government of Alberta released June 24, 2008 contains ministers' accountability statements, the consolidated financial statements of the province and the *Measuring Up* report, which compares actual performance results to desired results set out in the government's business plan.

On March 12, 2008, the government announced new ministry structures. This change did not affect the structure of the Ministry of Executive Council.

This annual report of the Ministry of Executive Council contains the minister's accountability statement, the audited financial statements of the Ministry and a comparison of actual performance results to desired results set out in the Ministry's business plan. This ministry annual report also includes other financial information as required by the *Financial Administration Act* and *Government Accountability Act*, either as separate reports or as a part of the financial statements, to the extent that the Ministry has anything to report.

The ministry's annual report for the year ended March 31, 2008, was prepared under my direction in accordance with the *Government Accountability Act* and the government's accounting policies. All of the government's policy decisions as at September 9, 2008 with material economic or fiscal implications of which I am aware have been considered in the preparation of this report.

Management's Responsibility for Reporting

The Ministry of Executive Council includes:

- Executive Council/Office of the Premier; and
- the Public Affairs Bureau.

The executives of the individual entities within the ministry have the primary responsibility and accountability for the respective entities. Collectively, the executives ensure the ministry complies with all relevant legislation, regulations and policies.

Ministry business plans, annual reports, performance results and the supporting management information are integral to the government's fiscal and business plans, annual report, quarterly reports and other financial and performance reporting.

Responsibility for the integrity and objectivity of the financial statements and performance results for the ministry rests with the Premier, minister responsible for Executive Council. Under the direction of the minister responsible, I oversee the preparation of the ministry's annual report, including financial statements and performance results. The financial statements and the performance results, of necessity, include amounts that are based on estimates and judgments. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the government's stated accounting policies.

As Deputy Minister, in addition to program responsibilities, I establish and maintain the Ministry's financial administration and reporting functions. The ministry maintains systems of financial management and internal control which give consideration to costs, benefits and risks that are designed to:

- provide reasonable assurance that transactions are properly authorized, executed in accordance with prescribed legislation and regulations, and properly recorded so as to maintain accountability of public money;
- provide information to manage and report on performance;
- safeguard the assets and properties of the province under ministry administration;
- provide Executive Council, Treasury Board and the Minister of Finance any information needed to fulfill their responsibilities; and
- facilitate preparation of ministry business plans and annual reports required under the *Government Accountability Act*.

In fulfilling my responsibilities for the ministry, I have relied, as necessary, on the executive of the individual entities within the ministry.

Operational Overview

The Ministry of Executive Council includes the Office of the Premier/Executive Council, which provides organizational and administrative support and advice to Cabinet; delivers long-term strategic planning and policy coordination for government; plans and coordinates international visits and provincial government ceremonial events; supports government agencies, boards and commissions; and provides planning, communications and administrative support to the Office of the Premier, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor and the Alberta Order of Excellence Council.

Executive Council also includes the Public Affairs Bureau, which helps government communicate with Albertans; develops communications for government's long-term strategic plans and priority initiatives; supports internal government communications; coordinates advertising and the corporate identity program; provides Albertans with two-way access to government through central communications and information resources; and ensures effective communications with Albertans during public emergencies.

2007-08 Key Activities

Office of the Premier/Executive Council

Agency Governance Secretariat

The Board Governance Review was undertaken to improve the transparency and accountability of the government's agencies, boards and commissions. In 2007-08, the secretariat provided support to the Board Governance Task Force and supported ministries and agencies throughout the process. Following the completion of the review, the secretariat began the process of managing the implementation of the framework, including development of a database for a government agency inventory; providing support in clarifying mandates and roles of agencies, ministries and government; creating a classification system for agencies with similar functions; and supporting improvements in agency recruitment processes.

