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Preface

The Public Accounts of Alberta are prepared in accordance with the *Financial Administration Act* and the *Government Accountability Act*. The Public Accounts consist of the annual report of the Government of Alberta and the annual reports of each of the 24 ministries.

The annual report of the Government of Alberta released June 30, 2009 contains ministers' accountability statements, the consolidated financial statements of the province and the *Measuring Up* report, which compares actual performance results to desired results set out in the government's business plan.

This annual report of the Ministry of Executive Council contains the minister's accountability statement, the audited financial statements of the Ministry and a comparison of actual performance results to desired results set out in the Ministry business plan. This ministry annual report also includes other financial information as required by the *Financial Administration Act* and *Government Accountability Act*, either as separate reports or as a part of the financial statements, to the extent that the Ministry has anything to report.

Management's Responsibility for Reporting

The Ministry of Executive Council includes:

- Executive Council/Office of the Premier; and,
- the Public Affairs Bureau.

The executives of the individual entities within the Ministry have the primary responsibility and accountability for the respective entities. Collectively, the executives ensure the Ministry complies with all relevant legislation, regulations and policies.

Ministry business plans, annual reports, performance results and the supporting management information are integral to the government's fiscal and business plans, annual report, quarterly reports and other financial and performance reporting.

Responsibility for the integrity and objectivity of the financial statements and performance results for the Ministry rests with the Premier, President of Executive Council. Under the direction of the Premier, I oversee the preparation of the Ministry's annual report, including financial statements and performance results. The financial statements and the performance results, of necessity, include amounts that are based on estimates and judgments. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Canadian generally accepted accounting principals for the public sector as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. The performance measures are prepared in accordance with the following criteria:

- Reliability Information agrees with the underlying data and with the sources used to prepare it.
- Understandability and Comparability Actual results are presented clearly and consistently with the stated methodology and presented on the same basis as targets and prior years' information.
- Completeness Performance measures and targets match those included in Budget 2008. Actual results are presented for all measures.

As Deputy Minister, in addition to program responsibilities, I establish and maintain the Ministry's financial administration and reporting functions. The Ministry maintains systems of financial management and internal control which give consideration to costs, benefits and risks that are designed to:

- provide reasonable assurance that transactions are properly authorized, executed in accordance with prescribed legislation and regulations, and properly recorded so as to maintain accountability of public money;
- provide information to manage and report on performance;
- safeguard the assets and properties of the province under Ministry administration;
- provide Executive Council, Treasury Board and the Minister of Finance any information needed to fulfill their responsibilities; and,
- facilitate preparation of Ministry business plans and annual reports required under the Government Accountability Act.

In fulfilling my responsibilities for the Ministry, I have relied, as necessary, on the executive of the individual entities within the Ministry.

Operational Overview

The Ministry of Executive Council includes the Office of the Premier/Executive Council, which provides organizational and administrative support and advice to Cabinet; delivers long-term strategic planning and policy coordination for government; provides advice to the Premier on economic strategies; plans and coordinates international visits and provincial government ceremonial events; supports government agencies, boards and commissions; and provides planning, communications and administrative support to the Office of the Premier, the Office of the Lieutenant Governor and the Alberta Order of Excellence Council.

Executive Council also includes the Public Affairs Bureau, which helps government communicate with Albertans; develops communications for government's long-term strategic plans and priority initiatives; leads the province's branding initiative; supports internal government communications; coordinates advertising and the corporate identity program; provides Albertans with two-way access to government through central communications and information resources; and ensures effective communications with Albertans during public emergencies.

2008-09 Key Activities

Office of the Premier/Executive Council

Agency Governance Secretariat

The Agency Governance Secretariat continued to promote the implementation of the Public Agencies Governance Framework in 2008-09, leading the development of Bill 32: *The Alberta Public Agencies Governance Act*; the development of a database for a government agency inventory; provision of support for the development of agency mandate and roles documents; and the development of orientation materials for directors of public agencies.

Policy Coordination Office

In 2008-09, the Policy Coordination Office supported annual strategic planning through leadership on the environmental scan and the opportunities analysis and identification of long-term strategic issues. The Office also co-led development of the three-year Government of Alberta Strategic Business Plan. The Office supported the identification, implementation and tracking of government priorities and reported on progress. Office staff also provided advice on strategic options and promoted a corporate, cross-ministry integrated approach to policy development that is aligned with government priorities.

