

DID YOU KNOW?

- Kansas was the 34th state admitted to the union on January 29, 1861.
- Kansas ranks among the top 10 States in crude oil production.
- Brown v. Board of Education of the City of Topeka, KS, in 1954, was a landmark decision of the U.S. Supreme Court declaring Kansas state laws establishing separate public schools for black and white students unconstitutional.

RELATIONSHIP OVERVIEW

- In 2011, Alberta became an associate member of the Council of State Governments Midwest (CSG Midwest) to which Kansas belongs.
- A recent study by the Canadian Energy Research Institute estimated that between 2011 and 2035 the development of Alberta's oil sands will add an annual on average of between \$80 and \$224 million per year to the economy of Kansas and will preserve or create an average of 9600 to 2760 jobs per year, with those workers earning between \$39 and \$117 million. The range of these estimates depends on the ability of growing oil sands production in Alberta to find pipeline access to market.

 More than 7 Kansas companies have been identified that supply equipment, parts and services that are being used in the development of Alberta's oil sands.


TRADE AND INVESTMENT

- Alberta's main exports to Kansas are crude oil, turbojets and turbo propellers, beef and plastics.
 Alberta supplies machinery and parts used in Kansas' aircraft manufacturing industry.
- Alberta's main imports from Kansas are aircraft, crude and refined oil, harvesting/threshing machines and tires. Cessna Aircraft Company is headquartered in Wichita, Kansas.
- In 2011, Alberta's exports to Kansas were \$1.4 billion. Kansas was Alberta's 12th most important export destination worldwide, just behind Japan.

ENERGY

- With crude oil reserves of 259 million barrels, Kansas ranks 9th among 50 states in crude oil production.
- In addition, a network of pipelines deliver crude oil from elsewhere, including Alberta, to Kansas' three refineries, which have a capacity (as of January 1, 2011) of 339,200 barrels per day.
- The Hugoton Gas Area in southwestern Kansas is the fifth largest natural gas field in the United States.
- In addition to its own production, natural gas is also supplied to Kansas by pipelines entering the State from Oklahoma and Colorado. The Mid-Continent Center, located in Wichita, is a key natural gas supply hub that merges production from several States in the region before piping it east toward major consumption markets.
- Natural gas production from coal bed methane is rapidly expanding in the Cherokee Platform, where reserves have recently become economically recoverable.
- Despite its natural gas resources, coalfired power plants supply about three quarters of the state's energy needs, with the single-unit Wolf Creek nuclear plant in Burlington supplying almost all of the remainder.
- While Kansas ranks among the top ten wind-producing states in the U.S., renewable energy generation contributes only minimally to the state's electricity supply.
- The proposed Keystone XL Pipeline will transport crude oil from Alberta through Kansas on its way to refineries in the Gulf Coast region.

AGRICULTURE

- Kansas is the "wheat-state" as Kansas is the leading wheat producer in the U.S.
- There are 46 million acres of land in farms (2011). The average farm size is 702 acres (2011).
- The market value of agricultural products sold amounted to \$14.4 billion (2007).
- Kansas ranks sixth out of U.S. States in farm product exports, which were valued at \$5.9 billion in 2008.
- Alberta's 2011 agri-food exports to Kansas totaled \$46 million. Top exports included live cattle (\$3.9 million), live hogs (\$8.1 million), wheat (\$3.8 million) and oats and barley (\$0.4 million)
