Labour Market Notes

A solid end to 2023

Alberta


- Alberta's labour market maintains momentum. Employment in the province increased 6,700 month-over-month (m/m) in December after advancing by a similar magnitude in November.
- Services sector rebounds. Services sector employment jumped by 20,300 m/m in December after some weakness through the fall, led by monthly gains in other services (which includes personal and repair services), professional & scientific services, and educational services.
- **Goods sector takes a breather.** Employment in the goods sector declined by 13,500 m/m after adding over 33,000 jobs in the previous two months, as construction and manufacturing gave back some gains.
- **Part-time positions jump.** The monthly strength was concentrated in part-time positions, which increased by 35,600 to more than offset November's decline. Meanwhile, full-time positions gave back the previous month's gain (-28,700 m/m) but continued to account for the bulk of the annual job gains.
- **Private sector continues to lead.** Private sector jobs rose by 23,000 in December and remained the driver of job gains in 2023. Meanwhile, self employment (-13,500 m/m) and public sector employment (-2,900 m/m) both fell in the month.
- **Unemployment rate moves higher.** The unemployment rate increased from 5.9% in November to 6.3% in December as the labour force participation rate moved higher and the source population continued to expand at a rapid pace. The unemployment rate averaged 5.9% in 2023, up from the 2022 average of 5.8%.
- **Participation rate ends year on a high.** The participation rate advanced by 0.3 percentage points to 69.7% in December and averaged 69.6% in 2023.
- Strong employment growth in 2023. Alberta added 93,600 jobs from December 2022. The strength was widespread, in both the goods (+37,500) and services (+56,100) sectors, in the private sector (+100,500) and in full-time positions (+63,300).
- Wages decline. Average hourly wages dipped 0.1% m/m to \$35.67, but were up 4.7% y/y.

Canada

- **National employment flat.** Nationally, employment was little changed, with gains in eight provinces countered by a decline in Ontario. Canada added over 430,000 jobs since December 2022.
- **Unemployment rate holds.** The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 5.8% in December. On an annual basis, Canada's unemployment rate was 5.4%, up from 5.3% in 2022.
- Wages increase. Nationally, average hourly wages moved higher to \$34.45 (+0.5% m/m) and were up 5.4% y/y.



Monthly change in employment, December 2023




CHART 3: UNEMPLOYMENT RATE JUMPS AS PARTICIPATION RATE MOVES HIGHER

Monthly change in labour market indicators, December 2023




CHART 5: HOURLY WAGE UP STRONGLY FROM LAST YEAR

Average hourly wage and y/y growth, non-seasonally adj




CHART 2: BOTH EMPLOYMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT ADVANCE

Number of employed and unemployed (thousands)




CHART 4: PARTICIPATION RATE INCREASES AS Y/Y LABOUR FORCE GROWTH ADVANCES

Participation rate and year-over-year growth in labour force





CHART 6: JOB VACANCY RATE DECLINING BUT STILL ELEVATED

Change in employment since December 2022




CHART 9: GOODS SECTOR UP SIGNIFICANTLY FROM LAST YEAR

Alberta employment indexed to December 2022, by sector




CHART 11: Y/Y EMPLOYMENT GAINS WIDESPREAD ACROSS PROVINCE

3-month average employment indexed to December 2022, by region




CHART 8: HEALTH CARE, NATURAL RESOURCES, AND

Change in employment since December 2022




CHART 10: PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT WELL UP FROM LAST YEAR

Alberta employment indexed to December 2022, by type





CHART 12: ALL AGE GROUPS UP FROM LAST YEAR

Percentage change in employment since December 2022




CHART 15: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE LOWER THAN 2019 AVERAGE

Employment rates by province




CHART 14: GROWTH IN ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Year-over-year growth in employment by province




CHART 16: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province





CHART 18: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE LEADS THE WAY