In addition, the Office supported implementation of priority actions, including delivery of a conference to strengthen policy capacity in the public sector and enhanced the policy development processes and documents that support decision-making.

Premier's Council for Economic Strategy

In 2008-09, a Secretariat to support the Premier's Council for Economic Strategy was formed and an extensive search was undertaken that identified potential Council members. Members were then selected and recruited with the goal of commencing formal operation in 2009-10.

The Premier's Council for Economic Strategy will consider long-term goals for Alberta and provide advice on actions the Alberta government can take to best position the province for the future. They will provide an external perspective on Alberta's efforts to boost innovation, diversify the economy, enhance our quality of life, and sustain prosperity over the long-term.

Protocol Office

In 2008-09, the Protocol Office coordinated and provided expertise on more than 50 visits of international dignitaries to Alberta, including official visits by several foreign ministers, ambassadors/high commissioners and consuls general. The Office coordinated a reception at McDougall Centre in Calgary during the Global Petroleum Show. Guests included the Minister of Energy from the United Arab Emirates, who also had private meetings with the Premier and the Minister of Energy. With the Government of Alberta briefing for consular and other representatives also taking place at McDougall Centre in Calgary, Protocol staff arranged for key members of the consular corps to tour the oil sands. Protocol also planned and/or provided advice for provincial government ceremonial events.

The Alberta Order of Excellence

The Alberta Order of Excellence, which recognizes Albertans who have served the province with excellence and distinction, invested seven individuals in a ceremony on October 9, 2008 in Edmonton.

Public Affairs Bureau

The Public Affairs Bureau is committed to helping share Alberta's story with the world, and ensuring that government communications are well coordinated, effectively managed and responsive to the information needs of Albertans.

Bureau staff led the development and launch of a new Alberta brand that reflects the province as a great place to live, work, visit and invest, and ensures that the province's reputation is enhanced and promoted. To develop the brand, research was conducted through October 2008 to January 2009. In March 2009, the new brand was successfully rolled out and the new brand look and feel implemented within government. A new brand strategy with updated messaging and an updated approach to advocacy efforts in the United States was also implemented. PAB staff coordinated the creation of the brand website, developed and executed a media relations strategy about the brand and conducted social media research.

PAB staff contributed to government's emergency preparedness through participation in Operation Sweet Grass. During the exercise, staff participated in teams for onsite communications, the Public Inquiry Room call centre, and the government website. The Bureau also took part in an exercise for the communications office of the Government Emergency Operations Centre (GEOC) on March 17 to ensure effective emergency processes are in place and understood.

To provide government staff with easy access to government news and information, an electronic employee newsletter, *GoA Connector*, was published monthly to all departments. The GoA Connected website was updated monthly with *GoA Connector* content.

Public Affairs Bureau staff also played important roles in a number of projects across government, including work on the following initiatives:

The Alberta Conservation Team's (ACT) One Simple Act program was launched in June 2008 to educate and encourage Albertans to conserve energy and water and reduce waste. Since the program launched, ACT has successfully delivered One Simple Act at more than 210 community events, and engaged more than 12,000 Albertans. The unique program enabled the team and the Government of Alberta to utilize modern, innovative and bold communications tactics. Communications support of One Simple Act in 2008-2009 was provided to the Alberta Conservation Team through strategic planning, media training and media relations, advertising support, web advice and writing and editing.

PAB staff also provided communications support for the government's Safe Communities initiative. This is a partnership of nine government ministries working collaboratively to address crime by focusing on enforcement and addressing the root causes of crime, such as family violence, addiction and mental illness. Staff provided ongoing assistance with media relations, event planning and strategic communications.

Communities across the province came alive on September 6, 2008 with concerts, exhibits, performances, demonstrations and much more for the inaugural Alberta Arts Day. Thousands of Albertans took part in the celebrations and participated in more than 100 community-led events. Public Affairs Bureau staff played a lead role in assisting communities in planning, organizing and promoting their Arts Day activities. An event planning tool kit was developed, along with customizable marketing and promotional materials. An online community events calendar was promoted extensively through targeted advertising and media relations. Staff also helped spread the word about Alberta Arts Day through social media, which included development of an Arts Day Facebook fan site, an artists' blog and a Book Crossing Challenge that invited Albertans to read books written by, published by or about Albertans and then share those books with others.

