Labour Market Notes

Widespread gains in employment

Alberta

- Employment advances. Employment in the province increased by 10,600 month-over-month (m/m) in April, with gains in 13 of the 16 industries.
- **Natural resources lift goods sector.** Employment in the goods sector (+5,800 m/m) moved higher for the third consecutive month, led by gains in forestry, fishing, mining, oil & gas.
- Services sector regains ground. Following the pullback in March, services sector employment moved higher in April (+4,900 m/m), driven by a rebound in professional, scientific, and technical services and a solid gain in other services.
- Strength in private sector continues. Employment in the private sector advanced (+6,100 m/m) for the third month in a row and was accompanied by a bounce back in self-employment (+6,700 m/m). Meanwhile, public sector employment retreated (-2,200 m/m).
- **Rebound in part-time.** After retreating in March, part-time positions bounced back in April (+14,000 m/m). This overwhelmed a modest decline in full-time employment (-3,400 m/m), which eased after three months of growth.
- **Employment growth picks up.** With the monthly gain, year-over-year (y/y) growth in employment accelerated from 3.4% in March to 3.8% in April, with strong gains in the private sector and full-time hiring.
- Labour market conditions ease. With staggering population growth and a jump in the participation rate, the labour force ballooned by 32,000 m/m. This exceeded the gains in employment and pushed the unemployment rate higher.
- **Participation rate hits recent high.** Alberta's participation rate surged by 0.6 percentage points to 70.1% in April, a 15-month high.
- **Unemployment rate jumps.** The unemployment rate moved from 6.3% in March to 7.0% in April as the strong monthly job growth was outpaced by a surge in the labour force.
- Hours grow. With the job gains in April, total hours worked increased 1.3% m/m and were up 7.1% y/y.
- Wages move higher. Average hourly wages advanced 1.5% m/m to \$36.58 and were up 4.5% y/y.

Canada

- **Solid gains for national employment.** Employment in Canada increased by 90,400 m/m in April, with gains in nine provinces. This followed a slight pullback in March and was the largest monthly gain since January 2023.
- **Unemployment rate holds steady.** The national unemployment rate was unchanged at 6.1% in April.
- Wages tick up. Nationally, average hourly wages increased 0.4% m/m to \$34.95 and were up 4.7% y/y.



Monthly change in employment, April 2024




CHART 3: SOURCE POPULATION GROWS AT RAPID PACE

Monthly change in labour market indicators, April 2024




CHART 5: HOURLY WAGE UP STRONGLY FROM LAST YEAR Average hourly wage and y/y growth, non-seasonally adjusted

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


CHART 2: BOTH EMPLOYMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT ADVANCE IN THE MONTH

Number of employed and unemployed (thousands)




CHART 4: LABOUR FORCE EXPANDS WITH JUMP IN PARTICIPATION RATE

Participation rate and year-over-year growth in labour force





CHART 6: LABOUR MARKET CONDITIONS CONTINUE TO EASE

Change in employment since April 2023




CHART 9: BOTH SECTORS UP IN THE MONTH

Alberta employment indexed to April 2023, by sector




CHART 11: EMPLOYMENT GAINS WIDESPREAD ACROSS PROVINCE

3-month average employment indexed to April 2023, by region




CHART 8: FORESTRY, MINING, AND OIL & GAS LEADS ANNUAL GAINS

Change in employment since April 2023




CHART 10: BOTH FULL- AND PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT UP Y/Y

Alberta employment indexed to April 2023, by type




CHART 12: CORE AGE EMPLOYMENT WELL UP FROM LAST YEAR

Alberta employment indexed to April 2023, by age group






CHART 13: ALBERTA EMPLOYMENT GROWTH RANKS FOURTH AMONG THE PROVINCES

Percentage change in employment since April 2023




CHART 15: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE MOVES HIGHER THAN 2019 AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province




CHART 17: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS FROM 2019 BUT IS STILL THE HIGHEST

Employment rates by province




CHART 14: GROWTH IN ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Year-over-year growth in employment by province




CHART 16: ALBERTA'S UNEMPLOYMENT RATE ABOVE NATIONAL AVERAGE

Unemployment rates by province





CHART 18: ALBERTA'S EMPLOYMENT RATE LEADS THE WAY
