Overview:

The Accommodation and Food Services industry¹ in Alberta includes establishments that:

- provide short-term lodging and complementary services (i.e. hotels, motor hotels, resorts, motels, bed and breakfast accommodation, housekeeping cottages and cabins, recreational vehicle parks and campgrounds and hunting and fishing camps); and
- prepare meals, snacks and beverages to customer order for immediate consumption on or off the premises.

2. Industry Growth:

- Employment in the Accommodation and Food Services industry is expected to grow on average 0.9% annually from 2010 to 2013.
- Approximately 4,600 jobs will be created between 2010 and 2013. Employment is expected to increase to 130,700 by 2013.
- This industry is expected to provide 2.6% of all new jobs in Alberta between 2010 and 2013.

Trends and Outlook

According to Statistics Canada's National Economic Accounts, the Accommodation and Food Services industry accounted for 2.3% of Alberta's Gross Domestic Product in 2009, the same as in 1999. Its contribution to total employment declined from 6.8% in 1999 to 6.3% in 2009.

Employment in 2009 was 19.5% higher than its level in 2008. Over the last ten years, employment increased from 104,300 people in 1999 to 126,100 people in 2009.

The *Alberta Occupational Demand Outlook 2009-2013* projects labour demand growth in Chef and cook occupations, Managers in food service and accommodation, and occupations in Food and beverage service. Meanwhile, occupations in Travel and accommodation; and Tour and recreational guides and casino operators should expect below average demand for labour over the projection period.

Note: Statistics Canada's survey methodology for determining establishment size differs from the one it uses in the Labour Force Survey to determine total employment. As a result, the total number of employees by establishment size will not be the same as total employment in the industry, except by coincidence.

1. Occupational Information:

2. Demographics: Age and Gender:

According to the Labour Force Survey, the gender breakdown in the Accommodation and Food Services industry is as follows:

- women employed: 72,500 people, or 57.5%
- men employed: 53,600 people, or 42.5%

In Alberta, women accounted for 45.4% and men made up 54.6% of total employment.