PAB staff at Education focused a majority of their work during the past year on supporting three important initiatives designed to benefit Alberta's students: Setting the Direction for Special Education in Alberta; Speak Out! – Alberta Student Engagement Initiative; and Inspiring Education: A Dialogue with Albertans. The branch also supported communications strategies that contribute to the discussion about public education in Alberta. It developed new opportunities and approaches in working with the public and media, identified more effective communications methods and explored new social media tools to reach different audiences.

Message from the Deputy Minister

Executive Council staff play an integral role in the ongoing good governance of the province, and their contributions are many and diverse.

In 2008-09, staff provided ongoing support to government as it continued to roll out plans for Alberta. To improve the governance of public agencies, we saw progress in implementing the Public Agencies Governance Framework, including the introduction of Bill 32: *The Alberta Public Agencies Governance Act.* Policy Coordination Office staff assisted with ongoing strategic planning. Members were identified, recruited and selected for the Premier's Council for Economic Strategy. Executive Council staff also supported Alberta's international relations efforts, helping to welcome more than 50 visits of international dignitaries, and honoured our homegrown heroes by investing seven individuals into the Alberta Order of Excellence.

The Public Affairs Bureau led the creation and launch of Alberta's new brand and accompanying strategy, which reflects Alberta as a great place to live, work, visit and invest. Throughout government, Bureau staff also provided communications support to key government initiatives such as One Simple Act and Alberta Arts Day. Staff also facilitated government's ongoing internal communications efforts with a government-wide e-newsletter and intranet site.

I am proud to lead such a dedicated group of professionals, and I would like to thank them for their work throughout the past fiscal year.

Report of the Auditor General on Performance Measures



To the Members of the Legislative Assembly

I have reviewed the performance measures identified as "Reviewed by Auditor General" included in the Ministry of Executive Council's 2008-09 Annual Report. These performance measures are prepared based on the following criteria:

- Reliability Information agrees with the underlying data and with sources used to prepare it.
- Understandability and Comparability Actual results are presented clearly and consistently with the stated methodology and presented on the same basis as targets and prior years' information.
- Completeness performance measures and targets match those included in Budget 2008. Actual results are presented for all measures.

My review was made in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements and, accordingly, consisted primarily of enquiry, analytical procedures and discussion related to information supplied to me by the Ministry. My review was not designed to provide assurance on the relevance of these performance measures.

A review does not constitute an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on these performance measures.

Based on my review, nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the "Reviewed by Auditor General" performance measures in the Ministry's 2008-09 Annual Report are not, in all material respects, presented in accordance with the criteria of reliability, understandability, comparability, and completeness as described above. However, my review was not designed to provide assurance on the relevance of these performance measures.

Increased spending for 2008-09 is mainly related to two new initiatives:

- o the establishment of the Premier's Council for Economic Strategy, and
- the development and initial launch of a new Alberta brand (this first phase of the Brand Initiative was completed for \$1.3 million less than the \$5 million estimated for 2008-09).

Results Discussion and Analysis

The measure related to Goal 1 "Government policy and planning are coordinated and effective", has been developed for the 2008-09 Annual Report. The satisfaction level of Policy Coordination Office (PCO) clients is positive. Results indicate that 85% of PCO clients are satisfied with products and services they received from PCO over the past 12 months.

The results from the measures related to Goal 2 "Government communications is coordinated and effective" are consistent with those from previous years:

- 2a. Public satisfaction with government communications decreased by 2% from the previous year and remains below the target. The 75% approval rating target is quite aggressive for this type of measure. The decrease is within the margin of error.
- 2b. Public satisfaction with the government website decreased slightly by 1% from the previous year. The decrease is within the margin of error.
- 2c. The satisfaction level of government clients increased slightly from the rating of 89% last year to 90% in 2008-09. It remains below the target of 95%.

In prior years, the Office of the Auditor General applied specified procedures to all ministry performance measures included in the annual report. In the current year the Office of the Auditor General conducted a limited assurance engagement (review) of a selection of performance measures that are identified in the annual report as "Reviewed by Auditor General". The measures were selected for review by ministry management based on the following criteria established by government:

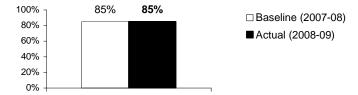
- Enduring measures that best represent the goal and mandated initiatives.
- Measures have well-established methodology and reporting of data.
- Measures have outcomes over which the government has a greater degree of influence.

