# Carbon Levy Exemptions for First Nations Individuals and Bands



## Alberta's Carbon Levy

As of January 1, 2017 a carbon levy is charged on all fuels that give off greenhouse gases when they are burned. The carbon levy applies to various kinds of transportation and heating fuels, including

- gasoline
- diesel
- propane
- natural gas

## Exemptions for First Nations Individuals and Band

- Eligible First Nations individuals and bands do not pay the carbon levy when buying transportation fuel on reserve.
- Natural gas is exempt if it is delivered to an address on reserve
  - · for personal use
  - · for band use in band management activities
  - · for real property on reserve

The above exemptions apply only to First Nations individuals and bands defined under the federal Indian Act as an Indian or Indian band.

Eligible First Nations individuals can use the same forms of identification currently used to receive on-reserve exemptions from GST and the fuel tax.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible for the transportation fuel exemption, you must

- present your Alberta Indian Tax Exemption card at time of purchase and;;
- have purchased the fuel from an exempt-sale vendor located on reserve, the Garden River settlement or Heart Lake.

To be eligible for the heating fuel exemption, you must

- present a federal ID card (Treaty card) to the natural gas company.
- First Nations bands must present an original certificate to the company.

**Note:** Natural gas companies may use an existing copy of a federal ID card or original certificate (i.e., for providing GST exemption) to provide carbon levy exemptions.

## Carbon Levy Rebates

These rebates are intended to help lower and middle-income Albertans offset costs associated with the carbon levy.

- Alberta started providing rebates in January 2017
- To be eligible for a carbon levy rebate, you must
  - · be an Alberta resident
  - have filed a 2015 tax return
  - · meet the income requirements (see table below)

#### Need assistance to access carbon levy rebates?

- There are a number of supports available:
  - · Free tax preparation clinics are available throughout Alberta and generally offered between February and April of every year.
  - · Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) also has a Community Volunteer Income Tax Program. CRA can arrange for surplus computers to run the program and train volunteers to work with individuals and families.