Policy Coordination Office

In 2007-08, the Policy Coordination Office supported the annual strategic planning process through leadership on the Government of Alberta Environmental Scan and the identification of long-term strategic issues, and co-led the development of the three-year Government of Alberta Strategic Business Plan. The office supported the identification, implementation and progress tracking of government priorities and supported the transition to a new Government. The Policy Coordination Office also supported decision-makers by working with departments to prepare policy proposals and preparing briefing notes for Agenda and Priorities Committee, Cabinet Policy Committees; the Secretary to Cabinet and the Premier and promoted a corporate, cross-ministry approach to policy development that is aligned with government priorities.

In addition, the office supported the development of a report outlining options to strengthen policy capacity in the public sector and implemented changes to enhance the policy development processes and documents that support decision-making.

Democratic Reform

In 2007-08, Executive Council affirmed its commitment to democratic reform with the re-establishment of all party committees, including the appointment of opposition members as vice-chairs of the Policy Field Committees.

Protocol Office

In 2007-08, the Protocol Office coordinated and provided expertise on more than 50 visits of international dignitaries to Alberta, including the President of the Republic of Hungary, the Prime Minister of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, the Governor of Montana, several ministers of energy as well as other heads of states, foreign ministers, ambassadors and consuls general. The office also coordinated the official reception and dinner following the unveiling of former Premier Klein's portrait and provided planning and advice for provincial government ceremonial events, including the installation of four Cabinet members in June of 2007 at McDougall Centre in Calgary and full Cabinet in March of 2008 at Government House in Edmonton.

The Alberta Order of Excellence

The Alberta Order of Excellence, which recognizes Albertans who have served the province with excellence and distinction, invested seven individuals in a ceremony on June 14, 2007 in Edmonton.

Public Affairs Bureau

The Public Affairs Bureau is committed to ensuring that Albertans receive clear, consistent and timely communications about government programs and have convenient access to the government information they need.

Staff began the implementation of a strategic communications plan, including creating a long-term advertising plan and creating and implementing corporate communications design guidelines. All ministry websites were migrated to the corporate look and feel to make it easier for Albertans to find information online. A survey of Albertans confirmed the success of the redesign, with 55% of respondents agreeing that the design makes it easier to find information, and 51% agreeing that the design makes them feel confident they are getting the correct information. A majority of respondents (54%) agreed that Alberta government websites should have a consistent design and layout. Approximately two thirds (72%) of respondents had visited the website in the past.¹

Public Affairs Bureau staff also developed an annual research plan to improve coordination and practices related to public-opinion research. Communication and implementation of a corporate communications policy was also undertaken.

To ensure government staff has easy access to government news and information, a corporate employee electronic newsletter, *GOA Connector*, was implemented successfully across all ministries.

Bureau staff provided communications support for a variety of public consultations on government initiatives, including the Royalty Review Panel, the Land-use Framework, climate change, license plates and child care. Staff also developed a communications plan to promote the updated First Nations Consultation Guidelines.

Bureau staff assisted with ongoing government communications in a number of ways, including the Alberta Connects e-mail service, which responded to more than 45,000 e-mails in 2007-08.

Communications branches also supported programs and initiatives that support all five of the government's priorities. This includes increasing awareness through media relations and advertising for programs and announcements like Alberta's Health Workforce Action Plan, the response to mountain pine beetle infestations, Alberta's cultural policy, Budget 2007 and bullying prevention.

Media and public were made aware of the progress of the Royalty Review Panel and the government's response to the panel's recommendations through a website, information bulletins that invited Albertans to make submissions, ongoing media relations, webcasts, technical briefings, speaking engagements and strategic planning.

Staff communicated the government's response to the Alberta Affordable Housing Task Force report and government's commitment of \$400 million to Alberta communities through the Municipal Sustainability Initiative.

Staff from a number of ministries developed communications surrounding the oil sands, including a comprehensive website, fact sheets and information for international missions.

Alberta seniors had better access to information through increased awareness and promotion of the Seniors Information Line. Alberta residents with concerns about accommodations, services and licensing to supportive living operators were able to call a new telephone information line to have their issues addressed.

