

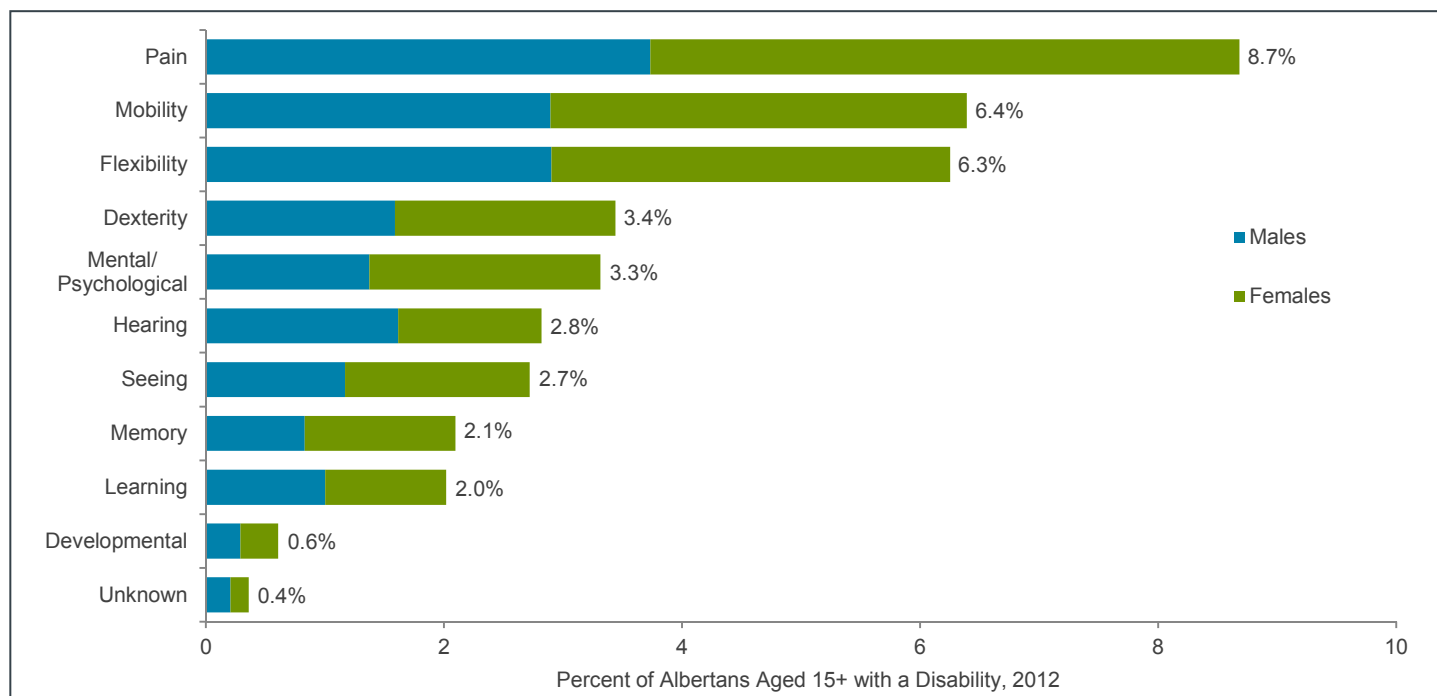

Types of Disabilities among Albertans Aged 15 and Over by Sex

- People with disabilities are defined by the Canadian Survey on Disability (CSD) as all adults aged 15 and over who had an activity limitation or a participation restriction associated with a physical or mental condition or health problem that had lasted or was expected to last for six months or more and were living in Canada at the time of the 2011 Census/ NHS.
- In 2012, 12.5% (369,190) of Albertans aged 15 or older reported a disability. The most commonly reported disability was “pain” at 8.7% with a higher proportion of women (5.0%) than men (3.7%).
- Mobility and Flexibility were the second and third highest disabilities reported at almost equal proportions of 6.4% and 6.3%, respectively, with the proportion of men reporting for both disabilities the same at 2.9%, while women reported slightly higher for mobility (3.5%) than for flexibility (3.3%).
- The least disability reported was ‘developmental’ with equal proportions of men and women at 0.3%.