Performance Measures

Goal 1 - Government policy and planning are coordinated and effective

1. Satisfaction of Policy Coordination Office Clients with Products and Services

This measure rates the satisfaction of government clients with the products and services they received from the Policy Coordination Office over the previous 12 months.

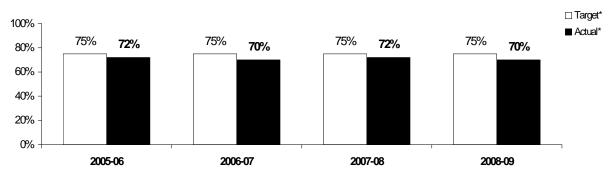


From June 4 to 25, 2009, a census survey was conducted of government clients of the Policy Coordination Office. A total of 264 clients were invited to participate in the web-based survey, and 168 responded, for an overall participation rate of 64%. Of those who participated, 158 had received at least one product or service from the Policy Coordination Office in the past 12 months. Among the 158 respondents who had received at least one product or service, 85% were very or somewhat satisfied, 15% were neutral, and 0% were dissatisfied.

Goal 2 - Government communications is coordinated and effective

2a. Public Satisfaction with Government Communications

This measure rates Albertans' satisfaction with information they receive directly from government about programs and services.



(*Represents the total of "very" and "somewhat" satisfied responses)

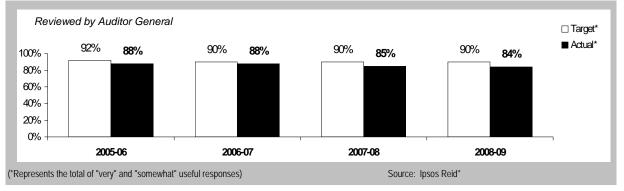

2008-09 results reflect telephone interviews with 800 adult Albertans conducted from June 10-14, 2009. Respondents were randomly selected from across the province. A sample of this size within the given population produces results that are reliable to within plus or minus 3.5% 19 times out of 20. Respondents were first asked whether they heard or received any information about the provincial government activities or programs. Those who answered "Yes" were then asked to choose from very satisfied, somewhat satisfied, somewhat dissatisfied or very dissatisfied. Figures shown reflect the averaged results of multiple questions. No response replies are not included in the calculation of results.

Adjustments were made to remove those respondents who had no recall of government communications over the past year. Previous years were also adjusted for comparability.

2b. Public Satisfaction with Government of Alberta Home Page

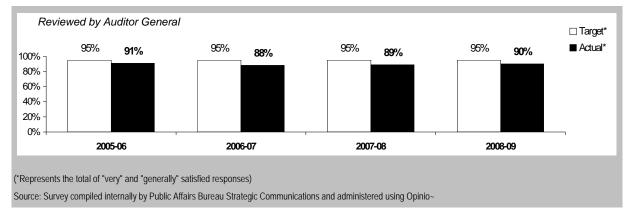
This measure tracks users' satisfaction with the Alberta government home page by asking how useful they find the page in helping them locate the information they need. As the main portal to the Alberta government website, the home page offers access to government news as well as to information from ministries across government.



2008-09 results reflect telephone interviews with 800 adult Albertans conducted from June 10-14, 2009. Respondents were randomly selected from across the province. A sample of this size within the given population produces results that are reliable to within plus or minus 3.5% 19 times out of 20. Respondents were first asked whether they had visited the Alberta government website in the past year. Those who answered "Yes" were then asked how useful they found the first page in helping them to locate the information they needed by choosing from very useful, somewhat useful, not very useful or not at all useful. No response replies are not included in the calculation of results.

2c. Government Client Satisfaction with Communications Support and Services

This measure rates government client satisfaction levels with communications services provided by the Public Affairs Bureau.



Each year, communications directors are asked to compile a list all clients at the manager, executive and director levels. In order to improve the sample selection process, it was mandatory that all ministry staff at the director level and above be included in the current year sample. 1,141 department staff were contacted via e-mail and provided with a link to a web address that allowed them to complete their surveys online. The survey was conducted from February 4 and March 4, 2009. Responses were received from 698 clients. The survey results were compiled internally by the Public Affairs Bureau. Respondents were asked to choose from very satisfied, generally satisfied, generally dissatisfied or very dissatisfied. Figures shown reflect the averaged results of multiple questions. No response replies are not included in the calculation of results. Three new questions were asked as part of this year's survey, but the responses were not included in averaged results to maintain comparability to prior years.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year Ended March 31, 2009

NOTE 1 AUTHORITY

The Ministry of Executive Council operates under the authority of the *Government Organization Act*, Chapter G-10, Revised Statutes of Alberta 2000.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND REPORTING PRACTICES

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for the public sector as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (PSAB). The PSAB financial statements presentation standard for government summary financial statements has been modified to more appropriately reflect the nature of the departments.