Communications staff provided support for the Community Spirit Program, including the MLA committee review, internal working group, public consultation and the program design and launch. Staff also coordinated an information campaign, including radio advertising, to raise awareness of the enhanced charitable tax credit.

Delivering on government's commitment to support victims of crime, communications staff made information about victim services in Alberta available in 11 languages, and continued its five-year victim services awareness campaign.

Supporting the government's focus on investing in education, communications staff announced significant changes to the student financial assistance program totaling \$25 million, a \$7.9-million investment to support leading-edge projects in post-secondary education, the creation of 32 new schools and 41 modernization projects and scholarships awarded to a record 232 apprentices in Alberta's Apprenticeship and Industry Training program.

In 2007-08, staff provided the Premier and Minister with communications guidance and support for several intergovernmental conferences, including the Western Premiers' Conference in Nunavut, the Alberta – British Columbia joint cabinet meeting, a First Ministers' meeting, and for the Alberta delegation to the Pacific Northwest Economic Region summit in Anchorage, Alaska. Staff plays an ongoing and key role in planning and developing communications materials for the Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement (TILMA) between the governments of Alberta and British Columbia.

As well, communications staff helped advance Alberta's interests abroad by providing support for 68 trade missions and assisted with official foreign dignitaries' visits to Alberta. Staff also actively promoted the role of Alberta's international trade offices and provided communications support to the Alberta Foreign Offices Review Committee.

To support government's priority of building a stronger Alberta, communications staff planned and executed the announcement of the 20-year capital plan, the Value-Added and Technology Commercialization Task Force, the Financial Investment Planning and Advisory Commission and the Alberta Institute for Agriculture, Forestry and the Environment.

To ensure that government recruited and retained the best talent to serve Albertans, communications staff worked on a redesign of the Government of Alberta jobs website to create a more interactive, user-friendly and informative job search experience. The jobs website is the most-visited website in government with an average of 100,000 visitors each month.

Staff also provided communications support for government emergency planning, including announcing disaster recovery programs throughout the year to help residents recover from a series of severe storms.

Message from the Deputy Minister

The 2007-08 fiscal year brought action on government priorities, as well as a new cabinet and a new plan for the province. Before, during and after the transition, Executive Council staff were an important support to government in assisting with planning and changes, and communicating these changes to Albertans.

Executive Council provided strategic planning support, leadership on policy and cross-ministry collaboration and transition support for a new cabinet. This year saw the creation of the Agency Governance Secretariat, which supported the Board Governance Task Force and is now managing the implementation of the framework. Executive Council staff also supported the government's diplomatic activity, helping to coordinate visits of over 50 international dignitaries in 2007-08.

Thanks to the work of the Public Affairs Bureau staff, Albertans were made aware of government plans and priorities through website improvements, two-way communications and media relations. Strategic communications activities provided information on programs and announcements, including the Municipal Sustainability Initiative, Budget 2007 and education investment. Staff also ensured that Albertans had opportunities to have their say through a number of public consultations on topics like the Royalty Review and climate change.

Executive Council also continued to develop internal communications, launching a corporate intranet site and successfully piloting an employee e-newsletter.

I would like to thank Executive Council staff for their hard work throughout this year, and for their ongoing professionalism and dedication.

Report of the Auditor General on the Results of Applying Specified Auditing Procedures to Performance Measures

To the Members of the Legislative Assembly

Management is responsible for the integrity and objectivity of the performance results included in the *Ministry of Executive Council's 2007–2008 Annual Report*. My responsibility is to carry out the following specified auditing procedures on performance measures in the annual report. I verified:

Completeness

1. Performance measures and targets matched those included in Budget 2007. Actual results are presented for all performance measures.

Reliability

2. Information in reports from external organizations, such as Statistics Canada, matched information that the Ministry used to calculate the actual results.
3. Information in reports that originated in the Ministry matched information that the Ministry used to calculate the actual results. In addition, I tested the processes the Ministry used to compile the results.

