


Factors Likely to Affect Alberta's Labour Market




Alberta Working Age Population (WAP) by Age Group




Canada and Provinces Labour Force Participation Rates, 2012






Alberta Participation Rate by Age Group and Sex






Alberta Labour Force Statistics by Economic Region, 2012






Alberta Historical Unemployment, 2002 - 2012

The number of unemployed people has been declining since reaching a recessionary high in 2009.






Canada and Provinces Unemployment Rate, 2012






Alberta's Unemployment Rate, 2002 - 2012

The unemployment continues to decline since peaking in 2009 during the recession.






Alberta Unemployment Rate by Industry, 2012

Alberta Unemployment Rate by Occupation, 2012




Alberta Average Hourly Wages, 2000 - 2012

- Alberta has had the highest average hourly wage rate in Canada since 2006.






Alberta Average Hourly Wage by Industry, 2012





Alberta Average Hourly Wage by Occupation, 2012






From 2013 to 2016, the number of employed Albertans is expected to increase by 208,000.



Alberta Total Employment Growth by Skill Level, 2012-2016


Percentage of Total 5 Year Growth

Overall Outlook

- According to Alberta's 2012-13 Third Quarter Fiscal Update and Economic Statement, GDP growth in Alberta is expected to moderate to a more sustainable rate of 2.9% in 2013.
- Oil prices in the US are expected to moderate slightly due to increasing domestic production. The price differential between West Texas Intermediate and Alberta's bitumen is likely to widen as a result. With no new routes to other markets, oilsands production may be adversely impacted.
- Business conditions in non-energy sectors are expected to continue improving.
- Cost pressures are expected to stay fairly contained in the near term, as increasing migration levels limit growth in labour costs and interest rates stay low.
- A deepening of the recession in Europe could affect growth in emerging markets thus weighing on commodity prices.
