Bargaining Update

Introduction

Bargaining Update provides information about the unionized workforce, primarily in Alberta. There are approximately 2,016,400 Albertans employed, of which about 359,700 are self-employed. Approximately 417,100 Albertans are covered by union agreements. Alberta's union coverage rate is 25.2% while nationwide the union coverage rate is 31.7%. Unemployment in Alberta decreased slightly from 119,900 in November 2010, to 118,700 in December 2010, with the rate remaining at 5.6%. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained virtually the same at 7.6% in November 2010 and December 2010, with the number of unemployed persons decreasing by 2,800 to a total of 1,424,100.

Highlights

In negotiations between the Government of Alberta and AUPE an impasse has been reached in bargaining. The union will be holding meetings with local committees to discuss their next steps.

Teachers' Collective Agreement Discussions

Since September 2010, representatives of the Government of Alberta, ATA and ASBA held almost 20 meetings to consider the future of teacher collective agreements, potential transformation in Alberta's schools and education funding in Alberta. The current collective agreements between teachers and school boards expire at the end of the 2011/12 school year. The Alberta government had asked teachers and boards to consider reopening and replacing those agreements with new ones extending to 2015.

On January 28, 2011, Dave Hancock, Minister of Education, advised the parties that it was not possible to come to an agreement. That same day, the parties issued a joint statement saying that they would not be moving ahead with an agreement at this time.

The proposals that were being discussed by the parties would have called for the teachers giving up the negotiated 2011/12 increase, which is based on the Alberta Average Weekly Earnings and predicted to be 4.3 per cent, and accepting limited salary increases in subsequent years and the addition of enforceable limits on teachers' instructional and non-instructional work time. Also under consideration were the establishment of a board of teacher development, led by teachers and including representatives of stakeholders and the public, to provide advice to the Minister of Education about continuing teacher professional development. Other items in discussions were a guarantee of a minimum number of professional learning days in the school year, the establishment of a standing Government-ATA-ASBA consultation committee to address issues relating to the government's transformation agenda, a disputes resolution process for enforcing the agreement, maintenance of the class size initiative and a commitment to provide necessary funding to school boards. Other issues not explicitly addressed in the framework agreement would have been dealt with through a local collective bargaining process, with any unresolved issues being settled by arbitration. In the absence of a new agreement, the current collective agreement will remain in force until August 31, 2012.

Recent Labour Relations Developments in Other Jurisdictions

British Columbia

About 130 employees with the Rocky Mountain Rail Tours voted on January 6, 2011 in favour of joining the Teamsters. The employees were previously represented by the Canadian Auto Workers. Negotiations to renew the collective agreement will occur shortly.

Saskatchewan

Over 200 construction workers at the Mosaic Co. mine construction site at Belle Plaine, approximately 50 kilometres west of Regina, have voted to be represented by the CEP. The certification vote was actually held in July 2010, but legal issues delayed the ballot count. Ninety-one per cent of those who voted were in favour of the union. The workers belong to fourteen different trades, and are employed by the construction firm JVDMSI. The certification represents the first time that the CEP has represented construction workers in Saskatchewan. In 2009, the Saskatchewan government made possible multi-trade ("wall-to wall") certification.

Manitoba

About 450 support staff at the University of Manitoba, represented by the CAW, Local 3007, have voted 87 per cent in favour of possible strike action. Negotiations between the parties continue, and the union has not set a strike date. The University has yet to make a wage offer, but it is expected to seek a wage freeze for at least part of a new agreement. The employees went on strike for more than a week in October 2007.

Ontario

About 350 support staff at the University of Windsor, represented by CUPE, Local 1001, have voted 93 per cent in favour of a strike mandate. The union indicates there is no strike deadline, as they are waiting for a government conciliator (mediator) to become involved in the negotiations. A main issue in bargaining is contracting out work.

Newfoundland and Labrador

A large majority of the 130 workers at the Voisey's Bay nickel mine in Labrador have voted in favour of a settlement proposed by an industrial inquiry commission. The employees, represented by the USW, Local 9508, have been on strike since August 2009. The mine's owner, Brazil-based Vale, said it cannot support the proposed settlement, indicating they would only accept a deal negotiated with the union. Strikes by USW at Vale's operations in Sudbury and Port Colbourne, Ontario, which also began in the summer of 2009, ended in July 2010.

The strike by about 100 Metrobus transit drivers, mechanics, and other employees, in St. John's, which began on November 4, 2010, continues. The employees are represented by the ATU. Metrobus indicated the ATU is refusing a package, in which new hires would pay 50 per cent of the cost of their group benefits plan, this clause is apparently common in the municipal sector in Newfoundland and Labrador. Other issues of concern to the union are the contracting out of some work and the use of temporary employees. Recently, Metrobus has decided to subsidize taxi service for bus customers by selling books of taxi vouchers at half price.