Comparability and Understandability

4. Actual results are presented clearly and consistently with the stated methodology and are presented on the same basis as targets and prior years' information.

I found no exceptions when I performed these procedures.

As my examination was limited to these procedures, I do not express an opinion on whether the set of measures is relevant and sufficient to assess the performance of the Ministry in achieving its goals.

Results Discussion and Analysis

A measure for Goal 1 “Government policy and planning are coordinated and effective”, will be developed for the 2008-09 Annual Report

The measures related to Goal 2 “Albertans receive clear, consistent and timely communications about government programs and have convenient access to the government information they need” remain the same as the prior year.

- 2a. Public satisfaction with government communications increased by 1% from the previous year but remains below the target. The 75% approval rating target is quite aggressive for this type of measure.
- 2b. Public satisfaction with the government home page is within 5% of the target but 3% below last year’s level. The number of respondents in the public survey who indicated that they had visited the Government of Alberta site increased over the previous year from 65% to 66%. Work continues to complete the migration of all government websites to the corporate standards to make it easier for users to access the information they need online.
- 2c. The satisfaction level of government clients increased slightly from the rating of 88% last year to 89% in 2007-08 but remains below the target. A number of staff in communications branches were reassigned as part of the government-wide reorganization and were working with new clients.

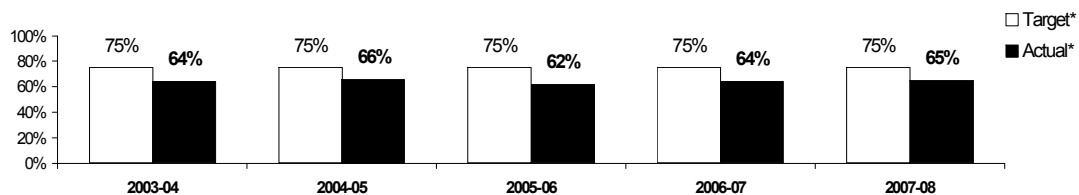
GOAL 2

This measure rates Albertans' satisfaction with information they receive directly from government about programs and services.



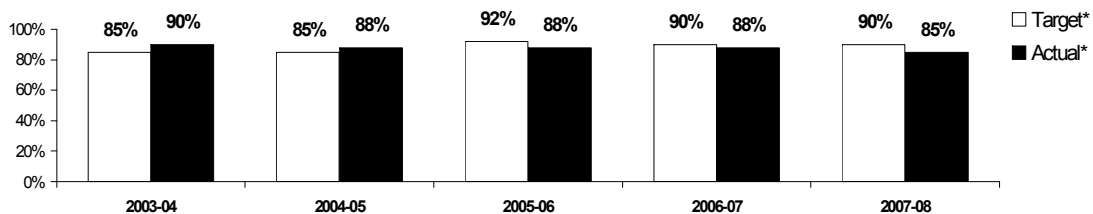

Public Satisfaction with the Government of Alberta Home Page

This measure tracks users' satisfaction with the Alberta government home page by asking how useful they find the page in helping them locate the information they need. As the main portal to the Alberta government website, the home page offers access to government news as well as to information from ministries across government.



(*Represents the total of "very" and "somewhat" useful responses)

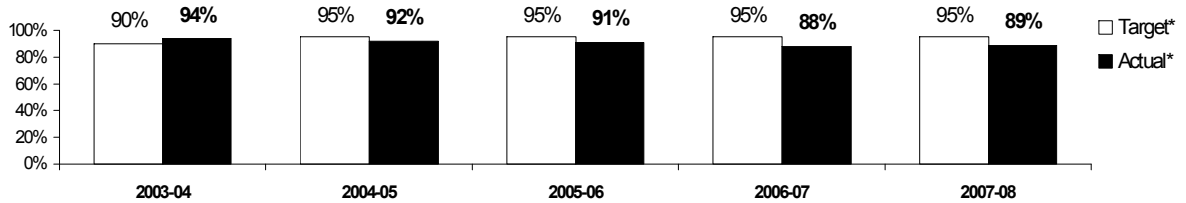

Communications directors compiled lists of 931 departmental clients who were contacted via e-mail and provided with a link to a web address that allowed them to complete their surveys online. Respondents were asked to choose from very satisfied, generally satisfied, generally dissatisfied or very dissatisfied. Figures shown reflect the averaged results of multiple questions.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2008

