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## Overview

The Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry<sup>1</sup> in Alberta includes establishments that:

- produce seedlings in specialized nurseries and gathering forest products such as gums, barks, and balsam needles;
- grow or harvest timber on a long production cycle (10 years or more);
- provide related support services.

#### 2. Industry Growth

- The Forestry and Logging Support Activities industry accounted for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2019, unchanged from 2018.
- Employment in this industry is expected to grow at an average rate of 1.2% from 2019 to 2023<sup>2</sup>.
- The industry is expected to account for 0.2% of total employment in Alberta in 2020.
- The outlook for the above projections was completed prior to the economic shocks
  associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and therefore may not capture current
  economic conditions in the short term. However, the projections are expected to be
  reflective of long-term expectations of employment trends.

#### 3. Facts, Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry accounted for approximately 0.2% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2018 and 2019, unchanged from 2008 and 2009. Between 2008 and 2018, this industry's contribution to Alberta's total employment remained steady at 0.2%, and between 2009 and 2019 it also remained steady at 0.2%.

Total employment in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry (the total number of employees and self-employed people, 15 years and over) in 2019 was 36.8% lower than its level in 2018. Over the last 10 years, employment in this industry increased by 500 from 2009, a 16.1% increase. There were 3,600 people employed in the industry in 2019, of whom 3,300 were full-time.

In the short-term, employment growth in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry is expected to shrink in 2020, as the broader economy is being negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

## 2. Demographics: Gender and Age

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Forestry and Logging with Support Activities industry in 2019 was as follows:

women employed: 900 people, or 25.0%, a decrease from 26.3% in 2018
men employed: 2,700 people, or 75.0%, an increase from 73.7% in 2018

Overall in Alberta, women accounted for 46.1% and men made up 53.9% of total employment (for all industries) in 2019, compared to 45.7% women and 54.3% men in 2018.


