

New: Oil Prices


WTI increased \$1.57 over the week and closed at US\$105.36 on Thursday. The WTI-WCS differential closed at US\$12.65 per barrel, narrower than US\$12.90 per barrel a week ago.


Labour Market


Employment rose by 7,200 in March. Compared to a year ago, when employment was recovering from the pandemic, it was up by 94,800. The next release is on May 6, 2022.



New: Economic Activity

The Alberta Activity Index increased 1.4% month-over-month (m/m) in February, and was up 5.1% from a year ago. Alberta's real GDP by expenditure decreased by 7.9% in 2020, following a marginal decline in 2019.






Alberta's unemployment rate was 6.5% in March, down 0.3 percentage points from February and 2.5 percentage points below a year ago.

Business Output

Manufacturing shipments increased 7.2% m/m to \$8.4 billion in February. Compared to a year ago, they were up 33%.

Alberta goods exports fell 9.1% m/m in February to \$13.6 billion. Year-over-year (y/y), they were up 44%.

Rigs Drilling

The number of rigs drilling in Alberta averaged 142 in March, up 93% from the weak levels a year ago.

New: Average Weekly Earnings

Average weekly earnings in Alberta decreased 0.3% m/m in February to \$1,244, and increased 1.0% from a year ago.

Population Growth

Alberta's population was 4,480,486 as of January 1, 2022, an increase of 1.1% from the year prior. During the last 12 months, Alberta welcomed 32,608 net international migrants and saw a net outflow of 1,239 interprovincial migrants.

Inflation


The consumer price index in Alberta increased 6.5% y/y in March, up from 5.5% y/y in February.

Retail Sales

Alberta retail sales declined 0.1% m/m to \$7.5 billion in February. Compared to a year ago, sales were up 1.3%.

Housing Market

Alberta housing starts increased 1.8% m/m in March to 31,915 units (SAAR), up 9.7% from a year ago.

The number of home sales in the resale market decreased 5.3% m/m to 9,530 units in March, up 28% y/y.




REAL GDP BY EXPENDITURE

(March 2022)




AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS

(February 2022, year-over-year growth)




CPI INFLATION

(March 2022, year-over-year growth)




EMPLOYMENT