Canada

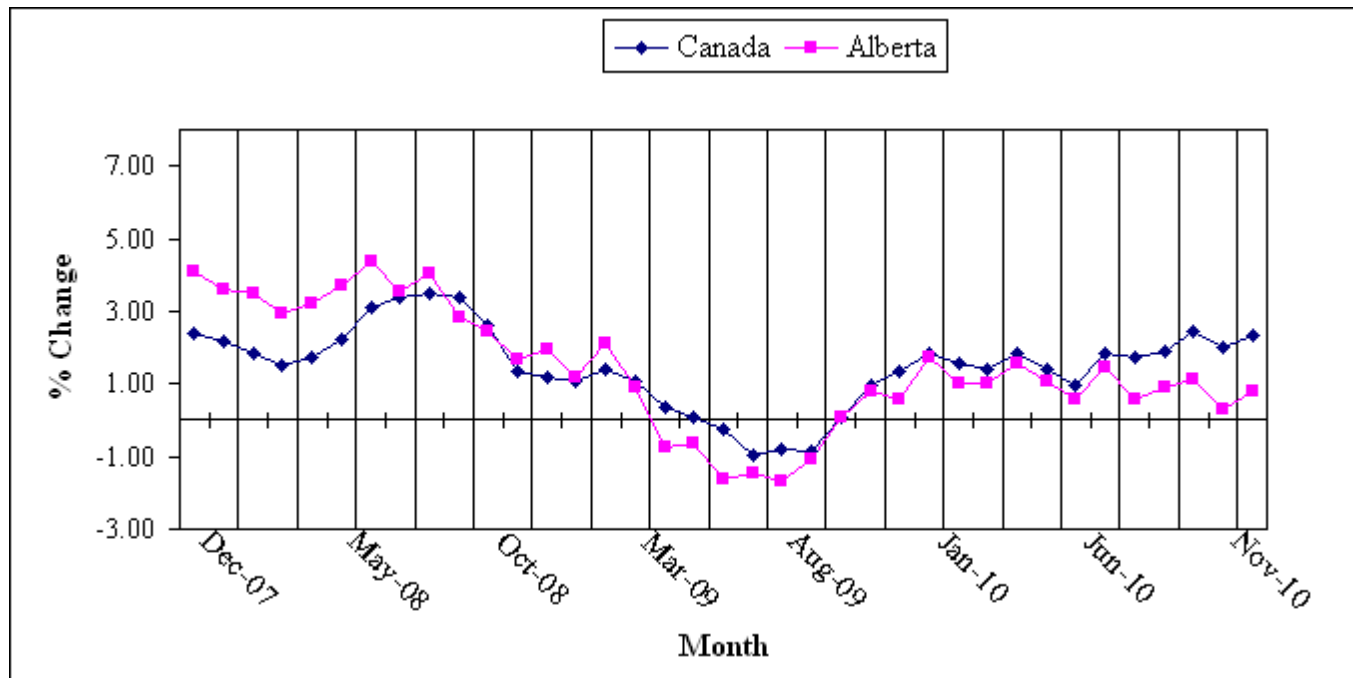
The current agreement between Canada Post and the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) expires on January 31, 2011. Negotiations for a new agreement began in October 2010. CUPW has expressed concern with some employer proposals, including, apparently, a lower pay scale for new employees, a reduction in vacation time, a new system for sick days, and a new pension plan. A union official in Saskatchewan has indicated that strike action is a possibility if negotiations do not progress.

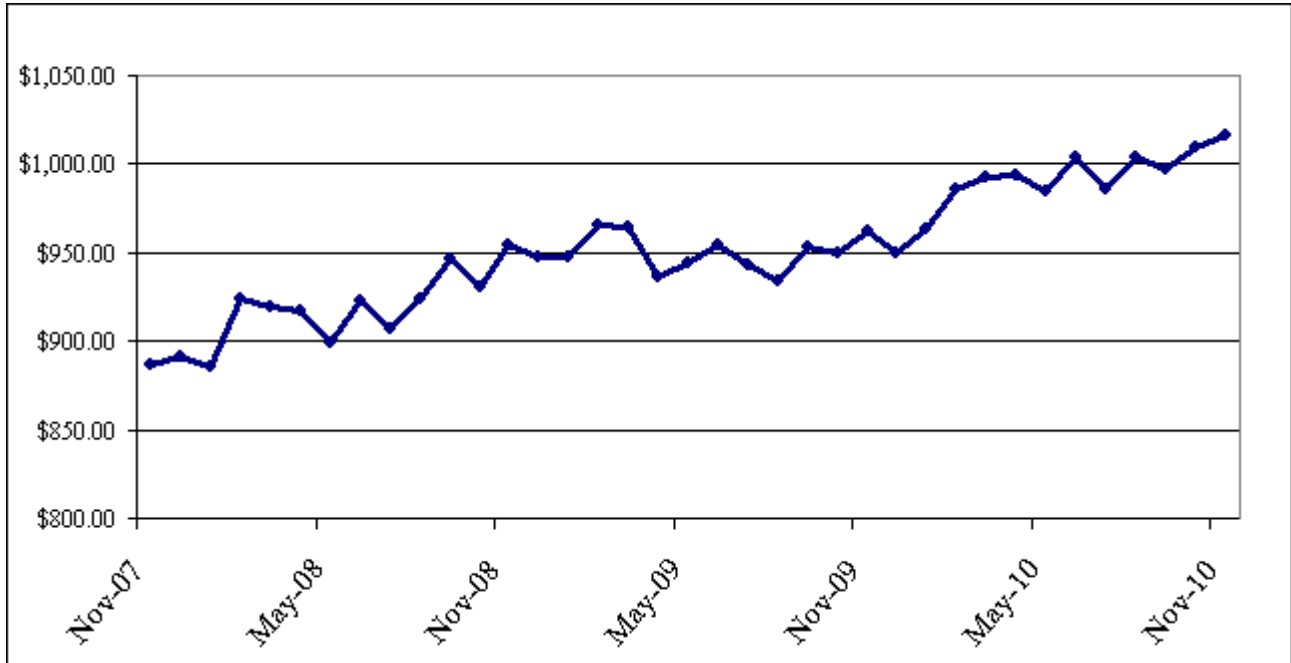
