Innovate

Since 2003, Alberta's Promise has facilitated relationships that drive resources and support to children and youth programs across the province.

Alberta's Promise encourages corporations, not-for-profit agencies and communities to direct more resources (financial, gifts in kind and volunteerism) to child and youth programs in Alberta. The invaluable support that Alberta's Promise Partners provide helps promote the growth of our children and youth into healthy adults.

Alberta's Promise supports the government's priorities of promoting strong and vibrant communities and improving the long-term sustainability of Alberta's economy.



Collaboration is an important aspect to the success of Alberta's Promise partnerships. Working together, Promise Partners have combined their efforts to produce unique programs that will ultimately benefit the children and youth of Alberta.

Since 2003, Alberta's Promise has helped foster more than 1,164 partnerships between companies, agencies and communities that have committed to brighter futures for our province's children and youth. In the new fiscal year, the number of Alberta's Promise partnerships has increased to more than 1,175.

Promise Agencies: Providers of services and resources directly to children and youth. An eligible agency must devote a significant amount of their activities to benefiting children and youth. Only non-government organizations are eligible.

Promise Builders: Companies, foundations, and service clubs that support agencies committed to children and youth by providing financial contributions, gifts in kind, volunteers, and by partnering with like-minded agencies to undertake specific projects.

Promise Communities: Towns and cities in Alberta that agree to encourage the businesses, organizations and individuals in their community to pull together for the benefit of local children and youth.

Husky announced a gift of \$1.5 million to establish the Husky Energy Chair in Child and Maternal Health at the Alberta Children's Hospital.





McHappy Day® 2009 raised over \$298,000 in Alberta, proceeds were donated to Alberta's Promise Partners.



112 refurbished computers were donated to Alberta's Promise Agencies totaling approximately \$22,400.

Collaborate



Alberta's Promise, its partners and stakeholders all proudly participate in provincial initiatives that benefit our children and youth. This year has been about renewal for the program and its continued ability to serve its partners and our youngest generations.

Legislative Extension

On November 4, 2008, Alberta's Legislative Assembly approved the extension of the Premier's Council on Alberta's Promise Act for an additional five-year period. Alberta's Promise will use these next five years to continue helping to inspire positive outcomes for the children and youth of our province. This extension of legislation reflects the Government of Alberta's desire to continue the great work of this unique program.

Partnership Renewal

In 2009, Alberta's Promise conducted a Partnership Renewal Campaign among its then 1,164 partners. Each Promise Partner was asked to recommit their support to Alberta's children and youth by renewing their Alberta's Promise partnership for the extended legislated time period. The Partnership Renewal Campaign achieved a 94% renewal rate, exceeding the original projected goal of 90%.



Partner Commitment Measurement

Coinciding with the renewal of partner commitments to Alberta's Promise, each partner was asked to provide a measurement of their commitment and investment to Alberta's child and youth sector. Between 2003 and 2009, it is estimated that Alberta's Promise funding partners will have cumulatively invested more than \$250 million into child and youth not-for-profit charities across the province. In the new fiscal year, the Alberta's Promise partnership base has already grown to more than 1,175 with an estimated cumulative investment of more than \$300 million.

Premier's Council Renewal

In June 2009, Alberta's Promise Premier's Council Members were asked to continue their role for another three-year term. Members were officially reappointed to the Premier's Council to help promote the development of community strategies that further the well-being of Alberta's kids. Renewed member appointments are in the About Us section of this report.

Mentoring

Alberta's Promise, as a program of Children and Youth Services (CYS), has been collaborating with representatives from other ministries and community organizations on the province-wide Alberta Mentoring Partnership. Alberta's Promise is rallying its partners and Premier's Council Members to support this initiative that will help develop strong and healthy communities where young people have positive role models.
