# **Business, Building and Other Support Services** Industry

Employment, Immigration and Industry

#### **Overview:**

Business, Building and Other Support Services industry<sup>1</sup> includes two industry groups, Management and Administration. Management includes two types of companies: those that manage other companies and those that own all or part of other companies. Administrative and Other Support includes companies that provide office, business and facilities administration, such as:

- record keeping and document preparation services, collection services, and employment services;
- custodial services, pest control services, landscaping services, carpet and upholstery cleaning services, packaging and labelling services, waste collection, treatment, disposal and remediation services;
- investigation and security services, and convention and trade show services; and
- call centres, travel agencies and tour operators.

#### 2. Industry Growth:

- The Business, Building and Other Support Services industry is expected to grow on average 2.3% annually from 2006 to 2011.
- Approximately 7,630 jobs will be created in the forecast period. Employment is expected to increase to 70,297 by 2011.
- This industry is expected to provide 3.2% of all new jobs in Alberta between 2006 and 2011.

#### Outlook

According to *Alberta's Occupational Demand and Supply Outlook (2006-2016)*, Administrative support clerks should experience a supply surplus between 2006 and 2013. Human resources and business service professionals should expect to see a supply surplus every year between 2006 and 2016. Managers in protective services are expected to have a supply shortage between 2010 and 2016.

Some call centers have turned to alternative approaches to serve its customers. A few restaurants, traditionally using call centers to record orders, have implemented online ordering. Strategies like this should alleviate some issues of labour shortage in the Business, Building, and Other Support Services industry.

Technology continues to affect those in the travel industry, such as travel agents and tour operators. The Internet's rise in popularity has altered how agencies provide services. Initially, Internet use by travel agencies was to provide information to prospective consumers. Now, websites are giving consumers more control over their own travel arrangements. Internet-savvy consumers can plan, book and pay for travel online, without the aid of an agency. As Internet use grows, the number of independent travellers may increase.

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender break-down in the Business, Building and Other Support Services industry is as follows:


- women employed: 30,900 people, or 49.3%
- men employed: 31,800 people, or 50.7%

In comparison, women accounted for 45.3% and men made up 54.7% of the total employed in Alberta.
