# Labour Market Notes

## Labour market takes a step back

#### Alberta

- **Employment pulls back.** Employment in Alberta decreased by 18,200 in November, more than reversing the gains made in the previous three months.
- **Full-time and private sector give back gains.** The monthly losses were concentrated in the private sector (-23,000) and full-time (-14,100).
- **Broad-based decline.** The monthly decline was widespread with employment falling in both the goods and services sectors and in 11 of the 16 industries.
- **Unemployment rate jumps up.** With the large drop in employment, the unemployment rate increased by 0.5 percentage points to 7.2%.
- **Participation falls back.** The increase in the unemployment rate was moderated by a decrease in the participation rate, which fell back to its 39-year low of 71%.
- **Employment growth stalls.** Compared to a year ago, employment was down 18,200, or 0.8%, the first year-over-year (y/y) decline since March 2017.
- Self-employment weighs on annual growth. The year-over-year declines were entirely due to declining self-employment (-31,700 y/y), while employment in the private (+6,100 y/y) and public (+7,400 y/y) sector remained higher than a year ago.
- Strength in the service sector moderates. Employment in the service sector retreated 13,000 month-over-month after reaching a new high in October. With the monthly decline, the year-over-year growth slowed from 1.7% to 0.3%. Employment in wholesale and retail trade, transportation and warehousing, business, building and other support services, and other services have all pulled back from highs reached earlier in the year.
- **Goods sector remains sluggish.** Employment in the goods sector continues to give back gains made in 2017 and 2018. Good sector employment was 23,400 lower than a year ago, weighed down by ongoing weakness in forestry, fishing, mining, oil and gas, and construction.
- **Earnings growth accelerates.** Average weekly earnings (AWE) increased \$11.61 in August to \$1,178. Compared to a year ago, earnings were up 3.4%, the most robust growth in nineteen months.

## Canada

- Sharp decline in employment. Employment in Canada fell by 71,200 in November. This was the largest monthly decline since 2009 and was led by pullbacks in Quebec (-45,100), B.C. (-18,200) and Alberta (-18,200). Only Ontario (+15,400) posted a notable gain.
- **Unemployment rate moves up.** Nationally, the unemployment rate increased 0.4 percentage points to 5.9%, a fifteen-month high.
- **Canadian earnings continue to improve.** Canadian AWE increased by \$9.31 to \$1,042 in September, with year-over-year growth of 4.0%.