(a) Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is the Ministry of Executive Council. This entity consists of the activities of the Office of the Premier/Executive Council and Public Affairs Bureau.

All departments of the Government of Alberta operate within the General Revenue Fund (the Fund). The Fund is administered by the Minister of Finance and Enterprise. All cash receipts of departments are deposited into the Fund and all cash disbursements made by departments are paid from the Fund. Net Financing provided from (for) General Revenues is the difference between all cash receipts and all cash disbursements made.

(b) Basis of Financial Reporting

Revenues

All revenues are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Cash received for which goods or services have not been provided by year end is recorded as unearned revenue.

Expenses

Directly Incurred

Directly incurred expenses are those costs the ministry has primary responsibility and accountability for, as reflected in the Government's budget documents.

In addition to program operating expenses such as salaries, supplies, etc., directly incurred expenses also include:

- pension costs which comprise the cost of employer contributions for current service of employees during the year.
- valuation adjustments which include changes in the valuation allowances used to reflect financial assets at their net recoverable or other appropriate value.
 Valuation adjustments also represent the change in management's estimate of future payments arising from obligations relating to vacation pay, overtime, guarantees and indemnities.

Incurred by Others

Services contributed by other entities in support of the Ministry's operations are disclosed in Schedule 6.

Assets

Financial assets of the Ministry are limited to financial claims, such as advances to and receivables from other organizations, employees and other individuals.

Assets acquired by right are not included. The threshold for capitalizing new systems development is \$100,000 and the threshold for all other tangible capital assets is \$5,000. All land is capitalized. The Ministry has no tangible capital assets that meet these thresholds.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recorded to the extent that they represent present obligations as a result of events and transactions occurring prior to the end of fiscal year. The settlement of liabilities will result in sacrifice of economic benefits in the future.

Net Liabilities

Net liabilities represents the difference between the carrying value of assets held by the Ministry and its liabilities.

Valuation of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the amount of consideration agreed upon in an arm's length transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties who are under no compulsion to act.

The fair values of cash, accounts receivable, advances, accounts payable and accrued liabilities are estimated to approximate their carrying values because of the short term nature of these instruments.

NOTE 3 ORGANIZATION (FUNDING) CHANGE

(in thousands)

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) core services funding was transferred from the Ministry of Executive Council to the Department of Service Alberta. The comparatives have been restated to reflect this funding transfer and has resulted in a decrease in expenses of \$124 for the period ended March 31, 2008.

At March 31, 2009 the Ministry is a defendant in one legal claim (2008 – one legal claim). This claim has a specified amount totaling \$76 and is covered by the Alberta Risk Management Fund.

NOTE 6 BENEFIT PLANS

(in thousands)

The Ministry participates in the multi-employer Management Employees Pension Plan and Public Service Pension Plan. The Ministry also participates in the multi-employer Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers. The expense for these pension plans is equivalent to the annual contributions of \$2,325 for the year ended March 31, 2009 (2008 – \$2,026).

At December 31, 2008, the Management Employees Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$568,574 (2007 – \$84,341) and the Public Service Pension Plan reported a deficiency of \$1,187,538 (2007 – \$92,509 as restated). At December 31, 2008, the Supplementary Retirement Plan for Public Service Managers had a deficiency of \$7,111 (2007 – surplus of \$1,510).

The Ministry also participates in two multi-employer Long Term Disability Income Continuance Plans. At March 31, 2009, the Bargaining Unit Plan reported an actuarial deficiency of \$33,540 (2008 – \$6,319) and the Management, Opted Out and Excluded Plan an actuarial deficiency of \$1,051 (2008 – actuarial surplus of \$7,874). The expense for these two plans is limited to the employer's annual contributions for the year.

NOTE 7 COMPARATIVE FIGURES

Certain 2008 figures have been reclassified to conform to the 2009 presentation.

NOTE 8 APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements were approved by the Senior Financial Officer and the Deputy Minister.
