

## Improving Student Programs

- The new Knowledge and Employability courses in mathematics, social studies and 10 occupations were implemented in September 2008.
- Revised programs were implemented in mathematics in elementary schools and in Biology, Chemistry and Physics 30.
- Two of the five occupational streams in the Career and Technology Studies (CTS) program—Business, Administration, Finance and Information Technology (BIT) and Trades, Manufacturing and Transportation (TMT)—were updated and provided to schools for implementation in September 2009.

## Engaging Students

- *Speak Out*—*Alberta Student Engagement Initiative* was created to provide opportunities for Alberta youth to share experiences and provide input in improving education for students.
- 38 youth forums, including two for Aboriginal youth, were held across the province and a popular interactive website was launched.
- A Minister's Student Advisory Council was formed to provide ongoing advice on education and the first annual student conference was planned.

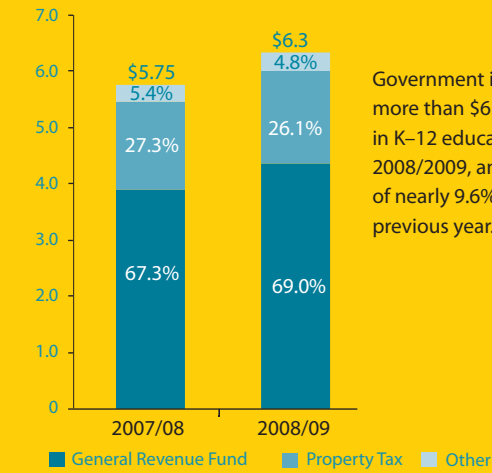


## Expanding School Facilities

- Nearly \$662 million was provided to school jurisdictions for school construction, modular classrooms, modernizations and renewal.
- 12 new schools were completed to accommodate 4,650 students and 106 modular classrooms were added.
- Construction started on 18 of 32 schools in Calgary and Edmonton that are being built using a public-private partnership approach.

## Investment in Education

(in billions)



Government invested more than \$6.3 billion in K-12 education in 2008/2009, an increase of nearly 9.6% over the previous year.

- Government investment in education in 2008/2009 provided programs for about 584,000 K-12 students in Alberta schools.
- Over 94 per cent of education funding—\$5.9 billion—was provided to school jurisdictions. This support included base instruction funding and funding for such programs as severe special needs, English as a second language, First Nations, Métis and Inuit education, transportation and school facilities.
- Government's General Revenue Fund provided an increased portion of funding for the education system in 2008/2009 (69%) over the previous year (67.3%), while the Education Property Tax contribution decreased from 27.3% to 26.2%.

## Introduction

The success of every student is our highest priority. The Ministry of Education provides leadership to create a learning environment in keeping with the needs of the 21st century learner. It supports student achievement and maintenance of a world-class education system by:

- meeting the diverse learning needs of students
- engaging students' passions and interests
- promoting continuous improvement in learning through outcomes-based accountability and reporting
- determining the knowledge, skills and attributes necessary for student success.

The Ministry ensures the effective delivery of education by:

- developing and supporting the implementation of policies, programs and standards
- providing equitable funding to school authorities
- monitoring the management of school jurisdictions
- providing education sector workforce planning, teacher development and certification.

## Addressing the Minister's Mandates

- **Early Learning** — The *Kindergarten Program Statement* was updated and provided to schools. A resource for working with young English language learners was developed and distributed to early learning and immigrant centres.
- **Completion** — The *High School Completion Portfolio Framework* was developed to help school jurisdictions find ways to improve high school completion rates. Enhanced analytical tools were provided to school jurisdictions to increase their understanding of student data and help them identify strategies to enable more students to finish high school.
- **Long-Term Vision for K-12 Education** — *Inspiring Education*—*A Dialogue with Albertans* was launched to hear from Albertans about the future of K-12 education. Input will be used to develop a policy framework to shape future directions and ensure Alberta continues to have an excellent education system. Consultations were completed on *Setting the Direction for Special Education*, which will contribute to improved supports for students with special education needs.



# Performance Highlights

Alberta Education identifies performance measures and targets for key indicators of success of the K – 12 education system, reflecting our commitment to continuous improvement. Results over time and targets for 2008/2009 are provided below. Rather than relating solely to 2008/2009 spending, these results reflect the cumulative impact of investment of resources and effort over time on the part of government, school boards, parents, teachers and students.
