Labour Market Notes

Labour market takes the foot off the gas

Alberta


- Employment takes a breather. Employment in the province fell by 3,200 month-over-month (m/m) in March after advancing considerably since last September.
- **Trade weighs on services sector.** After gains in the previous three months, employment in the services sector fell 17,200 m/m, primarily due an outsized decline in wholesale & retail trade (-21,600 m/m).
- **Broad-based gains in goods sector.** Employment in the goods sector (+13,900 m/m) moved higher for the second consecutive month, with gains in all industries.
- Strength in private sector continues. Despite the monthly decline, employment in the private sector advanced in the month (+14,800 m/m). Meanwhile, employment in the public sector (-7,100 m/m) and self employed (-11,000 m/m) retreated.
- **Part-time positions retreat.** After moving higher in February, part-time positions fell back in March (-3,500 m/m). This overwhelmed a slight uptick in full-time positions (+400 m/m), which were up for the third consecutive month.
- Employment growth holding up. Despite the monthly lull, employment was up 3.4% year-over-year (y/y) in March, with the strength concentrated in the private sector and in full-time positions.
- **Participation rate tumbles.** Although Alberta's source population continues to swell, the labour force eased (-800 m/m) as the participation rate declined 0.3 percentage points to 69.5%. With the drop, the participation rate was back to its November 2023 level.
- **Unemployment rate ticks up.** The unemployment rate moved from 6.2% in February to 6.3% in March as the monthly job losses overwhelmed a dip in the labour force.
- Hours grow. While the number of jobs declined in March, total hours worked increased (+0.8% m/m) and were up 3.0% y/y.
- Wages move higher. Average hourly wages advanced 0.4% m/m to \$36.05 and were up 4.6% y/y.

Canada

- **National employment moves lower.** Employment in Canada declined by 2,200 m/m in March, with pullbacks in seven provinces.
- **Unemployment rate bumps up.** The national unemployment rate jumped from 5.8% in February to 6.1% in March.
- Wages hold steady. Nationally, average hourly wages were largely unchanged at \$34.81 but were up 5.1% y/y.



Monthly change in employment, March 2024




CHART 3: UNEMPLOYMENT RATE UP AND PARTICIPATION RATE DOWN

Monthly change in labour market indicators, March 2024




CHART 5: HOURLY WAGE UP STRONGLY FROM LAST YEAR

Average hourly wage and y/y growth, non-seasonally adjusted




CHART 2: EMPLOYMENT EASES WHILE UNEMPLOYMENT TICKS UP

Number of employed and unemployed (thousands)




CHART 4: LABOUR FORCE DIPS WITH PART-RATE

Participation rate and year-over-year growth in labour force




CHART 6: JOB VACANCY RATE DECLINING

Change in employment since March 2023




CHART 9: GOODS SECTOR PRESSES ON WHILE SERVICES PULLS BACK

Alberta employment indexed to March 2023, by sector




CHART 11: EMPLOYMENT GAINS WIDESPREAD ACROSS PROVINCE

3-month average employment indexed to March 2023, by region




CHART 8: CONSTRUCTION LEADING Y/Y EMPLOYMENT GROWTH

Change in employment since March 2023




CHART 10: BOTH FULL- AND PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT UP Y/Y

Alberta employment indexed to March 2023, by type




CHART 12: CORE AGE EMPLOYMENT WELL UP FROM LAST YEAR

Alberta employment indexed to March 2023, by age group




CHART 13: ALBERTA EMPLOYMENT GROWTH RANKS THIRD AMONG THE PROVINCES

Percentage change in employment since March 2023




CHART 15: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE LOWER THAN 2019 AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province




CHART 17: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS FROM 2019 BUT IS STILL THE HIGHEST

Year-over-year growth in employment by province




CHART 16: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province





CHART 18: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE LEADS THE WAY