NOTE 1 AUTHORITY

The Ministry of Executive Council operates under the authority of the *Government Organization Act*, Chapter G-10, Revised Statutes of Alberta 2000.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND REPORTING PRACTICES

These financial statements are prepared primarily in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for the public sector as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (PSAB). The PSAB financial statements presentation standard for government summary financial statements has been modified to more appropriately reflect the nature of the departments.

(a) Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is the Ministry of Executive Council. This entity consists of the activities of the Office of the Premier/Executive Council and Public Affairs Bureau.

All departments of the Government of Alberta operate within the General Revenue Fund (the Fund). The Fund is administered by the Minister of Finance. All cash receipts of departments are deposited into the Fund and all cash disbursements made by departments are paid from the Fund. Net Financing provided from (for) General Revenues is the difference between all cash receipts and all cash disbursements made.

(b) Basis of Financial Reporting

Revenues

All revenues are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Cash received for which goods or services have not been provided by year end is recorded as unearned revenue.

Expenses

Directly Incurred

Directly incurred expenses are those costs the Ministry has primary responsibility and accountability for, as reflected in the Government's budget documents.

In addition to program operating expenses like salaries, supplies, etc., directly incurred expenses also include:

- pension costs which comprise the cost of employer contributions for current service of employees during the year; and
- valuation adjustments which include changes in the valuation allowances used to reflect financial assets at their net recoverable or other appropriate value. Valuation adjustments also represent the change in management's estimate of future payments arising from obligations relating to vacation pay, guarantees and indemnities.

Incurring by Others

Services contributed by other entities in support of the Ministry's operations are disclosed in Schedule 6

Assets

Financial assets of the Ministry are limited to financial claims, such as advances to and receivables from other organizations, employees and other individuals.

Assets acquired by right are not included. The threshold for capitalizing new systems development is \$100,000 and the threshold for all other tangible capital assets is \$5,000. All land is capitalized. The Ministry has no tangible capital assets that meet these thresholds.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recorded to the extent that they represent present obligations as a result of events and transactions occurring prior to the end of fiscal year. The settlement of liabilities will result in sacrifice of economic benefits in the future.

Net Liabilities

Net liabilities represent the difference between the carrying value of assets held by the Ministry and its liabilities.

Valuation of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the amount of consideration agreed upon in an arm's length transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties who are under no compulsion to act.

The fair values of cash, accounts receivable, advances, accounts payable and accrued liabilities are estimated to approximate their carrying values because of the short term nature of these instruments.

NOTE 5 DEFINED BENEFIT PLANS
(in thousands)

The Ministry participates in the multi-employer Management Employees Pension Plan and Public Service Pension Plan. The Ministry also participates in the multi-employer Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers. The expense for these pension plans is equivalent to the annual contributions of \$2,026 for the year ended March 31, 2008 (2007 - \$1,837).

At December 31, 2007, the Management Employees Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$84,341 (2006 - \$6,765) and the Public Service Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$92,070 (2006 – surplus of \$153,024). At December 31, 2007, the Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers had a surplus of \$1,510 (2006 - \$3,698).

The Ministry also participates in two multi-employer Long Term Disability Income Continuance Plans. At March 31, 2008, the Bargaining Unit Plan reported an actuarial deficiency of \$6,319 (2007 surplus - \$153) and the Management, Opted Out and Excluded Plan an actuarial surplus of \$7,874 (2007 - \$10,148). The expense for these two plans is limited to the employer's annual contributions for the year.
